present, leaving \$85,000 to be raised by February 1, if the Institute is to receive the benefit of the duPont offer.

Donation for Infirmary

President Stratton also announced in his report of the important activities of the past year that friends of the Institute have offered to provide a suitable hospital and infirmary under certain conditions that he believed would be acceptable to Technology. The President said that he believed such a building would fill a distinct need at the Institute.

He also reported that the Department of Biology and Public Health had received an offer to conduct a nationwide investigation for the government that would undoubtedly bring Technology into the public eye in a most desirable manner. He also stated that a pamphlet was being published that would be of great help to those young men about to choose a career in giving them accurate information of Technology and what it offered them. He said that he believed many young men had misconceived ideas of Technology who perhaps were future students. He told the Alumni that they should try and correct this feeling and let them know that Technology was not "just a sweat shop," but that the students were also offered the advantages of nearly every type of college activity.

He then spoke of the future and said that the "most important need is more dormitories." He outlined how the new tract of land would help in the placing of new dormitories as well as giving room for large physical laboratories that could handle the different types of experiments given, them regardless of size. Also he said that a large auditorium was badly needed, as well as new architectural buildings.

Outlines Department Problems

President Stratton also outlined the big problems that faced some of the various departments at the Institute. The Civil Engineering Department has the important question of frame structures, and the steadily growing demand for larger structures of all kinds. Also the necessity of developing large airplane bodies is getting much attention.

The Mechanical Engineering Department is working on automobile engineering, and especially on the Diesel and other types of oil engines. This department has received a request from the Mechanical Engineering Society to undertake a very serious test of gears, and are going to use the Wilfred Lewis method of testing. Mr. Lewis is a graduate of the Institute of the class of '76, President Stratton announced.

He also announced the establishment of the summer camp by the Department of Geology and Mining, which experienced many hardships at first, but which are now in excellent condition.

The Electrical Department is faced with the growing problems of power transmission, he said, and were also connected closely with the developments that are taking place in electrical communication.

The first game is scheduled for January 19 so that the team should be fairly well organized by then. The rest of the schedule follows in close order and presents a very interesting aspect.

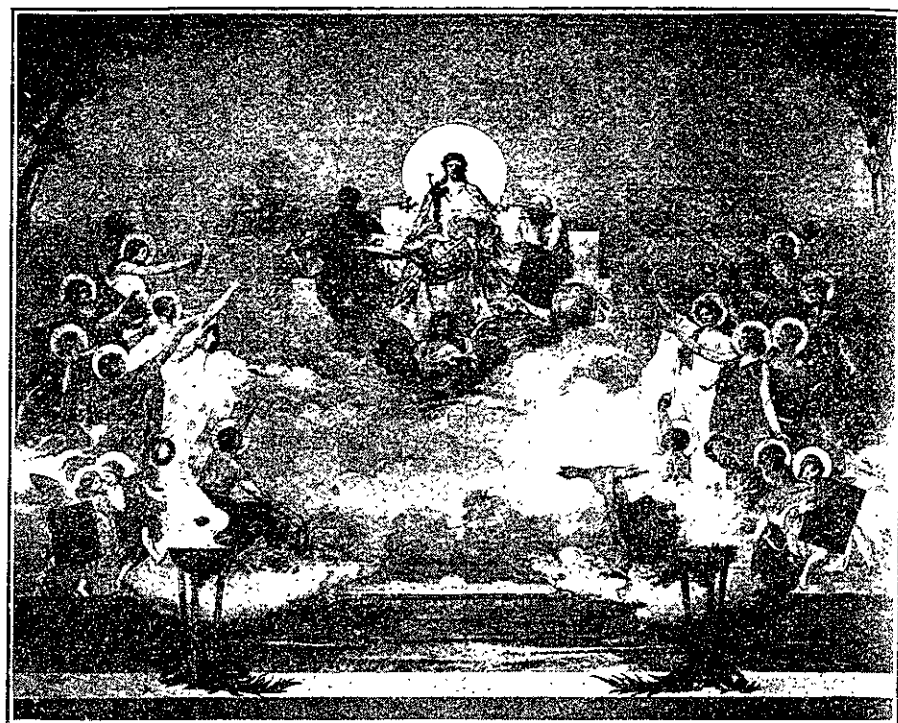
Team Has No Coach

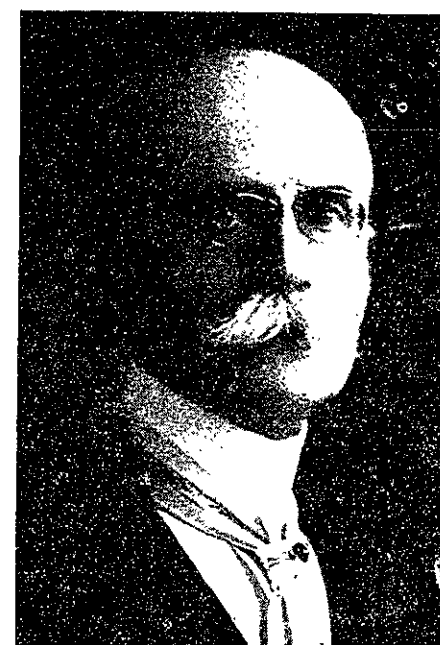
STUDENTS INVITED TO ATTEND Y.W.C.A. DANCE

