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HAINES IS SECURED AS ROWING MENTOR

Advisory Council Secures Former
Harvard Coach

The Advisory Council on Athletics meeting at the Engineers Club, 2 Commonwealth Avenue last evening, selected William Haines, who was rowing coach at Harvard two years ago, to coach the Technology crews. Mr. Haines held the position of Head Coach at Harvard for a period of five years, and made a reputation for turning out good crews.

Coach Connor's plan of having two varsity cross country teams, one to enter the New England and the other to enter the I. C. A. A. A. race, was approved. Also the rules for awarding the cups in the series of handicap meets were passed. Arthur Fricker who has been Technology's leading scoring man in cross country this season was declared ineligible for competition next year as he has had three years of varsity competition, one year at the Institute and two years at a North Carolina college.

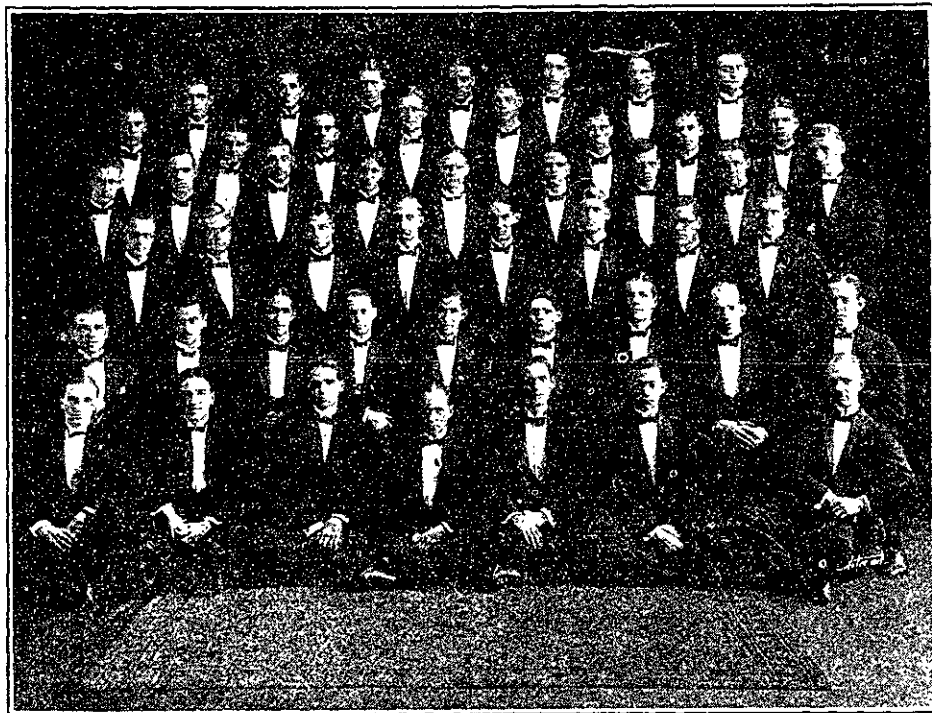
I. C. A. A. A. Changes

SECOND TERM REGISTRATION OUT TOMORROW

Freshmen Will Receive Material
in Chemical Laboratory
Sections

UPPER CLASSES OBTAIN
CARDS IN MAIN LOBBY

Registration material for the second term will be ready for distribution tomorrow and it is compulsory that all students should obtain it at that time. The method of distribution is essentially the same as was followed last year.

First year students will receive the registration material in their Chemical Laboratory sections and those who are not studying chemistry can obtain the material at Professor Mueller's office, room 4-256. Material for all Sophomores, Juniors and Seniors will be distributed in the main lobby.

The cards must be filled out and returned to the Registrar's office before 1 P.M. Friday, December 21 in order to avoid the five dollar fine which will be imposed upon all men returning their registration material after this time.

In order to avoid additional fines it is necessary to adhere to the following schedule. Registration material must be returned to room 3-106 before 1:00 P.M. on Friday December 21 and all fees for the coming term must be paid before 2:00 P.M. Saturday, December 29. In case payment will be made by mail, the letter must be postmarked before 10:00 A.M. Friday, December 28.

The approved final examination schedules are now ready for distribution.

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ARMY MEN ADDRESSED BY GENERAL CROZIER

New Officers for Coming Year
Elected at Smoker
Last Night

General Crozier, Chief of Ordnance during the war and for twenty years previous, was the chief speaker at the Army Ordnance Society Smoker last night. Following the election of the officers of the society for the coming year, Colonel O'Hearn, Chief of Ordnance of the First Corps Area, spoke briefly on the need for more men in the Ordnance from the R.O.T.C. General Dixon then introduced General Crozier.

He began his speech by telling the difference between the engineer and the foreman. The former uses the scientific method of attacking a problem while the foreman uses a rule of thumb. He pointed out the great steps which had been made in the determination of formulae relating to the stress and strain on guns. The subject of disappearing guns was covered beginning with the first models.

About 150 men were present including many officers, students and alumni. The newly elected officers of the Society are: President, P. E. Gruber '26; 1st Vice-President, Maj. R. H. Hannun; 2nd Vice-President, Capt. P. K. Christmas; Secretary-Treasurer, H. P. Sachs '25.

T.C.A. WILL SEND BOOKS TO EUROPE

Appeal Made to Student Body
For Cast-off Clothing
and Books

A call for clothing and text books to be sent to the students in Central European Colleges has been received by the T. C. A. from the Student Friendship Headquarters. As the shipment must leave the Institute Friday morning the T. C. A. is asking all those who have any clothing or extra text books that they are willing to give to this cause to leave them at the T. C. A. office before 5:30 o'clock tomorrow night.

Last year in response to a similar call a shipment was made which included 42 books, 23 hats, 28 vests, 30 pairs trousers, 84 pairs socks, and 20 pairs shoes. Space for a 250-ton shipment on the Hamburg-American Liner Hansa, sailing from New York next Monday has been donated to the Student Friendship Committee and a canvas is being made of the Eastern American Colleges to secure material for this shipment. Some of the colleges conducted a campaign for the clothing and books at the same time they solicited funds for the committee, but with the three-in-one drive held at the Institute it was believed that this would be impractical.

Letters have been sent to the Fraternity House requesting that a canvas be made of the members and in the dorms the men who conducted the drive campaign have been asked to handle this canvass there.

FIRE HOSE FEATURES IN TECH NIGHT SOLUTIONS

With fire hoses as weapons, a recent entrant in THE TECH'S prize contest for Tech Night plans would have groups from each class battle for supremacy in Eastman court or on the drill field after the show Tech Night. Other competitors advocate boxing matches, greased poles, and pig roasting.

After the game the squad is to be thrown wide open again so that everyone may have a fair trial lasting for about two weeks.

Nevertheless the Beavers are the favorites in the game. The game is looked upon as a tryout for Technology to test the men and to see how much of a score may be run up. This game will practically tell whether the Canadian trip is to be a success.

The hockey prospects are the best in many years. Quite a number of good players have come out and the old nonsense about training has been cut out. Instead of doing everything and eating anything they wanted to the men have gotten out and done some hard work. The men have been very faithful in the matter of track work and should have enough endurance to play at the end of the game with as nearly enough dash as at the beginning of the game.
