**Loss of Dave Peene Just
Before Trip Forces
Cancellation**

TEAM NEEDS MEN BADLY

The hockey squad was forced to make a last minute cancellation of the match with Yale Wednesday night. At a meeting of the faculty on that day Dave Peene, the Beaver's strong-
est defense man, was awarded Votus X by the faculty and thus automatically barred from the hockey team as well as from the Institute.

With the loss of three other regu-
lars before Peene, namely Laurion and Moulton, wings, and Locke defense man, the team has been badly crippled and has had to effect a reorganization several times this season.

Last Wednesday the loss of Peene was the straw that broke the camel's back. The squad has been hard up for good material all season. As soon as a new man develops, a veteran is claimed by the faculty. The loss of Peene necessitated a complete reor-
ganization as there was nobody that could fill his place on the squad.

In view of this Dr. Mandell of Yale was notified. With his consent, and that of Dr. Rowe, Yale was telephoned the condition of their opponents. With the sanction of the Yale authorities and that of George Brown of the arena the engagement was cancelled. The team will, however, complete the rest of their schedule, which consists of games with West Point, Amherst and Dartmouth. They are badly in need of men and are on the lookout for new material.

Tomorrow afternoon the varsity and freshman relay teams will journey to Soldiers' Field for the practice meet with Harvard. The meet, starting at 2:30, will open up with the varsity 600 yard relay race. The varsity and freshman races will alternate through-
out the afternoon.

Five relays will be run by both var-
sity and freshmen. They are all four man relays. In the first one each man will run one lap (150 yards), in the second three laps, in the third six laps, the fourth nine laps and the last will be a medley, the runners travelling one, three, six and nine laps respectively.

In most of the relays Harvard is conceded to have an edge. The Beav-
ers have good prospects of turning out an excellent mile relay this year and Coach Connor expects to work to develop this team more than the others.

Coach Connor has decided whom he will enter in all of the races except in the case of the freshman two mile team which is still in the air.

Wednesday night the freshman bas-
ketball team lost to the Harvard '27 team. The game was very fast and well played by both teams. Although the pass work of the freshmen was good they did not seem to be able to carry the ball past the middle of the floor. Harvard on the other hand car-
ried the ball right under the Tech frosh's basket. Only the good work of the frosh backs prevented the Har-
vard cubs from rolling up a higher score.

Engel, who was playing right guard, scored the first three points of the game. Numerous fouls were called on both sides. Wilbar and Engel, the frosh backs were playing an excellent game. Engel broke through the Har-
vard's defense time after time or a total of six points.

Although 24 fouls were called against Tech only 10 points were made, while the engineer cubs secured 9 out of a possible 18 points. Towards the end of the first half Engel made a long shot from the middle of the floor, this was immediately followed by Umben-
hauer, who duplicated the shot made by Engel a few minutes before. The half ended with the score 16-13 in favor of Harvard.

In the second part of the game the Tech freshmen, although fighting hard to overcome their opponents lead were not able to score. The second half of the game was not as fast as the first half, and the ball seemed to be in Tech's territory most of the time. The last shot of the game was made by Jenkins, the Tech left forward. It was quite a long shot from the side of the floor.

Clearly outplayed the Beavers were forced to accept the small end of a 38-18 score in their game with Tufts last night. Except for short periods here and there the Tufts squad was able to do just about as it pleased with the Engineer quintet.

Their passing was good. Most of their shots were taken from in under the Beaver basket, as the Engineers seemed unable to solve the problem of their opponents' attack. The Beavers, on the other hand, had hardly a shot shot at the basket throughout the game. Davidson was in his element all right as Technology was forced to confine herself to long shots from the middle of the floor.

Bamford Does Well
For the Beavers Davidson did ex-
tremely well, displaying more of an idea of teamwork than he has shown heretofore this season. Jim Bamford, playing in his first game this season, played an excellent game when he re-
placed Simonds at right forward. Stew Lankton had all that he could handle in trying to keep the Tuft forwards, a respectable distance from the bas-
ket.

At the end of the first half the score stood 23 to 8 in favor of Tufts. The Beavers tightened up a little in the second period and cut down the lead a little, but their opponents soon were able to stop their offensive and started one of their own again. The score when the whistle blew stood 38 to 18 favor of Tuft.
