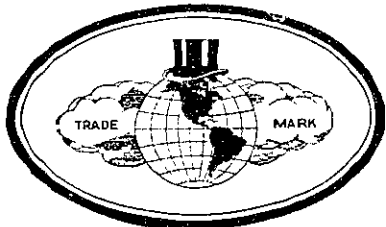


TWO STUDENT COURSES WESTINGHOUSE OFFERS

A. R. Dennington, Director of Education of the Westinghouse Lamp Company in Bloomfield, New Jersey, will be at the Institute next Thursday to meet men interested in taking the course offered to graduates of engineering colleges.

Two courses are offered, one a technical course and the other a commercial one. The courses are divided into periods, the first one of three months, the second of three to four months and the third of from five to six months. Studies are given in advanced mechanics, mathematics, physics and other allied subjects besides offering chances for research work.

Samples of Design and Drawing Placed for Inspection

As a beginning to closer relations between the men at Rogers and those in the main Institute building, the Rogers men have placed on exhibit in the main lobby a collection of their design and drawing work. For several days past large crowds have been continually passing around the lobby examining with considerable interest the various exhibits hanging on the walls and bulletin boards. The designs range from elaborate drawings of chapters to free-hand sketches of gothic columns and human figures.

For the more observing there is considerable humor to be found in the building designs. Around the eaves in most of the plans, is a space for inscriptions similar to the names of scientists on the Institute building. Such places are beautifully filled in with the funniest remark the designer can think of.

Monday the exhibit will be returned to Rogers, after what is considered a very satisfactory showing.

'24 ENDOWMENT FUND COMMITTEE APPOINTED

A committee to consider the endowment of the Senior Class has been appointed and consists of B. J. Fletcher chairman, J. W. Cannon, and H. R. Clark. As the exact way in which the class will leave their customary gift has not been decided, the committee has been empowered to set forward plans for a new method. The endowment method as last year is very costly for the class for the amount of money involved, and it is hoped that a new plan can be found.

By popular vote last Spring, the Class of '24 went on record as favoring the action of the Class of '23 but on investigation by the Senior officers showed the disadvantages of this system. Last year the John Hancock Life Insurance Company underwrote the insurance of 65 per cent of the graduating class. The insurance company takes care of delinquent payments, sends out notices, and gives a yearly report to the officers of the classes. This year a large number of insurance companies are in the field for such policies and because of this, it is expected to get much better rates than were had formerly. Arrangements are merely tentative as yet as final action will not be taken until sometime during the third term.

VI-A MEN GUESTS OF G. E. COMPANY AT LYNN

Men Prominent in Industry Talk to Gathering

Student engineers studying at the West Lynn Works of the General Electric Company were the guests of that company at a banquet given in their honor in Lynn last night. Of the men who are studying at that plant a large number are students of course VI-A at the Institute. There are about 95 additional students who represent about 40 colleges and universities in all parts of the United States.

The purpose of the gathering was to afford a get-together for the men from different colleges and also to acquaint them with the nature of the course which they are to follow at the plant. Such banquets are almost an annual occurrence at Lynn.

The program included speakers who are prominent in industrial as well as educational lines. Most of them are connected directly with the General Electric Company while a few are members of the faculty at Technology. J. C. Clendenin was the toastmaster of the evening.

Prof. Jackson Speaks

The first speaker was F. P. Cox, General Manager of the western works, who spoke on student training, its results and its nature. N. J. Darling, who addressed the student engineers next, chose as his topic "The Future of Engineering Students from the Viewpoint of a Graduate." His talk proved interesting as well as encouraging to all those present.

Professor D. C. Jackson, of the electrical engineering department at the Institute, spoke on the cooperative training courses which are being given in the various colleges at the present time. Among the other speakers were Professor W. H. Timbie of Technology, C. K. Tritt, F. N. Kimball and G. R. Trout '22. The monotony of the addresses was relieved by the performance of sleight of hand tricks that were very well received by the audience.

TECHNIQUE ANNOUNCES ELECTIONS TO STAFF

Plans For Campaigns Decided at Recent Board Meetings

Elections of new officers and members of the staff and plans for the coming campaign were decided upon at the last few meetings of the Managing Board of 1925 Technique. Chief among the changes of this year's Technique is the awarding of the printing contract to the Murray Printing Co., which printed Technique 1918, and the holding of the sign-up and redemption campaigns at an earlier date.

F. P. Hammond '25, former treasurer of Benchmark, was elected treasurer to take the place of E. L. Davis who did not return to school this year. The following men were elected to the Staff: C. W. It was also decided that no more Senior pictures will be taken until after Christmas. The men who have already had their photographs taken should go down to the studio and make a selection from the proofs. Informal snapshots are very welcome at the Technique office. So far only a few have been received and there is still a lot of room for more. About a third of the fraternity statistics have been turned in so far and it is hoped that the rest will be in soon.
