### ADVERTISING WORK IS ALMOST ALL FINISHED

With the inauguration of their new system of obtaining men by competition rather than by election, the management of Technique 1925 announces that the organization is more efficient than ever before and consequently is ready for the sign-up campaign which starts today. Plans for the production of the volume are also rapidly materializing.

The campaign will continue throughout the week with sign-ups selling at \$1 and redeemable for \$2.50 in the first week in March. Those in charge of the campaign are also planning to reach several of Alumni Clubs throughout the country and expect to thereby increase the circulation of the publication.

E. C. Booth '25, who is in charge of the photographs being made for the volume, announces that all photos must be in by February 1. 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reducing the oxides with hydrogen gas. The oxides of iron, cobalt and nickel were obtained by precipitation while that of molybdenum was gotten by treating a solution of ammonium molybdate with nitric acid. Dr. Larsen's talk was illustrated by a number of slides which showed the relative value of each of these metals as a commercial catalyst.

The last paper read was by Professor C. J. Fink of Columbia University on the "Electrolytic-Catalytic Production of Oxygen." Professor Fink pointed out, during the course of his talk, the difference between electrolytic and chemical corrosion and said that many chemists fail to recognize the distinguishing features of each of these chemical reactions.

A discussion followed the reading of each of the papers in which any member of the audience was free to join.

In the second half the Bruins still further increased their advantage. By dint of close guarding the Beavers were prevented from scoring during the first half of the period. Six baskets and one free throw were stacked against them before the Engineers got under way. A short shot from under the basket by Simonds started them going. A free throw and then another basket by Simonds made the score 29-20 favor of Brown. Davidson annexed two baskets and a free throw and Eager a basket, while Brown added three points to their total. After a few minutes of hard playing Brown grabbed off another point on a free throw and then started a system of merely passing the ball from man to man to use up the remaining two minutes of play without giving Technology further chance to score.

The Beavers, not daring to bring Lankton up from his position near the opponents basket had some difficulty in breaking up this method of stalling and had two or three unsuccessful tries at the basket before the game ended.

## EDITOR VERSUS ECONOMIST IN DEBATE TODAY

Bates Professor Argues With  
Editor of the Nation  
in Room 10-250

### PRESIDENT AND DEAN APPROVE DISCUSSION

At the request of the Speakers' Club, Professor J. M. Carroll and Mr. Norman Thomas have consented to repeat at Technology today the debate which they held Saturday night before the Harvard Liberal Club. They will discuss the phenomena of Socialism in room 10-250 at 4 o'clock this afternoon.

Doctor Carroll is head of the economics department of Bates College and will argue against the Socialist tenets. His opinion on social problems commands wide respect in academic circles. Mr. Thomas, whose brother graduated from Technology with the class of '11, is associate editor of The Nation, and editor of The World of Tomorrow, as well as being chairman of the League for Industrial Democracy. He will uphold the Socialist colors.

Since Thomas has to establish a proposition, while Carroll has merely to tear it down, the order of speaking has been arranged as follows: Thomas speaks first for 20 minutes; then Carroll for 25; then each has a ten minute rebuttal and a five minute rebuttal. Thomas finishes with an additional five minute rebuttal.

### Spoke to Harvard Liberals

The debate was given at the Harvard Liberal Club Saturday before a meeting of the New England student conference of the League for Industrial Democracy. When Paul Blanshard, field secretary of the L. I. D. spoke at Technology last term, he entered into negotiations with the Speakers Club here in regard to affiliating it with the League. The Speakers preferred their state of independence however.

The debaters are staying over the week-end in Boston in order to speak at the Institute. Professor Carroll echoed the opinion expressed by Gerard Swope in the first Aldred Lecture, saying "I feel that engineers are coming to a more serious interest in social and labor problems and should be familiar with what can be said on both sides of the question."

The Dean approved the meeting this afternoon after conference with the president and the registrar. With the cooperation of the faculty, the Speakers Club will in the future endeavor to secure further speakers.

put a half-nelson on Lockwood at the first of the bout and kept this hold throughout being content with the decision and not attempting to score a fall. Lockwood tried repeatedly to shake him off but owing to the other man's weight was unable to get the upper hand.

