Without any Locke on the team, how under the sun can the hockey players expect to use the key to victory if they happen to find it?

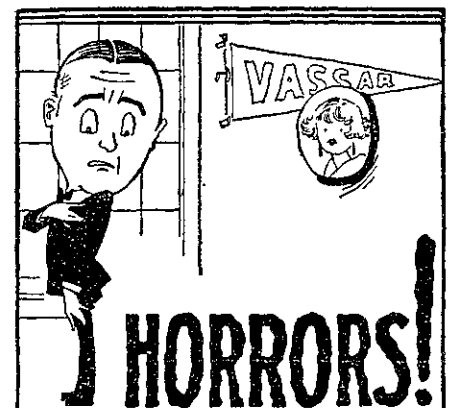

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VARSITY HOCKEY TEAM TO FACE A BATTLE TONIGHT

Same Squad To Face Eli As Defeated Last Week by The Crimson

TEAM EXPECTED TO PLAY BETTER THAN LAST WEEK

The varsity hockey team will face the strongest team that they will have to meet this evening when they play the Yale squad at New Haven. Wiessner is back in the game again and will take the trip to New Haven, but the team is still handicapped by the loss of Locke and Laurean.

Practically the same squad will face the Eli as were defeated by the Crimson in the game last week. Massey expects to have his hands full again in warding the shower of rubber that will come his way.

Team Shows Progress
At the practice of the squad yesterday morning, the last one before the game tonight, considerable improvement was shown by the men. They are light and still have considerable work before them if they are to pull the season out of the hole and make it a success, but under the direction of Coach Rainnie the squad is making reasonably rapid progress.

Jerry Dalton will start at center. The forward line will consist of MacPhearson and Randall, the same that played the greater part of the game against Harvard. On the defense there is Dave Peene who did excellent work against the Crimson sextet and is expected to hold up his end tonight. His partner, Flynn, while newer at the game than Peene, is fast developing into a first class defense man.

Massey at Goal
Captain Dent Massey of course will play at his old position at goal. Against the Crimson he made a large number of stops, some of them almost impossible. If he is on his game tonight he should be able to hold Yale nearer to the earth.

The squad is hardly expectant of victory, as the team they will be up against is superior to the Crimson. With the improvement that they have shown, however, they should be able to hold the Bulldog to within the limits that Harvard obtained.

YALE WILL HAVE STRONG TEAM TO FACE ENGINEERS

Captain Charlie O'Hearn in Good Form To Break Beaver Attacks

The Yale hockey team will start against the Engineers with one of the strongest defense lines that has been at New Haven for several years. Their forward line is a trifle heavy and slow, but will, to say the least, prove a dangerous menace to their opponents. Captain Charlie O'Hearn, playing on the defense, is in excellent form and should cause the breakup of many of the Beaver attacks. Sargent, his teammate is also an excellent defense man as well as a good man on the attack.

Chisholm at Center
Chisholm will start for Yale as roving center. Turbull and Scott, the two members of the forward line, are not considered the strong points of the Eli team. They are a little heavy for the position and not so fast and accurate as some of the forward lines that Yale has been able to boast of in the past. They will be ably backed by their teammates, however, and it will probably be necessary for the Engineers to adopt the three-man defense to keep the Bulldog from getting too close to the goal.

The Eli this year have been very successful so far. They defeated Princeton in a close and exciting game, winning by a 4-3 score. They played and defeated the New Haven Bears who were victors last week over the B. A. A. team.

They will start with their first string lineup but is not expected that the chances for a Beaver victory will glow very bright.

Number of Men At Trackhouse Out This Term

Peggy Joyce, one of the best quarter and half milers on the varsity squad is sick and was unable to appear to take the time-trials. It is doubtful if he will be used in the practice meet, but his presence in meets later in the season should aid materially.

Frank Frierer will not run this term because of fallen arches. This is a serious blow to the distance relay team which had counted upon the speedy harriers to do some good work this winter.

This by no means completes the losses at the track house. Bill Keplinger, another harrier star, will not run because of the condition of his studies. Jim Gaylord, the best distance runner, is still laid up and although he may get in the running the latter part of the season, he will do no running for the present.

Juste, the frosh cross country captain, and Beattie, another distance runner, complete the tale of woe of those who won't be able to compete this term. However, it is better to have them out now so they will be able to give their best efforts during the spring season.

CHESS MATCH RESULTS ARE STILL UNDECIDED

Team Will Play University of Pennsylvania Soon

The Technology chess team played the Jolly Rogers last Friday in a six board match, the match resulting in a score of 2-2 with two games yet to be adjudicated.

A match has been arranged with the University of Pennsylvania, to be played in Walker, probably on February 9. The date is only tentative, however, as negotiations are still going on.

The freshman game with Boston Latin School which was scheduled for tonight has been postponed to February 1. Other matches for the freshmen in the near future will be against English High School and Huntington School, the matches to be six board instead of eight. R. B. Miller '27, the Captain of the frosh team is frequently called on to play for the varsity.

Three chess sets and a number of new boards have been purchased by the chess team, and several new sets have been added by the Institute. Isaac Brimberg, president of the club, declares "the necessity for new chess sets to take care of the increasing number of devotees of the game has been evident for some time."