BLASHFIELD PAINTING UNVEILED AT BANQUET

Mr. Collier supplied only with a piece of charcoal and some large sheets of paper proceeded to cartoon the prominent men present. Among those cartooned were President Stratton, Senator Moses, and Mr. Gilmore, whose exaggerated facial expressions kept the audience in an uproar.

There were only three regular speakers on the program: President Stratton, Dr. A. W. Rowe '01, and Senator Moses of New Hampshire. President Stratton gave a resume of the most important forward steps of the Institute in the past year, and a summary of the improvement demands in the immediate future.

Dr. Stratton Praises Activities

In speaking of student body and its government at Technology he said, "I do not believe there is a student body that is better governed by the students than Technology's. Questions that have arisen in all cases have been satisfactorily handled by the students."

Then going on with a discussion of students he stated, "Activity experience is one of the greatest advantages that the students have. There is an impression that our students, rather technical men as a whole, are trained to deal with only materials. My experience is that technical training is the very best for developing leadership."

Speaking of the activities of the alumni he carried out the statement made previously by toastmaster Gilmore that "all the Alumni have been called upon to do in past years is to put their hands in their pockets for money. Now the Alumni are called upon to give service."

New Scholarships Created

The President said, "Mr. Dennison and myself have never mentioned funds to the Alumni in our recent visits. However, Alumni should be on the lookout for those men wanting to make one of the best investments that can be made."

"It is not always our job to ask Alumni to raise funds. The Alumni are anxious for something to do. One of the jobs of the Alumni is representing the Institute as a prospective school to future students. Scholarships are one of the best means of publicity that we can have. Many of the Alumni Associations in different cities are planning to establish scholarships. Two have already been established. One by St. Louis and one in Worcester here in Massachusetts."

Dr. Rowe followed President Strat-

ton and talked on "Student Activities." "The difference between our student government and other governments is that we know that we are right," he said. "Our principal has been; students should run their own show."

He then gave a synopsis of the various student activities. In speaking of athletics he said, "The situation was chaotic in the olden days, especially with athletics. However, Frank Briggs '81, laid a sound foundation on which we have been able to build our present athletic situation."

And speaking of the present, "With thirty teams expending a total budget of thirty thousand dollars Technology can surely not be accused of commercialized athletics."

Senator Moses in his address outlined his stand in taxation, and told of the problems the country was facing in this respect. He also complimented the Institute as a seat of learning, and said it was to be congratulated upon having obtained the mural decoration for Walker.

Taxation System Condemned

He continued by saying "I first want to extend to you my congratulations that the Massachusetts Institute of Technology stands to me as a great institution of learning still holding the high tradition of a place that is hard to enter and easy to exit."

"In speaking" he continued "of the magnificent mural decoration that has this evening been unveiled, we are led to another work of art, the taxation system of the United States in which we live and have our being. I happen to be the one member of the Majority that spoke and voted against it. As long as Congress is allowed to run riot with its appropriations, so long we will have this system of taxation, and so long as we have this system of taxation, Congress will run riot with its appropriations."

He then commented on the new school of thought that was now coming forth and appealing to the Technology Biology professors to bear him out, he said, "This new school is like the mule, without pride of ancestry and, thank God, without hope of posterity."

"Have you ever thought how the average working man of the country arises in the morning, gets into his clothes which have been standardized by a paid government official, rides to work in a trolley whose fare has been set by a paid public officer, arrives at the factory laid out by a paid federal officer and paid a wage standardized by paid government officers and finally at night lays down in a bed chosen from a standard pamphlet issued by some bureau in Washington."

Lauds Mellon and Coolidge

"These devour the substance of the people and make necessary the complicated and all too burdensome taxation system which exists."

"Under Mellon's leadership and a New England President" he continued, "we are offered a choice between the unjust system of taxation and a system devised to get those untapped sources of revenue of the boundless wealth of the United States. Upon you lies the power of how your representative in Congress will act on this question and up the right decision rests the fate of the nation."

The Senator then cited how the United States has been a power for right and justice in the world and has been enabled to assist other nations both humanly and financially in the cause for humanity. Then with comments on how New England has been a similar power in the United States, he concludes with "I am seeking only to make you believe that because we have helped to build up other parts of the country we must not permit them through false and misconceived legislation to pull us down."
