

University of Toronto Faces Varsity Boxing Squad in Meet Tonight

Leather Pushers To Open Season At Home Tonight

Moll or Brockelman Will Enter Light-heavyweight Contest

VARSITY SQUAD IN PINK OF CONDITION

The varsity boxing squad will open its season this evening with a meet against the University of Toronto. The contest will be held in the hangar gymnasium at 7:30 o'clock sharp and admission will be free to all holders of the undergraduate dues card. Reserved seats at the ringside will also be on sale. Although the ability of the Toronto team is more or less of a conjecture, the general trend of opinion concedes a victory to the Institute, for the varsity men have all had experience in the squared circle and are now in tip-top condition.

The bout that presents the greatest problem is the lightweight clash, for there is no regular varsity man in this position. Like the great majority of Institute sports, boxing is sorely in need of heavy men and at present the 175 pound position is wide open to any husky boy who will come out and put on the gloves. The latest find is Art Brockelman, a big Junior who tips the scales at 173 pounds, and, although somewhat lacking in boxing experience, has signified his intention of coming out for the manly art. Coach Bouteiller has hopes of making a strong boxer out of Brockelman and is working him out often.

Tonight's meet includes a 175 pound bout, but no decision has been made as to who will place for the Institute. The only possibilities are Brockelman and Ed Moll, who has been forced to stop boxing but who will enter this bout if he sees a chance to carry it off. Manager Moll said Saturday, that he would have both himself and Brockelman weighed in; so that the choice of

the two would be left to the last minute. Moll is a regular 145 pound man so would box at a disadvantage against a heavier man, while Brockelman, on the other hand, has not had sufficient practice to enable him to hold his own against a regular man on the opposing team.

Light Classes Promising

Both the 115 and 125 pound bouts are considered to be pretty certain wins for the Institute. Schultz and Captain Bobby Smith, both last year's men who did grade A work for the Institute, are in the same fine form this year, as their recent performance at the B. A. A. games clearly showed. Smith carried off all the honors in the featherweight section while Schultz classed in the finals of the bantamweights. Both bouts tonight will show some high class boxing and are a big drawing card.

Gensel will probably enter the 135 pound division and the class of boxing that he has been showing in practice bouts points to a good showing tonight. Charlie Kuhn has been selected to replace Moll in the welterweights and though he has not shown the speed and ducking ability of Moll, he has a pile-driver smash which ought to wreck somebody tonight.

Korinsky in Fine Form

Korinsky, the regular 160 pound man, is going a gale this season and is looked upon for a win tonight. He has a peculiar deceiving style of boxing which is pretty to watch, and always pleases the fans. No unlimited bout has been called for, this being one of the conditions of the contract, and this will be the case in most of the meets to come unless some heavy men snap to and come out for the team.

The Toronto aggregation has agreed to the conditions of the contract for each bout to go three two minute rounds with one minute in between. The men will face each other as follows:

Frosh Team Outclassed

The freshmen were not in the running with the Harvard team after the first lap in which Wiebe kept close to his man. K. A. Smith taking the baton from Wiebe trailed Eaton of the Crimson for a 12 yard intervening space. He cut down this lead materially in the latter part of his leg, until the Harvard runner was only leading by six yards at the finish.

K. E. Smith kept the distance about the same, losing a little, if anything. On the fourth lap Haggerty, the Crimson runner, got off to a big advantage and he further increased it until he had one fourth a lap lead on Kauzeman. He continued to gain having a full half a lap advantage at the finish line.

Ambach in Four Heats

Much credit is due Captain Russ Ambach for his work in the 45 yard handicap hurdles. He had to run in four heats, and did well coming in second in the final. He ran in a trial heat, in one of the semi-finals, in a run-off of the men who placed second in the semi-finals, and finally in the last heat.
