14 COLLEGES IN STUDENT MEETING

Conference for Discussion Social Matters Will Last Three Days

Boston and Cambridge are to be the scene of the New England Student Conference, which starts today and runs through Sunday. Most of the meetings are being held at the Harvard Students' Liberal Club.

The purpose of this conference is stated to be "to arouse discussion on Social and Industrial questions." The speakers at the various meetings include Roger N. Baldwin, Director of the American Civil Liberties Union; Stuart Chase, Director of the Labor Bureau; Norman Thomas, Editor of The World of Tomorrow and Chairman of the Executive Committee of the League for Industrial Democracy; and Professor J. M. Carroll, Head of the Department of Economics at Bates College.

On Saturday evening, at 8 o'clock the last two men will take part in a debate on Socialism. A delegation from the Speakers' Club will represent the Institute at the meetings. New England Colleges are to have delegations present, including Amherst, Dartmouth, Simmons, Yale, Wellesley and Harvard.

The address of the Harvard Liberal Club is 66 Winthrop Street, Cambridge. Any Institute men interested may attend the meetings, all of which are free except the Friday evening one, which includes a dinner and costs 90 cents.

No Circus This Year

The deliberations of the Executive Committee at their meeting, previous to the Institute Committee meeting, were read and accepted as read. Under this constitution of the Combined Musical Clubs was accepted, the Technology Circus was made a bi-annual affair, approval was given to the convocation to sponsor athletics, and the Field Day Committee's reports were accepted.

The Technology Circus will therefore not be held this year, but according to one ruling will appear next year. This measure will perhaps meet with ardent disapproval of the students for it was one of the few occasions at which Technology men can get together and have a good time. In the words of A. D. Carothers '24, "it was not thought practical to hold the circus this year."

The absentees were R. W. Head '26, C. A. Bianchi '26, J. E. Jagger '24, C. P. Dunleavy '24, W. H. R. Cooper '27 and E. H. Dodge '27.

The most intensive discussion, with the exception of the Prohibition Conference, was occasioned by the fact that M. A. MacDuffie '25 is carrying activities to a total of 11 points, which is one point in excess of the number regularly allowed one man by the Institute Committee. At present MacDuffie is a member of the Boat-House committee as well as a candidate for Literary Editor of Technique.

A motion was finally passed to require MacDuffie to resign from either one of the two positions which he now holds.

Action was taken on the absence of F. A. Bianchi '26 from the last two meetings and according to the constitution he automatically loses his seat as a member of the Committee.

A motion introduced by George Swartz, '24, appointing Field Day managers, was passed. The men selected are E. C. Van Blarcom '26, tug-of-war, and L. B. Copley '26, relay.

our adhesion to the Permanent Court under four conditions or reservations, one of which was that the United States should officially participate in the election of judges by the Assembly and Council of that League, sitting as electoral colleges for that purpose.

Unofficial cooperation from the United States with the work of the League includes membership in five of the social welfare commissions or committees of the League, in one on economic reconstruction, and in one (Aaland Islands) which averted a war. American women serve as expert Assessors upon the Opium and Traffic in Women Commissions.

Two philanthropic agencies in the United States have between them pledged more than \$400,000 to support either the work of the Epidemics Commission or the League inquiry into conditions of the traffic in women and children.

How Can Increasing Cooperation Between the United States and the Organized World be Secured?

The United States being already so far committed to united councils with League agencies for the common social welfare, all of which have some bearing upon the preservation of world peace, the question before us may take this form:

How can increasing cooperation between the United States and the organized world for the promotion of peace and security be assured, in form acceptable to the people of the United States and hopefully practicable?

The United States Can Extend Its Present Cooperation With the League's Social Welfare Activities

Without any change in its present policy, already described, the United States Government could, first, show its willingness to cooperate similarly with the other humane and reconstructive agencies of the League. To four of these agencies that Government has already sent delegates with advisory powers. It could as properly accept invitations to accredit members with like powers to each one of the other welfare commissions. It has already received invitations from two of the latter.

It is, secondly, immediately practicable to extend the same kind of cooperation, whenever asked to do it, so as to include participation in the work of the commissions and technical committees of the Labor Organization. The record shows that such cooperation is already begun.

The single common purpose of all these committees is the collection and study of information, on which may be based subsequent recommendations for national legislation.

All conventions and resolutions, recommended by the first three congresses of the International Labor Organization, have already been laid before the Senate of the United States and, without objection, referred to the appropriate committee. No different procedure would have been followed if the United States were a member of the Labor Organization of the League.

An Immediate Step Is Adherence to the Permanent Court

An immediately practicable step is, thirdly, the Senate's approval of the proposal that the United States adhere to the Permanent Court of International Justice for the reasons and under the conditions stated by Secretary Hughes and President Harding in February, 1923.

These three suggestions for increasing cooperation with the family of nations are in harmony with policies already adopted by our Government, and in the last case with a policy so old and well recognized that it may now be called traditional.

They do not involve a question of membership in the League of Nations as now constituted, but it cannot be denied that they lead to the threshold of that question. Any further step toward cooperation must confront the problem of direct relations between the United States and the Assembly and Council of fifty-four nations in the League.*

In Actual Operation the League Employs No Force

The practical experience of the League during its first three and a half years of life has not only wrought out, in a group of precedents, the beginnings of what might be called the constitutional law of the League, but it has also shifted the emphasis in activities of the League and foreshadowed important modifications in its constitution the Covenant.

CRIMSON HOCKEY SQUAD WINS EASILY FROM TECH

the field. Finally Chase made an attempt that it looked as if Massey would stop. The Beaver goal-tend, however, fell when his skate ran over a loosened strap and the disc passed him.

At this point the Crimson seemed to think that they had a sufficient margin of safety and several substitutes were sent out on the ice. Technology was given a slight advantage when Howe was sent off the ice for two minutes. They did go down the ice several times but unavailing shots at the Crimson goal. The Harvard man returned to the game and half a minute later made the last Crimson score of the period. The defense men were lured to one side, a shot across the rink gave Howe the puck and he sent it waist high into the net. The period ended with Harvard in possession of the substantial lead of 5 to 0.

Tech Changes Tactics

In the third period Technology for a large part of the time abandoned the three-man defense and made numerous attempts at the crimson goal. For awhile the puck divided its time equally between the two territories, neither side making threats that proved very dangerous.

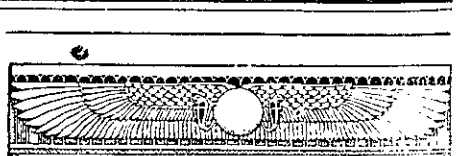
Hodder of Harvard finally broke through the Technology defense and scored on a short shot that was next to impossible to stop. After that Massey had a temporary respite, while the puck took an unaccustomed jaunt in crimson territory. The team seemed to get together and for a few minutes gave an exhibition of fairly good hockey. The Harvard goalie had to make two good stops before the Crimson again assumed the offensive. Massey made an almost impossible stop when two Crimson men penetrated to in front of the goal but failed the next minute when Martin slipped a short, hard shot past him. The puck struck the edge of his skate, hit a side post of the cage and went in.

Technology again assumed the offensive but failed to score on a short shot. Time was called just after Dent Massey had turned aside another Harvard attack.
