

HOCKEY AND BASKETBALL GO TO CRIMSON

Crimson Hockey Squad Wins Easily from Tech

Engineers Are Outclassed as Opponents Gain 7-0 Shutout in Arena Game Wednesday

Outplayed and outclassed the Technology hockey team went down to defeat before the Harvard sextet Wednesday night to the tune of 7 to 0. The game at the arena served to afford a large sized crowd considerable amusement but it could hardly be classed as hockey.

Lack of sufficient practice was apparent on the Beaver squad. The men showed an idea of teamwork only for short and widely separated periods. Several of the men, notably Jerry Dalton and Dave Peene, showed that they could skate and carry a puck, but they did not have a shadow of a chance against the superior Crimson squad.

Massey Does Well

The goal-tending of Dent Massey was excellent. It had to be to keep the score even at 7 to 0. By far the greater part of the time the puck was in the neighborhood of the Beaver goal. Massey made in the neighborhood of 70 stops during the course of the game. Some of them were difficult ones that drew rounds of applause from the audience.

For the Crimson, Beals and Chase probably did the best work. They both registered in the scoring column, proving a real menace to the Beavers when they were in the neighborhood of their goal. The Crimson goal tends, Cummings and Bradford, had no real chance to show what they could do as they were called upon to ward off the disc only about seven times during the game.

Use Three-Man Defense

From the initial face-off Technology adopted a three-man defense, which they stuck to during the greater period of play. During the first period it seemed to work as far as preventing Harvard from scoring was concerned, but it meant that the puck stayed almost continually in Beaver territory. There were many fierce scrimmages in front of Dent Massey's preserve, a number of which nearly resulted in tallies for the Crimson.

The Beavers played a cautious, defensive game, with Harvard continually on the offensive. The Crimson played a two-man, and at times a one-man, defense. They penetrated the Beaver line again and again only to have the puck blocked and warded off by goaltend Massey.

Beals Scores for Crimson

After three or four minutes of play, Beals of the Crimson at last succeeded in slipping the disc past Massey. It was stopped just over the line, close enough to arouse considerable argument before the point was finally awarded. During the rest of the period the Technology defense line held. Dalton and McPherson went down once and penetrated to the Crimson cage but without scoring. This was practically the only serious threat that the Crimson had to encounter during the period.

Nearly half of the second period passed before Harvard again scored. The puck still kept to Beaver territory and Massey was forced to make a number of good stops to prevent a score. Once, with the puck directly in front of and about three feet away from the goal two face-offs were called in succession. The game then more resembled football than hockey, both teams packing in close around the puck. Finally the disc was shot out from the mob and Technology again narrowly escaped being scored upon. The respite was for but a few minutes, however. Beals, coming down the ice alone, successfully passed the Beaver defense and took a shot at the cage that Massey was unable to stop.

Harvard Scores Often

With this Harvard seemed to take a new lease on life. The Technology squad was kept in front of their goal with their hands full, the Crimson outskating them and checking the puck before it travelled to the middle of

ILLNESS STOPS GREER FROM ENTERING BOUTS

Hereford to Take on Unlimited Class in Absence of Capt. Greer

The varsity wrestling squad will start its season tonight with the Boston Young Men's Christian Union in a meet that promises to be a good exhibition of all-around wrestling. Technology beat this team last year by a very few points and the contest this year promises to be as close for the B. Y. M. C. U. has substantially the same team. Opinion as to the outcome favors the Beaver team because what few changes there are in this year's squad indicate a stronger team than at the beginning of last year's season.

Hereford in Unlimiteds

Since the first of the year, there have been few candidates for the heavyweight division. But one man, Coleman, has signified any intention of competing for this position on the varsity and since a few weeks he has not had any serious practice. Thus, there is an open position on the varsity which is waiting for the right man to come and step in. This is an unusual opportunity for a new man to place in the coming meets as a varsity man.

