

BASKETBALL TEAM TO PLAY AGAINST HARVARD TONIGHT

Varsity Squad Expects To
Find Crimson Game a
Hard Fight

CAPTAIN COOK STILL OUT OF THE LINEUP

Sore Knee Prevents Star
Forward From Playing
in Tonight's Game

Technology will have a far harder time of it tonight when it meets Harvard on the Crimson floor than it had against Northeastern in the game Saturday. The Crimson has played several more games than we have and with good success. Their lineup includes Captain Gordon, who caused the Engineers quite a bit of trouble in the games between the two colleges last year, and Jim Crombs, football star of last season.

The Beavers, starting with the same lineup that faced Northeastern, will themselves present no weak team. Captain Stan Cook's knee is better, but it is still bothering him enough so that he will not start in tonight's game.

Johnson Faces Combs

It is not expected that Johnson will have as easy a time getting the jump on Combs, the Harvard center, as he did against Urquhart of Northeastern. He is a faster man, however, and will be able to present as good a brand of basketball.

Davidson will be the guard playing opposite the Crimson captain. He is equally good on offensive and defensive play and should be able to keep Harvard's best potential scorer well covered.

Next to Davidson and Cook, Ruff is the best man that Technology has in the matter of getting points and he is counted on to do some good work. Simonds, his running mate, is not as good under the basket but he is a good passer and is indirectly responsible for many of his team-mates opportunities to score.

Meet Harvard But Once

Usually there are two games during the season, but this year the team will meet the Crimson only once and that is tonight. The two teams are nearly always evenly matched, breaking even

FINES CONTINUE TO HELP ENRICH THE INSTITUTE

Less Money from Fines Collected
This Year However Than
for Last Year

USUAL NUMBER APPEAL TO HAVE FINE REBATED

The fine system continues to net the Institute a tidy profit although Bursar Ford believes that the men are now "getting on to themselves." One thousand eight hundred dollars have been collected so far this term for various offenses from 360 men. As has been the case in previous terms about 50 men who believe their fines were unjustly levied have appealed to the Committee on Remission of Registration Fees to have their fines rebated.

This committee, which consists of the Dean, Registrar and Bursar, considers the appeal and, if it believes the assessment unjust, recommends that the fine be remitted. Generally about one quarter of those who appeal are successful. Two favorite excuses offered are that the registration material was deposited in an Institute mail box on time but was not delivered and that a check was mailed but was delayed in transit.

The Bursar does not believe that the students realize the "bargain rate" they are offered in fines. Here a man is subject to a \$5 fine for any of three offenses: failure to turn in registration material on time, failure to pay tuition on time, and failure to obtain class cards on time. If he is guilty of all three offenses he must pay only \$5, and if he does one of these things a

Issue Filled With Articles of
General Interest to
Student Body

The Tech Engineering News for January containing many articles of general interest to the student body appears on sale today. The feature articles, one on the History of the Society of Arts, the forerunner of the Institute of today and the accounts of the two recent Aldred lectures along with several interesting technical articles render the issue for this month very interesting as well as instructive.

The "History of the Society of Arts" by Prof. H. M. Goodwin, one of the articles of the Technology series, gives a comprehensive account of the early account of the early history of the Institute when Prof. William B. Rogers was President. Professor Goodwin's account of the meetings of the Society twice a month, of the presentation of lectures on different technical subjects, one of them delivered by Alexander Graham Bell on "Telephony" or the Telegraphing of Music Sounds, which is believed to be the first public demonstration of the telephone, shows the activity of the Society in fostering scientific developments. The two Aldred lectures one on the "Development of Lighting and Power Services in a Great City" by John W. Lieb and the other an account of the "Curious Adventures of a Tech Graduate" by William E. Nickerson '76, provide an opportunity to the undergraduates who did not have a chance to hear the lectures themselves to read them at length. Among the technical articles is one on the "Hydro-electric Power Plants of California" which gives an interesting review of water power development and another on the "Refining a Tunnel without Interrupting Traffic," which are especially interesting accounts.

HOCKEY SEXTET MEETS HARVARD TEAM AT ARENA

Tonight's Game Promises Good
Exhibition of First
Class Hockey

TEAM STRENGTHENED BY FLYNN'S RETURN

Peene Expected to Pierce the
Harvard Defense With
Flying Attacks

The Boston Arena is set for a big fight tonight at 8:15 o'clock, when the Harvard and Technology hockey teams clash. With Massey and Peene at their accustomed places and with the return of Flynn, the Institute will be represented by a crack squad of puck-pushers who will be on their toes from the whistle. Harvard herself has no slouch of a team which all goes to show that there will be action and plenty of it tonight. Between halves, so as to ease the strain, the Maples will meet the Boston Hockey Club, furnishing another exhibition of first class hockey.

Flynn on the Defense

The Harvard players will find it difficult to pass Connie Flynn who has appeared in hockey circles after a year's absence. In the game with West Point last year, Flynn suffered a bad cut on his arm which prevented him from playing in any of the following games. This year, however, he is back with all his old time pep and is expected to show some great stuff in tonight's game.

Most of the new men are putting across some fine work and the last few practices have raised Technology's prospects to a considerable extent. Locke, on the defense, and Wiessner, Randall, and Niles as wings will furnish a strong support and will have a pretty sure chance of placing at some time in the game. Locke, especially is anxious to get in and chew up the other team because after this game he will be ineligible for some time.

Men in Good Condition

Captain Denton Massey and Deignan have been picked for goals but nothing definite can be said as to what the final choice will be. It is expected that everybody will be placed sooner or later in the game so that the choice of the opening lineup has been left until sometime today.

On the defense, Locke, Flynn, Putnam, and MacPherson will probably be the mainstays, with Flynn, at least, sure of a position in the opening lineup.

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COMMISSIONS IN ARMY FOR TECHNOLOGY MEN
