

COACH RAINNIE COMES TO TECH WELL QUALIFIED

New Hockey Mentor Has Had
Wide Experience on
Canadian Teams

WAS AT MCGILL TWO
YEARS BEFORE HERE

The new hockey coach to replace Coach Blacklock, D. J. Rainnie, comes to the Institute with many years of hockey experience behind him. While in high school in New Brunswick he played on hockey squads there. Going to Mount Allison University he made the varsity, playing a wing position, and later working on the defense. In 1916 he left the University to join the Canadian Army, playing on regimental teams while in the service. Upon his return from overseas he again went to Mount Allison. He played goal there on their championship team of 1919.

Coached at Mount Allison
Leaving the University he went to Mount Allison Academy in the capacity of coach. He was mentor there when Mount Allison won the inter-province championship of their class.

From coach he returned to the capacity of student, spending two years at McGill. As he had lost his amateur standing he was unable to play on the team there, but he did act in the capacity of assistant coach.

He had just left McGill when an opening presented itself here at Technology. Rainnie has played with and against some of the best men in local and Canadian hockey circles. He has played on the same teams as Ike Fisher, of the Maples and against Dunn of the same organization. He played against Campbell of B. A. A. fame while they both were students in Canada.

VARSITY BOXING SQUAD IN NEED OF CANDIDATES

Team Faces Serious Problem
With No Men for the
Heavyweights

MOLL MAY BE FORCED
TO CEASE ALL BOXING

The varsity boxing squad is in serious need of men at the present time, especially in the heavyweight class. With the boxing season but two weeks away, there is a crying need for boxers in almost every class. With the loss of Al Lindsay, the 115 pound class is in a bad fix, though Schultz is trying to make this weight.

Lindsay has a great amount of work to do this year and has been forced to give up boxing for some time. His loss will seriously affect the team as Lindsay was a consistent point-getter. Schultz, has several pounds to take off before he can place in the 115 pounds, but he expects to be able to before the season opens. With Captain Bob Smith in the 125 pound division, the lighter weights will be well taken care of.

Heavier Classes Lack Men
There are few men out for either the 135 or the 145 pound divisions. Ed Moll has been the mainstay of the 145 pound class, but owing to injuries received last year, it is doubtful if he will be able to box right away. He has been doing light practice work lately, consisting mostly of road work. In the event of his not being able to box, the team will face a hard problem in replacing him.

The 160 pound class has Konrisky who is shaping up finely, giving promise of showing some crack boxing before long. There are no 175 pound men at all, while at this time of the year there should be a great number. At the beginning of the year there was a good number of candidates in every class, but the number has dwindled down to almost nothing, due to the effects of Votus IX among other things. The leather-pushers need men and need them badly so that there is a good opportunity for any man with some knowledge of boxing to come out and place on a varsity team within a short time.

Captain Stan Cook watched the game against Brown from the sidelines. Stan was on crutches, which doesn't speak too well for his chances of getting back into the game soon.

Hugh Nickle is back into harness again. The former Tech hockey star played a good game at goal for the P.A.A. team when they met at New Haven last Friday night.

The loss of Haertl was instrumental in the cub basketball defeat. He was the surest point getter that the yearlings had. He took the trip with the frosh but the decision of his ineligibility from the Dean's office prevented him from playing.

BROWN WINS FROM VARSITY QUINTET BY 33-27 SCORE

Early Lead Not Enough to
Secure Victory for
Engineers

BROWN SHOWS BETTER
CLASS OF TEAMWORK

Getting off to a good start that netted them a lead of seven points by the middle of the first half the Beaver varsity nevertheless fell before the Bruin quintette 33-27 in an exciting game Saturday night in the hangar gym. The Brown lads showed an excellent knowledge of the passing game. Few of their shots were long. Counting on their superior handling of the ball they strove for short shots from under the basket.

The Engineers played hard. They were aggressive and started numberless attacks against the Providence basket, but they were unable to hang on to the ball, many opportunities for scoring being lost in this manner.

Davidson managed to gather more points than any other man on the floor. His total of fourteen was imposing, but he made most of his shots from the middle of the floor instead of trying to advance the ball by teamwork.

Simonds played a good steady game at forward. While not spectacular he is one of the best passers on the Beaver squad. Forrester, substituting at left forward, played a good game for the period that he was in. He is a green player but is fast developing into first calibre material.

Brown assumed the lead at the start by virtue of two free throws, both going through the hoop. The game started out at a fast pace. Really first class basketball was not displayed but the game was hard fought and not a little rough.

A free throw and a basket by Davidson threw the lead in the other direction. Danzell, at center, and Lathrop, at left forward, each contributed towards Brown. Lankton, sinking a short shot after a good bit of teamwork, and Simonds, taking a long shot from near the center of the floor, made the score 7-6 favor of the Beavers. The score was tied with a free throw. Davidson made good both chances to score on free throws and then sank two baskets, both of them long shots.

