Coach Blacklock has been confronted with an unusually large and able body of men coming up from last year's freshman squad. Deignan, last year's freshman captain and goal-tender, will be on hand to take Denton Massey's place if necessary. Crosby, a transfer from Williams, Putnam and Sawyer, and Zubinski, one of the ablest men on the '26 squad of last year, will all be ready to do their stuff on the defense.

Locke, another graduate from the freshman class, will substitute for Jerry Dalton at center. For the wing positions there are three of last year's freshmen ready to jump in, Niles, Randall and Wiessner. The men had a chance to brush up on their passing and shooting and acquire a fair degree of teamwork, so that when at last they were able to go on the ice not a minute was wasted on elementary work.

B. U. ANNOUNCES HOCKEY LINE-UP FOR ARENA GAME

Four Veterans of Last Year's Team to Start Against Institute Sextet

B. U. STUDENT BODY TO GIVE TEAM FINE SUPPORT

The line-up of the Boston University hockey team which starts against the Institute Friday night at the Arena has been definitely decided upon by Coach Brick O'Hare, with the exception of one forward position. The competition for the remaining wing position is exceedingly keen.

Capt. Joe Almer will start at center with Bob Blais on the right wing, Adolph Provost and Murrey Kontoff at cover points will complete the quartet of veterans who started against the Institute last year. Oscar Hurteau, a new addition to the team, will tend goal. Hurteau last year was with St. Hyacinth's College, Canada. The candidates for the right wing position who have showed up well in practice are Roderick Ling, formerly of the St. Johnsbury Hockey Club; Jack Astner, who played a stellar game for Dummer Academy while he was there and Arthur Whitman, an athlete from Bowdoin.

Played Last Year

Last year Boston University gave the Beavers some stiff competition in the two games that were scheduled. The Institute team won the first game but the second was fought to a draw. This year with four of their veterans back an interesting match is expected. The students of the University are all out to back their team for a win and are organizing to give the team some hearty support. A parade has been arranged to take place from Copley Square to the Arena. Lead by the R. O. T. C. band a big crowd is expected to be there to back their team.

WILLIAM HAINES TO BE NEW COACH FOR CREW

of rowing nations. Out of 16 match races rowed over British championship courses, in which he defeated George Bubeare for the English championship. For three years Haines stroked the British championship four, and, in 1894, was a member of the British four which won the four-oared championship, defeating an American crew on Lake McDonald, near Austin, Texas.

Came to Boston in 1911

After considerable coaching in England, Haines for three seasons was the coach at the Berlin Rowing Club in Berlin, Germany, and later coached at rowing clubs at Budapest, Christiania, Norway, and Essen, Germany.

He came to Boston in 1911 to take charge of Union Boat Club crews, a position which he still holds. His Union Boat Club crews have won several championships in the American Henley at Philadelphia. During his early years on the Charles River, Haines also coached schoolboy crews, among them Noble & Greenough, Stone, Volkman, Browne & Nichols and Roxbury Latin combinations. One of his Noble & Greenough products, Reginald Jenney, a coxswain in school days, moved along later to stroke Haines's winning Harvard eight over Yale in 1920.

Went to Harvard in 1915

It was in the fall of 1915 that Haines first coached Harvard varsity crews and in June, 1916, the Harvard eight established a record of 20m 2s for the Thames River course. In 1918, Harvard won the two-mile race with Yale on the Housatonic; Yale won in 1919 and Harvard in 1920, the last victory registered by the Crimson over the Blue. In 1921, Yale's margin of victory was three and one-fifth seconds. In 1922, Haines was succeeded by Dr. R. Heber Howe, Jr., as head coach.

Products Made Oxford Crews

Three oarsmen trained by Haines on Harvard varsity crews later went to Oxford and earned places on Oxford University eights. They were F. B. Lothrop, M. E. Olmsted, and R. Keith Kane.

With Bill Haines now coaching the Beaver crews it will be pleasant to race against Harvard. For several years the Engineer crews have been gradually improving. The last time they raced the Crimson but a little over a length separated the two eights. Now, with the added impetus that Coach Haines is sure to give the oarsmen they should be able to pull their first defeat of Harvard.

CUB CREWS EXPECTED TO TRAIN ALL WINTER

Yearlings Should Sign-Up and Work on Machines During Second Term

Though of course no races are held until well in the spring, the crew men will practice all winter on the rowing machines. This includes the freshmen that expect to try for their eight and any that intend to take up rowing, either for competition for a berth on an eight or for the pleasure and exercise afforded by the sport.

The freshmen that take up rowing will have to sign up immediately in order to avoid gymnasium work. Those who have signed up for other sports this winter, not knowing that winter crew practice would be expected of them, will be allowed to change.
