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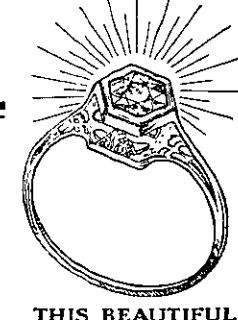
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PERSONAL MERIT GOVERNS CHOICE OF BOXING TEAM

Preliminaries Having Proved a Failure, Men Chosen From Experience

APPEAL FOR MEN FOR HEAVYWEIGHT CLASSES

The preliminary elimination bouts for the varsity boxing team, scheduled last week, were not a success as only three men appeared. As there is no time now to attempt to hold another series, a varsity squad has been picked by a jury consisting of Coach Boutelier, Manager P. B. Goble and Captain Rob Smith. The choice was made according to the impressions gathered from watching the practice and the eliminations made in this manner are about as fair as they can be. At least two men are retained in each class and in some classes there are three men, as the choice was too close to determine in any other way than by matching the men in a bout.

Call for Heavyweights

Lindsay, Aarlano, and Washburn are retained in the 115 pound class. Del Pradosi who has had a bad rib since the past few weeks, was one of the few who had a reason for not classing in the prelims and so will be kept in the 115 pound class until the next eliminations are run off. Smith and Schultz are kept in the 125 pound and Samaha, Gensel, and Lynch in the 135 pound classes.

In the heavier weight, there are fewer men and the team is correspondingly weak. Moll and Levin will box in the 145 pound and Konrisky and Forte in the 160 pound classes. There are no men out for the 175 pounds so that heavy men are needed badly. There are plenty of husky fellows around the Institute, any of whom would be welcome as an addition to the team. This is a good opportunity for anyone who can make either 149 or over 175 pounds to learn something about boxing as a sport and as an activity.

As it stands now, the squad has a promising aspect in the lighter weights as all the men have considerable experience as boxers. With the addition of a few heavyweights, Technology can have a crack team. Further eliminations in January will narrow the squad down to two men in each class and then an elimination will be held before each meet to decide which man will box in that particular meet.

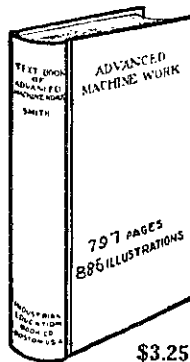
