FROSH SWIMMERS TO MEET ANDOVER TEAM

The freshmen swimming team travels to Andover tomorrow for their third meet of the season. Thus far the first year swimmers have not been defeated but they will have to do some fast swimming to keep their record clear tomorrow when they clash with the prep school tankers.

In the first meet with Malden they won by only a slight margin of points but in the meet with English High the Beaver swimmers took the contest easily 32-31. Two events have been added to tomorrow's meet, the back stroke and the breast stroke events.

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VARSITY BALL
PASSERS LOSE
BY TWO POINTS

Engineers Defeated by Brown
in Return Contest in
Providence

Playing the best brand of basketball they have exhibited thus far this season, the varsity basketball passers were nosed out of victory by two points Wednesday night when they lost to the Brown five at Providence by the close count of 29-27. With a new combination taking the floor because of the injuries of Eager and Ruff, the Engineers were doubly handicapped playing on a foreign floor. Notwithstanding this, the Beavers gave the home team a fight from the opening whistle, the score see-sawing back and forth, as neither team was able to obtain a big lead through the game.

The most hopeful sign for future games is the degree of team work which the engineers showed Wednesday night. They carried and kept the ball in Brown's territory for the greater part of the game, clearly outplaying the Bruins when it came to team formation.

Technology Loses on Shots
The great weakness of Coach Warren's team was their lack of shooting ability. Time after time the Beaver forwards would break through the Bruin defense for an easy shot at the basket, only to throw away the point by an inaccurate toss at the cage.

The defense of the Providence team was none too good which meant that Technology had plenty of opportunities to score, but the men failed to come through with the goals. The Engineers soon got a smoothly working offense going at the start which kept the Brown guards on the run.

The game was a toss up until the final whistle sounded as the advantage was first with the Beavers and then with the Bruins.

Engineers Lose Players
The Engineers were forced to go without the services of Davidson and Lankton in the latter part of the game as they were taken out by the referee. Nothing serious occurred, the referee believed that Davidson was a little rough, and hence removed him from the contest. Lankton was removed after he had four personal fouls charged against him.

All of the field goals with the exception of a long shot by Davidson were obtained on close formation plays, all of the players practically throwing away chances for a win when it came to caging easy shots, the ball simply would not drop through the net.

Davidson led the Technology scorers with four baskets to his credit, while Simonds and Porrester each came through with two.

Franks wrestled at Andover and since he has been at the Institute has responded rapidly to Coach Burns training. NEW SWIMMING
CAPTAIN WILL
BE SELECTED

Nip Marsh Resigns as Captain—
Due to the Pressure
of Work

A new swimming captain to take the place of Nip Marsh who handed in his resignation Wednesday, because of the press of studies, has not yet been elected. It was expected that a new leader would be picked yesterday afternoon when the swimmers were at the Boston "X" for a practice session, but not all of the men were on hand, so a complete vote was impossible.

Up to late last night three more men were yet to vote which made it impossible to come to a final selection. The loss of Nip Marsh will be a serious blow to the swimming team as he has been the stellar performer for the last two seasons. In the opening meet of this season with the Lowell Textile swimmers, Nip was the star of the meet, coming in first in both the 40 and 100 yard swims and swimming anchor man on the swimming relay. In the 40 yard swim he established a new Technology record for that distance.

CUB BOXERS ARE
REPORTING FAST

Over 20 Men Out With Majority
Placing in the Lighter
Divisions

Boxing among the freshmen is becoming as popular as monkey drill is unpopular, so that Coach Boutelier has a number of cub athletes under him who are showing up fine. As over a score of men have reported, the coach cannot handle them all, so that most of the candidates are doing road work with an occasional workout in the squared circle. Most of the youngsters look promising and as the yearling season does not open for some time yet, there is a good chance for a fine team to be whipped into shape before the first meet.

As is the general case in the Institute sports, there is a lack of men in the heavy classes. No unlimited boxers have reported yet, while Burke is the only candidate in the 175 pound division, and Brockleman in the 165 pounds. The 158 pound division has no men out for it at all and this is usually a popular class. Nor is the 145 pound division any better off as there are but two men, Morrison and Lammert.

However the lightweight section can boast of nine men and competition is naturally keen. Darling, Flynn, Harvey, Johnston, Longenecker, Miller, Onishi, True, and Sacco are all battling for a place in this class.

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