At this time Brown threw in five substitutes, changing her entire lineup. Brown made one free throw and the Beavers two and the Providence outfit started on their long spurt that gave them the game. The subs seemed to be able to score better than the Brown varsity. Starting a minute before the end of the half, Hayes, Brown forward, made four baskets in half a minute. ENGINEER RIFLES DEFEAT HARVARD

Institute Rifle Team Has Fine
Record—Has Defeated
All Opponents

The Engineer rifle team has started the new year by adding one more to their already increasing list of victories. The Beaver team remains undefeated after their third match of this season by defeating Harvard in a dual match which ended last Saturday afternoon. In their first engagement Technology shot a perfect score of 500 against the University of Maine. Three weeks ago 496 was sufficient to put B.U. out of the way. Saturday proud Harvard also had to look to Engineer skill to the tune of 499 to 490. This is a creditable showing and our rifle team deserves praise for being the only Institute activity which has outclassed Harvard this season.

Individual scores for Technology were as follows: Capt. D. M. Creveling '24, 99; H. C. Cuthbertson '24, 100; E. D. Murphy '25, 100; J. H. Fielding '25, 100; E. M. Holmes '25, 100. Each team used its own range. The next match comes off in New York, Saturday, January 19. It is to be an intercollegiate shoulder to shoulder match, M.I.T. will shoot first again ten other colleges.

The freshmen rifle team ended its match with the University of Nebraska last Friday afternoon with an average score of 249 out of a possible 400. Their opponents score will not be available for a few days as results are forwarded by mail. The men showed a need for more practice, especially in the standing, kneeling and sitting positions. Manager R. W. Johnson states that their poor showing was due to a decided lack of men turning out for practice. These

meets cover a period of about a week, ten men are allowed to shoot, but only the five best scores are counted; in this last meet only six men turned out. Any freshmen interested in this activity should see Major Pendleton or the manager immediately.

On the other hand it seemed that whenever Dean got possession of the ball they could carry it right down the floor to the cubs basket. They were not nearly as accurate in shooting as the frosh. They were about twenty pounds heavier per man and were more adept in passing the ball than their opponents.

Dean Gets Big Lead

The Franklin team piled up a lead of 33 points during the first half. All through this period they seemed to be able to score at will. The frosh backs were powerless to stop them. The freshman team were fighting hard, but they did not have the skill that their opponents had, who were getting twice as many chances to score as the frosh.

WRESTLERS WIN OVER B.Y.M.C.U. IN CLOSE MEET

HEREFORD ROBBED OF

The varsity wrestling team successfully opened its season Friday evening by winning over the Boston Young Men's Christian Union, the final score being 16 to 13. It was a good, close meet with each team gaining the advantage during the evening only to lose it in another bout. Rock Hereford's victory over his opponent in the last bout of all gave Technology the deciding points.

The meet started off with the 115 pound division in which Westhaver from B. Y. M. C. U. wrestled Coyle. Both men lost no time in getting started and things were lively for the first few moments in which Coyle had a slight disadvantage. But he made a fine getaway from Westhaver and then took the initiative himself, securing a fall at the end of two minutes and 56 seconds, by a chancery and wrist-lock.

Although not over 75 students viewed the bout, yet these few were wild with applause as Coyle left the mat. This is Coyle's second year of wrestling and he has made good as a game little man. By taking the aggressive at the right moment, he took advantage of his opponents inattention and won the bout.

Advantage Wavers

Although the 115 pound bout netted the Institute team five points, this lead was not held very long as the next bout in the 125 pounds between Kurtin and Rapoport was given to the latter after Kurtin was forced to withdraw because of an injured arm. The bout opened with each man exerting himself to get things over in quick time. The first few minutes showed no advantage to either man although Rapoport occasionally showed some good bursts of speed that got him out of difficulty more than once. But after three minutes and 15 seconds of wrestling Kurtin was thrown heavily by Rapoport and was unable to proceed with the bout as his left arm pained him severely. It was thought that he had fractured it but a short examination showed it to be a serious strain but without fracture. Kurtin was certainly unlucky as far as that goes for he was rapidly overcoming Rapoport's speed and was gaining the advantage when his accident arrived.

Opponents Assume Lead

The next two bouts went to the opposing team one by a decision and the other by straight fall putting them eight points to the good. In the 145 pound bout, Wuoti won the decision over Joe Lockwood by a time advantage of 7:26 minutes. Lockwood fought gamely to overcome a great advantage of weight that Wuoti had. The latter

Locke Barred

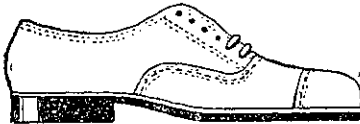