The next bout between 158 pound men went to George Myerson, captain of the opposing team who won over Bowles after the hardest fought bout of the evening. Myerson was scheduled to appear in the 145 pound class to oppose Norwood but at the last moment shifted to the 158. He has been New England Amateur champion for two years and looks every bit a wrestler on the mat.

Bowles left him very few openings and fought hard before he was downed with an armlock after five minutes and ten seconds. Myerson sure got a fight for his money and had to drop his professional manner soon after the bout began in order to get down to some hard work before securing a fall.

### Dag Norwood Comes Through

Norwood, in his dependable way, made away with five points in the next bout between 135 pound men. From the beginning, he went after his man and followed him until after only one minute and forty-five minutes of wrestling he secured a fall over Rappoport by a chancery hold. His opponent did not have a chance and was very inferior to Norwood all around except in weight.

Kennett and Robinson, in the 175 pound bout, showed little aggressiveness and were five minutes getting things started. Kennett maintained the advantage he obtained when he had his man on the mat and secured a decision by a time advantage of 1:18. These last two bouts evened up things so that the outcome of the meet rested on the heavyweight affair that was scheduled between Rock Hereford and Newt Johnson.

### Hereford in Fine Form

Rock Hereford certainly looked in the pink of condition as he came on the mat. As usual he wore a charming smile and even cast a few wise cracks as he engaged with his opponent. From the start he took the aggressive and by his superior speed and strength easily had the advantage. But Rock couldn't seem to down his man in time for the bell. Some say that he should have been given a fall instead of a decision but at any rate, only two or three seconds elapsed between the end of the time period and the actual fall. Rock was given only a decision which netted the Institute the necessary three points to win the meet. It was a good bout all around and Rock surely deserved to have received the benefit of the doubt.

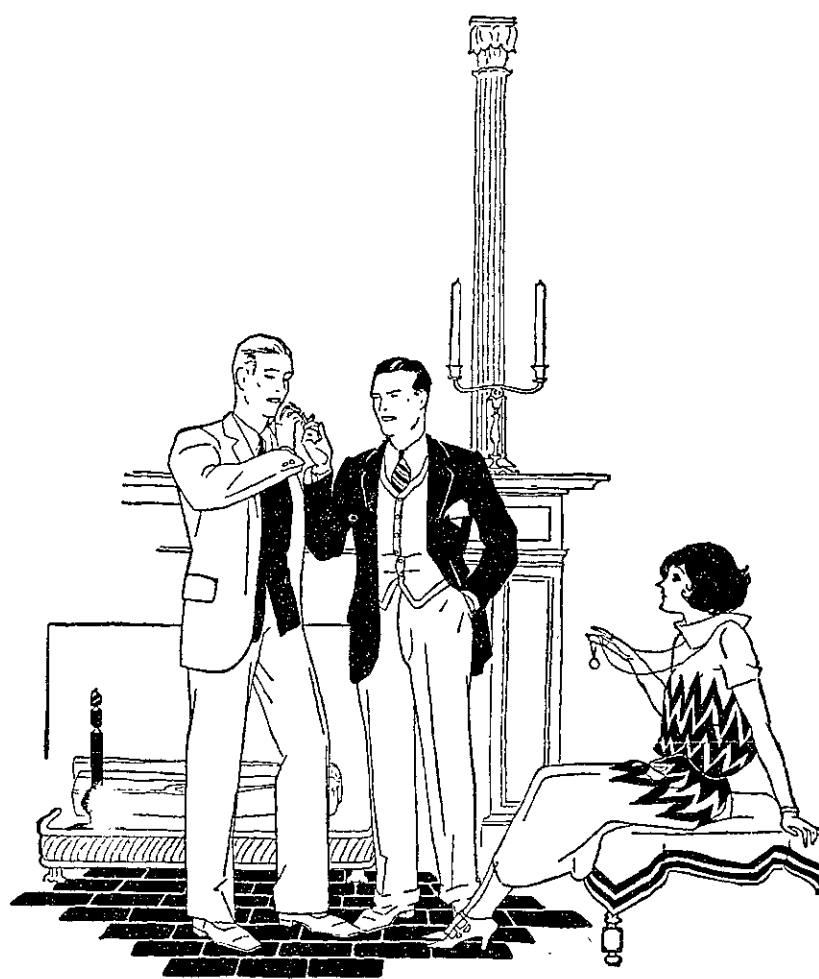
