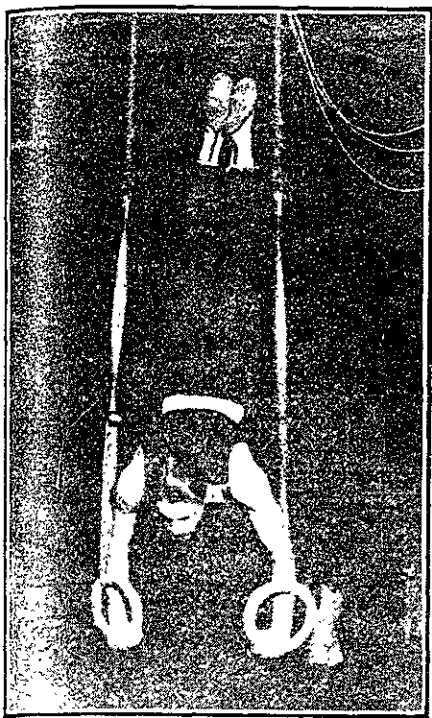

mitted essays in two previous Old South Competitions.

Assumed Name Required

The essays must be submitted before January 15 plainly marked for the Old South Association, Old South Meeting House, Boston 9. Each essay must bear an assumed name and must be accompanied by a sealed envelope having only the assumed name outside. Within the envelope must be the assumed and real name of the writer together with the title of the essay, the writers address, the date of graduation, and the name of the school from which the essayist graduated. The essays should be written on quarto letter paper, on one side of the sheet only, and the sheets must be left flat and not rolled. Essays in order to be considered must be easily legible and none should exceed a length of about eight thousand words. Competitors must submit with their essays a list of authorities and references consulted in the preparation. The award of prizes will be made at the annual observance of Washington's birthday, February 22, 1924, in the Old South Meeting House at 10:30 o'clock.

REVIEW OF FROSH FOOTBALL SEASON

The Yearlings Have Unlucky Season—Tie the Sops on Field Day

Coach Miller Claims That the Frosh Had a Moral Win Over the Sops

October 2 a mass meeting was held in the Hangar Gym in order to help the freshman class organize their field day teams. Short talks were given by the Juniors who were in charge of the various teams. Tom Price '25 gave a short talk on the freshman football team. All candidates were given notice to report at the athletic field Saturday, Oct. 16 at one-thirty.

About 20 men reported for the first practice. Miller '25 was selected to coach the squad. After a short workout on the field the men were given a talk on defence work and tackling by Coach Miller. Regular practice was to begin the following Monday and to continue every day until Field Day.

The men were advised to get their medical examinations as soon as possible. These examinations were necessary before a man could play in any game. Almost all of the men had had previous experience with prep and high school teams.

First Game With Dean

The freshman football team played Dean Academy on Oct. 13. The team had only had about a week's practice and consequently could not be expected to beat the Academy team.

Oct. 20 the team played the General Electric team at Lynn. Although the team played a very good game they could not win because of the other team's superior team work. The frosh had not been playing together long enough to acquire very good team work.

Tries Substitutes

At Field Day came the big test, whether the light but fast team of the entering class could stand up against

the heavier more experienced team representing their opponents. And in spite of the 15 pound handicap the gamy freshmen held off the heavy Sophomore team to a 6 to 6 tie. It was a game cram full of interest and excitement from beginning to end. From the time that the two teams ran out in their brand new red and gray jerseys till the final whistle, the crowd was yelling its head off. Fight they wanted and no one can say that there was any lack of action on the part of the two lower classes.

The desire of each man to win was so great that it was quite evident very early in the game. Carelessness was responsible for both touchdowns. In less than two minutes of play, at the fourth formation, Cargile, right half for the frosh, made a bad fumble on his own 40 yard line and Jewell, the Soph right, gathered it up and rai for a touchdown. The attempt for the goal failed.

More Careful Second Half

This seemed to arouse the freshmen to the fact that great things were expected of them. They plunged repeatedly through their opponents line for five and ten yard gains with astonishing regularity. Finally they had the ball on the Sophomores two yard line. Here both teams became desperate, the Sops to prevent any score on the part of their anxious opponents. Something went wrong and in an attempt to work a fake play the ball was fumbled by the freshmen, the Sops dropping on the ball just in time. The team elected to kick but when the ball was passed the line broke before the frosh and Volante of the class of '27 carried the ball for a touchdown.

The second half saw a much more careful game as both teams realized the futility of depending on the careless playing of their opponents. With the Sophomores plunging through the line and the freshmen passing the ball, many good plays were made. The lighter line of the lower class actually held the much heavier Sophomore team so that they were unable to make any appreciable gains, but the passes, Cargile to Giles, almost always netted 15 to 20 yards.

As a whole the Sophomore team gave the impression of lack of practice. While individually the line was strong they could not work together to best advantage and as a result the lighter team was able to make gains almost at will.

FIRST DORM DANCE TO BE INFORMAL AFFAIR

The dormitories begin their social activities of the second term with a dance next Friday evening at 8:30 o'clock in Walker Memorial. This one will be informal and will have Billy Lossez and his twelve piece orchestra.

Following the plan of having two informal and one formal dance each term this will represent one of the two informal dances for the second term. The affair will be over at 12 as is customary for them. The specialty act which has been procured for the evening is a Specialty Toe Dance. The committee promise plenty of fun for all. Ticket sale begins Monday in the Main Lobby from 12 to 2 o'clock. They will be \$2 for outside men and 50 cents less for dorm men.

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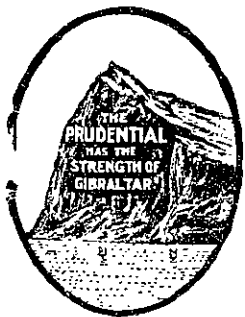
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
