Mr. Powell is a graduate of the U.S. Naval Academy and the University of Glasgow and also took a special two year course at the Naval Academy. After finishing his work at the Scottish institution, he entered the Navy and saw active service on the flagship New York during the Spanish-American War.

He has occupied many prominent and responsible positions in the marine world, among which were, president of the Fore River Shipbuilding Corporation, vice-president of the Bethlehem Shipbuilding Corporation, and director in the American Trust Company. He is also a member of the Society of Naval Architects and Marine Engineers and vice-president of the Institute of Naval Architects.

Tomorrow the Institute varsity wrestling team journeys to New Haven where it will meet the Yale grapplers in what promises to be a hectic exhibition of crack wrestling. With five of last year's men on the squad, Technology will put up a battle royal against old Eli and though the chances of victory are about even, yet the balance of the bouts are expected to swing the right way—Technology's way. Captain Greer, who was ill last week and accordingly did not place in the meet with B. Y. M. C. U. is back again and going strong and will probably carry off the honors in the unlimited class although he is a regular 175 pound man. In the latter class, Kennett will easily handle his opponent while old reliable Rock Hereford is counted on to show as well in the 158 pound division as he has during the past two years.

Grinnell Wins Elimination
There is always some hesitation as to who will place in the 145 pound class as both Lockwood and Grinnell are fighting hard for the coveted position. Lockwood threw Grinnell before the last meet and then Grinnell turned around and threw Lockwood in an elimination this week so that he will wrestle with Yale. Dag Norwood is the choice for the 135 pound division as he is a consistent point-getter for the Institute and has shown some good stuff already this year.

His left arm was badly sprained by a nasty fall which forced him to withdraw from the bout. Cummings will replace him against Yale. This man was a stellar wrestler on last year's freshman team and has shown up fine in the practices. Coyle will place in the 115 pound class and there is no doubt but that he will easily throw his man. Coyle is a wiry little fellow with more pep than a dynamo and will be on his toes from the start.

AERONAUTICAL COURSE OFFERED BY U. S. NAVY

Lieutenant Pond U.S.N., at the smoker of the Aeronautical Society to be held tonight in room 5-330 at 8 o'clock, will describe a new course in Aeronautics to be offered to Technology students by the U. S. Navy.

From advance information on the course, it is to be divided into three periods. The first will be a period of six weeks in which the student will be taught to fly, at the end of this term the student will have learned enough so as to be able to fly alone. The second period will be six weeks of seamanship and the last, 40 hours of individual flying. The conditions under which a student may enroll in this course and also a full description of the work will be given by Lieut. Pond at the smoker.

CIVIL ENGINEERS COMPLETE PLANS

J. W. Rollins, Builder of Piers to Cambridge Bridge Speaks Thursday

Plans for the Civil Engineering Society which are now almost complete for the rest of the year include a smoker for next Thursday at which J. W. Rollins '78, one of the builders of the East Cambridge bridge, will speak. This is the first meeting on the program. On following dates a joint meeting with the Boston Society of Civil Engineers, an inspection trip to Manchester, N. H. and several smokers will be held.

Next Thursday evening J. W. Rollins '78 of Holbrook, Cal. and Rollins of Boston, will speak to the society on "Deep Underwater Foundations for Bridges." Mr. Rollins is considered an authority on this subject. He has had wide experience in this field among which was the building of the piers for the East Cambridge Bridge. At the time of construction these piers were the largest in the world.

February 20 the society will meet with the Boston Society of Civil Engineers. This meeting will be held in conjunction with the civil engineering societies of Harvard and Tufts Universities.

On or about February 29 the society will make an inspection trip to Manchester, N. H., to look over the Hydro-Electric plant of the Amoskeag Manufacturing Co. The date is tentative as it must be chosen by the society.

At present J. E. Jagger '24, president of the society, is corresponding with Gustav Lindenthal of New York City with a view to getting him to speak to the society at some meeting in the third term.

Two dates in the society's program are still open. Plans for these meetings were discussed at the meeting of the executive committee of the society Monday night. The committee states that the plans will be complete within a month.

ENROLLMENT FOR TERM LOWER THAN LAST YEAR

The final registration figures for this term gives a total of 2811 students enrolled at the Institute. This number is about 257 less than it was last year at this time, and 138 less than was the registration for last term.

Since there is no Junior Freshmen class this year, the drop in the number enrolled as compared to last year's registration is partially accountable to this fact. The decrease from last term is normal—about 125 men dropping out of school on the average at the end of the first and second terms every year.

ALL THREE DEMOCRATS PRESENT AT MEETING

All three of the Democrats at the Institute turned out in force Wednesday to attend the organization meeting of the Democratic Club. To reduce the confusion to a minimum with such a large gathering the men were grouped together and the speaker descended from the platform. The meeting was conducted on the conference plan—the speaker talking with each man individually. One third of the attendance thought that room 5-330 was rather large for this form of meeting and declared that he believed "an activity office in Walker would have been more cosy."

C. L. Bueil Will Discuss Plan at Meeting in Room 5-330 Today at 4 O'clock

BALLOTS OBTAINABLE AT NEWS STANDS IN HALLS

Results Will Be Sent to N. Y. and Tabulated With Those of Nation

As a part of the nation-wide vote now being taken on the American Peace Award THE TECH is today holding a referendum at the Institute to determine the student opinion of the plan. The votes cast will be forwarded to the Bok headquarters where they will be tabulated in the final results for the entire country.

The Speakers' Club has been successful in securing Raymond Leslie Bueil, Instructor in Government at Harvard, to speak on the plan in room 5-330 today at 4 o'clock, immediately following the Aldred Lecture. He will present and discuss both sides of the question, the merits and defects of the plan, and will not endeavor to prejudice the minds of his audience but rather to give them a clear idea of what the plan actually is. Questions will be welcomed and the club hopes that any men who have questions in their mind about the plan or desire any aspect explained will bring the matter up here so that all may benefit. Everyone is invited to attend his meeting.

Individual ballots are being distributed with each copy of THE TECH and ballots are also being printed in the paper. Either ballot may be used by those voting and should be deposited in one of the ballot boxes which will be placed on all of the stands and also in Walker Memorial. It is requested that the men wait until they have heard Mr. Bueil speak before voting.

On the editorial page of today's issue there appears the final installment of a series of four successive articles which give the complete text of the plan. With this opportunity to read the plan and also to hear Mr. Bueil speak the student body cannot complain that they were unable to know the plan and refrain from voting for this reason. All ballots must be in before noon tomorrow at the latest as this is necessary in order to forward them the American Peace Award Headquarters on time. It is expected that the results will be available for publication in Monday's issue of THE TECH.

On each ballot there appears a brief outline of the plan, the question "Do you approve the plan in substance?" the question, "Are you a voter?" and a place in which to insert name and address. There is also a note stating that those interested in expressing fuller opinions are cordially urged to send them on a separate sheet. The pro-

THE BOK PLAN IN BRIEF

Proposes

I. That the United States shall immediately enter the Permanent Court of International Justice, under the conditions stated by Secretary Hughes and President Harding in February, 1923.

II. That without becoming a member of the League of Nations as at present constituted, the United States shall offer to extend its present cooperation with the League and participate in the work of the League AS A BODY OF MUTUAL COUNSEL under conditions which

1. Substitute moral force and public opinion for the military and economic force originally implied in Articles X and XVI.
2. Safeguard the Monroe Doctrine.
3. Accept the fact that the United States will assume no obligations under the Treaty of Versailles except by Act of Congress.
4. Propose that membership in the League should be opened to all nations.
5. Provide for the continuing development of international law.