In the meantime, it has been decided that the Institute team will not forfeit the bout in this class tonight. Rock Hereford has offered to enter this bout and, though he is a regular 158 pound man, he is fully capable of handling the unlimited section. Otherwise, in the event of a forfeit, Technology would lose five points. Rock will be up against a man considerably bigger than himself but this should not have any effect on his usual style of rip and tear grappling that won him the N. E. Intercollegiate and N. E. Amateur championships in the 158 pound class last year. With this remarkable record, Hereford can be expected to hold his own in the unlimiteds.

Captain Greer Ill

Captain Fred Greer has been ill all this week and it is not expected that he will enter in the meet tonight. The only serious effect this will have will be to shove Hereford from the 158 pound class into the unlimiteds. Greer is a 178 pound man who also places in the heavyweight class and he was to enter this class tonight. Hereford, however, is fully capable of handling things.

To replace Greer in the 175 pound division, Kennett appears to be the first choice as Capt. Greer had to work pretty hard in an elimination bout recently to down him. With Kennett in this class, and another crackerjack, Bowles, in the 158 pound class, the heavy bouts will be well taken care of. Bowles is a man that has been coming up rapidly. He was on the freshman team two years ago and this year has shown some fine work.

145 Pounds of Interest

By far the most hotly contested bout will be that in the 145 pound division and some first class wrestling is promised. Lockwood has been coming strong this year and his record in several meets last year shows him to be a dependable wrestler. He is a husky, fast grappler and is in especially fine condition. He is matched against the best man on the opponents' team, George Myerson, who is a National Amateur Champion. Myerson is a man who has considerable renown in the wrestling world and his presence alone is a great drawing card anywhere.

Dag Norwood in the 135 pounds has shown wonderful speed and skill in practice bouts and is pretty confident of winning his bout. It will take a pretty swift man to get the best of him. The men in the lighter classes are phenomenally fast boys. Kurtin, in the 125, and Coyle, in the 115 pound classes are pretty certain to net points in each bout. Coyle, especially, is a wiry, well-built grappler and wrestles with more pep than a dynamo.

The meet is to begin at 8 o'clock and will be held in the hangar gymnasium. Admission will be free to all holders of the undergraduate dues receipt card and reserved seats will also be on sale at 50 cents. The reserved section is on the right of the entrance to the gym and the small price charged will be well worth paying as the bout will be held in front of this stand.

The game will not be a double header as the frosh will play their game in enemy territory. Following the contest there will be a dance in the gym for which a slight admission will be charged.

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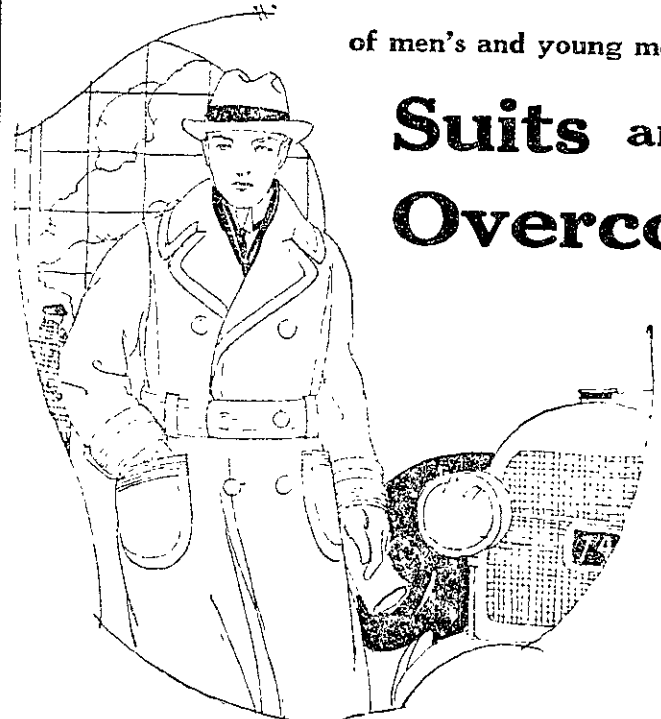
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
