BEAVER RIFLES PLACE THIRD IN N.Y. CITY SHOOT

George Washington University First With Total of 1867 Points

CHAMPIONSHIP SHOOT DRAWS 11 COLLEGES

In competition with more than 50 of the best rifle shots in the East, representing 11 colleges where rifle shooting is a major sport, the Institute took third place in the New York City Intercollegiate which were finished at paired with a 17th place in the National Intercollegiate last year, the record established by the five leaders of the Institute team places Technology in a position to claim the rifle honors of New England colleges.

The afternoon's matches found the Technology representatives leading the field, with five more teams to shoot, and it was in the evening's engagement that George Washington and Columbia University teams forged ahead. The shooting of Walter Stokes, former International small-bore title holder, who piled up the highest individual score of the meet, was the feature of the George Washington win. In the afternoon matches, Ed Murphy, captain of the Institute team, started the list for the Cardinal and Gray with a perfect score in the prone shooting, turned in another perfect target, while Jack Fielding, shooting fifth, Capt. Creveling, Jackson, and Holmes came through with a set of 99's.

The possibles turned in for the prone positions by Murphy and Fielding were the only perfect scores credited to the Institute team, and were also two out of the eight possibles shot by all the teams entered, out of which George Washington nabbed four.

Captain Donald Creveling and Jack Fielding were tied for individual honors with a total of 373 points each for the four events, and Fielding's record of a 92 in the standing stage was the highest credited to any of the entries. The team and the order in which they scored is as follows:

The almost certainty that Ed Moll will not be able to perform for the boxers comes as a blow on their prospects. There was perhaps a fifty-fifty chance that Ed would be able to return to the squad but now the odds are long against his ever entering the ring for a Beaver team again.

The loss of Ed Moll is serious but there are still some silver linings on the boxing horizon. The performance of Captain Bobby Smith and Schultz in the ring at the B. A. A. tournament last week is a strong indication that in two classes at least the Engineers stand a good show of winning in the large majority of their contests.

In the heavier divisions, however, the Beaver boxers are sorely in need of material. The 175 pound class and the unlimited division have not sufficient men out for them to develop a boxer of varsity calibre. Unless the Engineers want to lose these divisions every time they had better get busy and send their huskies around to fill up the hole.

It almost seems that there are no heavy men at Technology at all. First Doc Connor calls for men of beefy proportions to heave the weights in the hangar this winter. Next the wrestling team feels the need for more weight, and now the boxers express a long felt want for men to fill their two upper divisions.

Few Husky Men Have Reported To Track House

Need of Heavy Men Felt for Weight Events—Shot Put Worst Off

Just now Doc Connor seems to be worrying more about developing weight men to represent Technology in the meets this spring than about anything else. The varsity, with the loss of Pete Shipley and Howard Dexter of last year's team, finds itself very weak in most of the events requiring husky men.

The shot put seems to be about the worst off of these. There is only one man doing regular work now in this event and he is new at the game. If we are not to be shut out in this event in the spring meets Doc Connor will have to gather together a number more huskies. The shot-putters work out about three times a week in the hangar where they have the use of the jumping pit to throw into. This practice continues all winter, in the spring the men of course reporting more often to the track house as the active season approaches.

175-POUND BOUT IS BIG PROBLEM TO BOXING TEAM

Lack of Candidates in Light-heavyweight Division Becomes Serious

MOLL MAY BE FORCED TO STOP ALL BOXING

With the opening of their season less than a week away, the varsity boxing team faces a serious problem. The University of Toronto team is coming here next Monday bringing a squad of crack boxers, who will put up a good scrap against the Institute team. In view of the coming contest, the varsity squad has issued a call for men in every class and especially in the lightweight division. At present there are no 175 pound men on the team and this will lead to one of two things. Either the Institute will be obliged to forfeit the 175 pound battle or else enter a man from a lighter class. Either issue has its difficulties, the one entailing loss of a bout, the other the danger that a good man might get hurt when matched against a larger adversary.

Unusual Opportunity

This is a rare state of affairs at the Institute and the situation offers a great inducement to all men interested in boxing and especially the heavier men. Captain Bobby Smith stated yesterday that the light-heavy position was wide open to anyone who could make the weight and could stand up three rounds against somebody his size. This carries with it a chance to place in next Monday's meet as a varsity boxer.

The same situation exists in the 145 pound class, although not to any such degree. Ed Moll, the regular welterweight, is forbidden by doctor's orders to box, at present there is some question as to whether he will ever return to the boxing game. This leaves but one man in this class, Kuhn, who will place in the first two meets of the season at least. If Moll is out of things for good, the burden will rest on Kuhn, who could stand a little support in this popular class.

Moll May Stop

Ed Moll was injured in a meet last year by a blow in the ribs, and though the injury seemed superficial at the time, his rib has bothered him lately and pending an examination, Moll is obliged to confine himself to light workouts and roadwork to keep him in condition. An X-ray photograph showed nothing amiss so it is thought that the muscles may be injured. Although nothing definite can be known, Moll cannot represent Technology for the time being and his loss will be greatly felt as he was a consistent point-winner for the Institute.

The other classes are also in need of men for, although there are boxers in each class, there is hardly the number of men out that there was in former years. Al Schultz has taken off enough weight to make the 115 pound division while Bobby Smith will hold down the 125 pound class. Gensell is the only prospect in the light-weight division so that here is another opportunity for somebody who weighs around 135 pounds to come out and make the team. At present, Konrisky is doing

Beaver Team Is Placed in First Division by Recent Ruling

FENCING TEAM IS IN EXCELLENT CONDITION

There have been several radical changes in the Intercollegiate Fencing Rules this year, the principle one concerning the requirements for qualification. From now on the colleges will be divided into two groups and two colleges from each group will qualify for the Intercollegiate. The two qualifying colleges will be chosen by elimination.

Although the strongest colleges are in the group to which Technology belongs the team has high hopes of making the Intercollegiate. There are a number of excellent men on the team and in addition some of the best coaches have been obtained for instruction. George Calahan the national dueling sword champion and E. E. Taylor '22, captain of the '22 team, have been given the men some hints as to the fine points of the sport. Atelio Canzanelli '21, also comes around on Saturday to give the varsity men a good workout.

Approximate Schedule Known

The dates for the meets have as yet not been definitely decided upon but the approximate time for the trips are as follows: in the second week of February, the Navy, Princeton, Columbia and University of Pennsylvania; last week of February, Bowdoin. From March first there will be a meet every Saturday until all the members of our group are played off. This will include Yale, Harvard, Dartmouth and West Point.

The fencing team which will be composed of four men, is especially strong this year, and is enthusiastic over a possible first place at the finals to be held in the Hotel Astor in New York. The sword and saber teams, however, are not as complete as last year, due to the large number of old men who graduated. In addition, no new men have come out for this branch and Captain Serrano is anxious about the composition of next year's team. He urges any men interested to come and see him in the activities room on the top floor of Walker. The new applicants would not, of course, be on this year's team but with plenty of practice they would stand a good chance of making next year's varsity.

The four men on the fencing team will be J. L. Levis '26, L. A. Ferre '24, K. C. Hawthorne '26 and R. T. Seabury '25. The sword and sabre teams will each have two men, only one having been chosen so far, however. Captain Horacio Serrano '24 will represent the sabers and C. H. Blake '24 the dueling swords.

FROSH WANT ICE FOR THEIR RINK
