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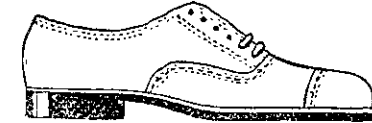

FORM STRONG NUCLEUS

One of the most popular winter sports at Technology is that of wrestling. A great number of men come out each year and though some do not make the team, yet the men continue to practice for the love of the sport alone. The Institute has put forth a crack combination of wrestlers in the past few years because of the interest taken in this sport and because of the excellent coaching facilities that are offered to the students. Coach Cy Burns' prominent among professional wrestlers, has been the wrestling mentor for several years and by his efforts, Technology's team of grapplers have been point-getters in many meets.

Men in Good Condition

With most of the varsity men back and several promising candidates already showing some fine work, the season puts on a most optimistic aspect. The heavyweight or unlimited class presents the weakest spot in the team because there have been few heavy men out for wrestling, most of the candidates reporting in the lighter classes. At the beginning of the season, it was thought that the unlimited class would be represented by Captain Fred Greer who is beginning his third season of stellar wrestling at the Institute. Two years ago he won his numerals in freshman wrestling. Last year he wrestled in the unlimited class on the varsity and made a fine showing there. However as he weighs only 175 pounds he is at a great disadvantage in the unlimited class and he really should wrestle in the 175 pound division. Last year in the Yale meet, Greer was placed against Captain McKay of the Yale team who outweighed him by 30 pounds. Although he prevented McKay from throwing him, Greer was injured to such an extent that he was unable to wrestle in any of the other meets that season. This year however, Greer is going strong and has been placed in the 175 pound class, for which his weights suits him. He has developed into a wonderful wrestler and is expected to have a very successful season.

Lighter Classes Stronger

Among the other men out for the 175 pound class are Kennett and Tryon. Kennett has wrestled the 175 varsity position for two years and is a good man to work along with Greer. The two have a different style of wrestling however so that there is little choice between them. Kennett appears to be the stronger and pushes the bout right from the beginning but tires quickly while Greer is more deliberate in his actions and leaves fewer openings.

158-pound Position Contested

The most hotly contested class at the present is the 158-pounds. Here there are Hereford, Halliburton, Jacobsen, Bowles, and Sheppard. Rock Hereford of course is the favorite as he has been a consistent point-getter for Technology. Last year he made a remarkable performance by winning both the N. E. Intercollegiate and the N. E. Amateur. However he has been very busy with his work this year and is not in the top-notch condition that he was in last year. Halliburton has been out lots and shows some good stuff while Jacobsen is showing the high class of work that he did on last year's freshman team. Bowles and Sheppard are both good men so that the eliminations in this class are bound to show some hot stuff before the representative from this class is picked.

The 145 pound division has Grinnell Lockwood, Cohen, and Weatherly. The first two men have been doing consistent work this year and Weatherly especially is going strong. He is a very husky man and wrestled in several meets last year. Morry Cohen could do some fine work if he would only come out but he has not done any serious practice this year.

Lightweights in Fine Form

In the 135 pounds, there are Dog Norwood, Louis Hosh, and J. O. Richards, all three pretty fair wrestlers. Norwood recently beat Hosh in an elimi-

nation bout and has shown wonderful speed and skill so far. Richards wrestled on the varsity three years ago and is out again but is not in very good trim yet.

The 125 pound class presents Kudtin, Cummings, and Tuttle. Tuttle is favored for this class but is not very available as his work takes up much of his time. The other two have some wrestling in their make-up but are not very consistent at practice.

The hardest class to fill is the 115 pounds. With the loss of Harry Bruner, the class in handicapped but Coyle is trying hard while Loubriel is working regularly and is some husky bird.

Further eliminations will be held very soon so that the Institute will be represented by a well-balanced combination of wrestlers. Practice will be very intense from now on in view of the approaching meets and it is to the interest of every man to show up consistently at least on the days that Coach Burns is here.

The soccer team this year was the most successful team in the soccer history of the Institute. It accomplished two feats hitherto unparalleled which will probably stand out for years to come as a goal for future teams to strive for.

Open at Amherst

The first game of the schedule was played at Amherst with the strong Amherst College aggregation. The Engineer prospects were not rosy before the game to say the least. Amherst had started practice a good two weeks before the Beavers commenced. They also had much more time to devote to the game up there. This team had defeated Harvard already with ease by a score of 2-0.

The Amherst attack failed to get going and the defense crumpled to pieces before the relentless drives of the Engineers.

Clark Game Slow

It won again but speed, co-ordination, and passwork was not nearly so good as that of the day before. The Beavers won this game by a score of 1-0. For the most part the team was content to prevent Clark

from doing any damage.

Then came the Dartmouth game at Hanover. It was a bit of hard luck that the game was played on Field Day since the players had to miss all the fun. Dartmouth had a team that was doing very well in the Inter-Collegiate league. They met their match that day in Technology. For ninety minutes each team struggled to win but neither was able to score. The work of Ruiz rings around the Dartmouth center and missed several shots by very narrow margins.

Team Good Against All-Stars

The next game was with the Chinese All-Stars. The Stars had not made a very good start but in the two weeks preceding the game they seemed to have found themselves. They defeated two or three colleges and seemed to be going strong. That game was the feature game of the season. The Chinese had a fast, clever team but they were completely outclassed. The Beavers got working together in perfect harmony and they ran up the largest score of the season, 3-0.

The season was brought to a triumphant finish by a victory over Worcester Tech. The game itself was a slow, uninteresting one. Aass and Ruiz accounted for the goals. By this victory the Beavers strengthened their claims for the mythical championship of New England considerably. Thus ended the greatest soccer season Technology ever knew.
