Team Will Not Meet Army

The Army was scheduled to meet the varsity on the first of March and had even signed a contract. However they will be unable to fill their contract so that they will be released from it. As no other date is available, there will be no meet with them this year. There was a proposal to petition the New England Intercollegiate Association to change the date of the Intercollegiate in wrestling, which are scheduled for March 15 and to give this date to the Army. Brown University worked this last year for a similar reason but it appears to be impossible this year, according to Dr. J. A. Rockwell, Secretary-Treasurer of the Association.

Propose Interclass Meets

Doctor Rockwell will be present at the prelims Mondays and will talk to the men in an effort to make them practice more regularly. He will show the men the necessity of practice and still more practice if Technology is to have a wrestling team equal to those in past years.

In order to stimulate more interest in wrestling, Doctor Rockwell has proposed interclass meets and has offered to put up a cup for the contests. These bouts would be open to all men at the Institute whether eligible or not for the varsity team and would have the desired effect of promoting interest in wrestling as an activity.

In response to a request by the Bible Study Department Professor Hale Sutherland '11, a member of the T. C. A. Advisory Council, will give a General Study next term, entitled "Christianity and the Social Order." This will consist of a discussion of the evolution of our social order in the light of modern and scientific thought, with the object of making plain the origin and tendencies of the principal elements of western civilization. The official views of Catholicism and Protestantism will be examined and their agreement with the teaching of social science emphasized. The text will be Ellwood, "Christianity and Social Science."

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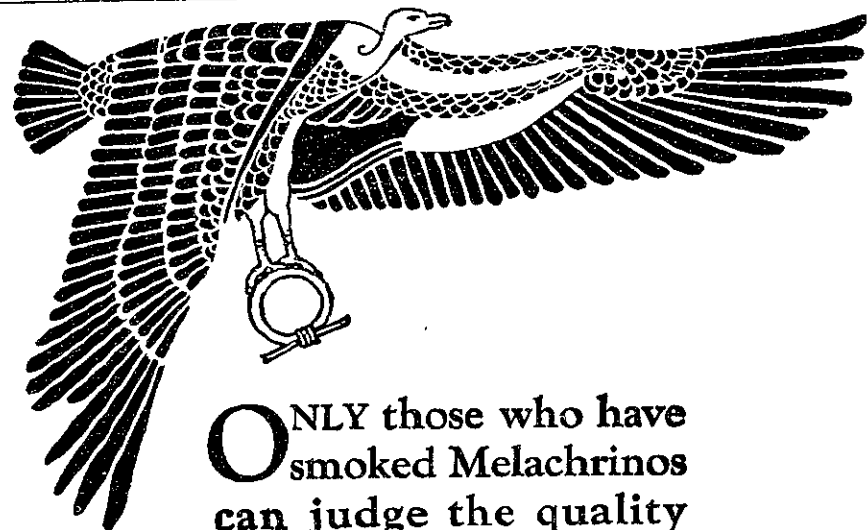
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Entrance examinations are held at the Institute in September. In June, applicants will be examined by the College Entrance Examination Board in Boston, New York, Philadelphia, Chicago, and many other cities in America and Europe. A circular stating times and places is issued in advance by the College Board.

Graduates of colleges and scientific schools of collegiate grade, and in general all applicants presenting satisfactory certificates showing work done at another college corresponding to at least one year's work at the Institute, are admitted, without examination, to such advanced standing as is warranted by their previous training.

Graduate courses leading to the Degrees of Master of Science, Master in Architecture, Doctor of Philosophy and Doctor of Science are also offered. Special Research Laboratories of Physical Chemistry, Applied Chemistry and Science have been established.
