For the conference on automotive and aeroplane motors to be held in the Air Service incant on Thursday evening at 8 o'clock in room 1-090, the Aero Society has procured Warren Noble of Boston, an expert on radio and motors. The conference will be informal and will include a discussion of motor failures and their causes. Plenty of opportunity for questions concerning motor troubles will be offered.

23 OPPOSED; 40 IN FAVOR OF NEW SIGNALS

Majority of Dormitory Men Fail to Vote on Signal Plan

The final result of the vote in the dormitories on the semaphore signals on each room to indicate whether the occupant is busy is announced as 40 in favor and 23 opposed, while about 60 per cent did not vote. In view of the small vote cast the committee has not yet decided whether the signals will be adopted.

Many of the men ridiculed the idea that anyone would use the signals if adopted, or that anyone would respect the signals if they were used. Many others, however, admitted the value of the plan, and expressed their belief that the dorm men would quickly get into the habit of using the signals, and that their value would be immeasurable. The majority, however, seemed not to be at all interested, and had no opinion one way or the other.

In June, applicants will be examined by the College Entrance Examination Board in Boston, New York, Philadelphia, Chicago, and many other cities in America and Europe. A circular stating times and places is issued in advance by the College Board.

Graduates of colleges and scientific schools of collegiate grade, and in general all applicants presenting satisfactory certificates showing work done at another college corresponding to at least one year's work at the Institute, are admitted, without examination, to such advanced standing as is warranted by their previous training.

Graduate courses leading to the Degrees of Master of Science, Master in Architecture, Doctor of Philosophy and Doctor of Science are also offered. Special Research Laboratories of Physical Chemistry, Applied Chemistry and Science have been established.