A good freshman team is just as important as a good varsity. The frosh player of this season is the varsity player of next, so if the standard of the varsity is to be kept up the frosh will have to be tuned up to provide replacements on the squad.

Basketball Squad Expects To be Up Against Some Stiff Opposition

SOME RADICAL CHANGES MADE IN SQUAD LINEUP

There have been some changes in the varsity lineup since the game against Brown. Captain Stan Cook is still out of the game and there is little prospect of an early return to the game.

FROSH HOCKEY SLOW IN START

There is a game scheduled here with Stone for Saturday; but unless we have some ice right away the game will have to be called off.

The managers have called a meeting for Thursday at five o'clock in room 10-265. It is desired that all the men attend this meeting so that a definite idea of the material on hand may be obtained at this time. Their next game is scheduled for Saturday, January 26, with Malden, and it is hoped that by that time the team will be well organized and under way.

Cub Basketeers To Play Harvard

Frosh Squad Has Strong Team to Send Against the Harvard Cubs

Tonight at 7:30 the freshman basketball team will play the third game of the season with the Harvard freshman team. The first game of the season resulted in a victory for the frosh, but in the second game they were overcome by the superior team work of the Dean Academy team.

The loss of Lester, who was declared ineligible because he had played freshman basketball at Wesleyan, has provided another handicap for the team in addition to the change of coaches. Leslie was also declared ineligible.

Since the Dean game the team has developed a much better passing game and they hope to show the Harvard frosh a much better game. Several changes have been made in the positions of the players. Umbehauer, who has been playing center was changed to a forward position. Innerasky, who has played forward most of the time, has been shifted to one of the back positions.

Engel and Wilkar will start the Harvard game as backs. Jenkins and Umbehauer as forwards and Steinbremer at center complete the line up. The Harvard line up is as follows: forwards, Ely and Eaton; backs, Lightbourn (Capt.), and Malick; center, Leckley.

VARSITY QUARTER MILERS DO WELL IN TIME TRIALS

Howlett Turns in Fastest Time of Mile Relay Candidates

MEDLEY TEAM AGAINST HARVARD NOT CHOSEN

The majority of the relay teams to face Harvard Saturday have been picked as a result of the time trials held yesterday afternoon on the board track. The meet, while a practice one, will nevertheless furnish valuable experience to the competitors from both institutions. It will consist of five relay races for both the varsity and freshman squads.

In the trials for the 600 yard four-man relay, Manion made the best time. Makepeace was behind him but a fraction of a second, while Captain Russ Ambach, who ordinarily is in the hurdles, secured the birth for third place. Drew and Tony tied for the last position on the squad.

Quarter Milers Good
The varsity quarter mile tests for the members of the mile relay, produced some of the best running of the afternoon. Howlett ran the fastest quarter that has ever been run this early in the season on the boards. Glen Bateman, a member of last year's relay team, made the next fastest, with Doug Jeppe close behind him. Charlie Boardman secured fourth position followed by Heyfer.

Many Harriers Enter
The half mile tests for the two-mile team did not produce quite as good running as did the shorter distance. Symonds made the fastest time for the six laps on the board track. Bailey, Rooney and Fife, all old cross country men, came next in the order named.

Captain Chubby Holt of the cross country team made the fastest time in the three-quarter mile try outs for the three mile team. He is not essentially a fast man though he can turn in a fair mile or half mile, running the latter distance the major portion of his freshman year. Hooper, Preston, and Grossman are all essentially distance men that Coach Connor expects to use next season on the harrier squad. It is probable that this relay will not be entered in races later in the season but the coach wishes to give some of his distance men a chance to acquire experience in running at the shorter distances, thus developing a greater measure of speed.

The men that will compose the medley relay have not been chosen yet by the coach. This race consists of four men running one lap, three laps, six laps and nine laps respectively.

FROSH HOLD TIME TRIALS YESTERDAY

Tests Held To Determine Cubs To Run Against Harvard

The freshmen members of the relay teams to meet Harvard Saturday were selected yesterday, their time trials being run off at the same time as were those of the varsity.

Coach Connor will have a large number of sprinters to choose from, there being more entrants in this than in any other of the relays. The following men, in order of their times, tried out for the 600 yard freshman team: Weibel, Fitzpatrick, Weibel, Pigherty, Robinson and Glantherg.

Some good times were turned in by the cubs for the mile relay team. Kautzman led the field of quarter milers. K. E. Smith came next, followed by K. A. Smith, Becker and Caldwell.

A number of cub harriers are evident on the three mile team. Spurr turned in the fastest time followed by Knowles, Hunt, Cheney, and Dinas.

Neither the men for the freshman two mile team or the medley relay have been picked yet, but they will be announced by Coach Connor later.

PHYSICS DEPT. TO GET RESEARCH LABORATORY

New X-Ray Room Is Completely Lined With Lead

The Physics Department will soon be the possessor of a new X-ray laboratory which is now being built in the basement of building 4. J. T. Norton, son of Professor C. L. Norton, head of the Physics Department, is to have charge of the laboratory which will be used primarily for research work.

The laboratory is being constructed inside of room 4-041. Heavy beams were placed along the walls and an entirely new room built inside the old one. The workmen are now lining the new room with quarter inch sheet lead to prevent the possibility of any of the rays finding their way outside.
