Five Men Make Trip as Coach

The Engineer relay team will run in their third contest of the season when they meet the strong Princeton quartet at the Millrose games held tonight at Madison Square Garden, New York. Five men and the manager will make the trip, as Coach Connor sees no necessity for going himself. This means that an additional man can be taken on the team. The five men who will make the trip with Assistant Manager Charlie Poor are Captain Glen Bateman, Joyce, Howlett, Jeppe and Davidson.

The whole squad had a workout Monday afternoon and are on edge for this run with Princeton which promises to be one of the toughest on the Beavers' schedule. After losing the first two runs of the season the Engineers are determined to come through the victors in tonight's race. As it stands now the same team that ran against Brown in the Knights of Columbus games last Saturday will meet the Tiger team.

BUDD IS NEXT ALDRED SPEAKER

President of Great Northern
Railroad Will Speak
Next Friday

Ralph Budd, President of the Great Northern Railway, has been secured as the speaker for the next Aldred Lecture to be given Friday at 3 o'clock in room 10-250. His subject will be "The Opportunity for Individual Initiative in Railroad Work."

Mr. Budd has had wide experience in railroad work of all kinds. He received the Bachelor of Science degree from Highland Park College in Des Moines with the class of 1899. He immediately became connected with the railroad industry and has been intimately connected with it since that time.

From 1899 to 1902 Mr. Budd was with the Chicago, Great Western Railroad. During that time he advanced to the position of assistant engineer. He then entered the employ of the Chicago, Rock Island, and Pacific Railroad. He began with this company as road master. In a short time he was advanced to general superintendent and finally to construction and division engineer. His next position was chief engineer of the Panama Railroad at Colon, Panama from 1906 until 1909. From 1909 to 1912 he was chief engineer for the Oregon Trunk Railway and the Spokane, Portland & Seattle Railway and also the Spokane & Inland Empire Railroad.

In 1913 Mr. Budd commenced relations with the Great Northern Railway in the capacity of assistant to the president and chief engineer of that railway. He was promoted to executive vice-president in 1918 and finally chosen

TORONTO PROVES HARD MATCH FOR VARSITY BOXERS

Smith and Gray Are Feature of
Evening in Fast 125
Pound Bout

MOLL DEFEATS SHUTE IN LIGHTHEAVY FRAY

Contrary to the general opinion which foretold victory, the varsity boxing squad went down to defeat before the leatherpushers from the University of Toronto Monday evening to the tune of 5 to 1, the Institute team securing but one bout out of the six scheduled. The Canadians have been making a tour of the American colleges and only last week suffered a bad beating at the hands of the West Point team which accordingly raised the hopes of the Institute men. The grade of boxing presented by the visitors came as a surprise, especially that shown in the 125 and 158 pound classes. Ed Moll, boxing in the light heavy division was the only one of the varsity men to obtain a favorable decision from the judges.

Korinsky Loses to Black

The fray opened up with Korinsky opposing Black in the middleweight division. Korinsky's peculiar and deceiving style of fighting gave Black a little trouble at first and he was obliged to do a lot of sidestepping to evade a wicked left hook that Korinsky was aiming at him continually. At the end of the round he was winded but came out for the second spasm with a force that swept his opponent around the ring. Black was over-anxious and missed several wild swings to the head but landed two mean body blows. During the final round he confined his fighting to attempts at body-blows, several of which landed and tired Korinsky to some extent. The decision went to Black who, though he certainly deserved the decision, did not make the showing he was expected to make. Black is captain of the visiting team and has several years' experience in the ring, being intercollegiate champion in his class and a probable man

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MILITARY ENGINEERS HOLD SMOKER TONIGHT

"Flashes of Action" War Moving
Picture To Be Shown

At the combined smoker of the Society of American Military Engineers and the advanced Engineer R. O. T. C. to be held tonight in room 5-330 at 7:30 o'clock, a five reel official war picture entitled "Flashes of Action" will be shown.

The film, which is similar to the picture "Powder River" shown at the Tremont Temple Theatre, was taken by the Photographic Section of the Signal Corps at the loss of 11 men killed in filming actual battles. Starting with the trip over on the "Leviathan" the picture shows the progress of the men to the front line trenches. All branches of the service are shown in action, from the burning of an enemy balloon by a plane to a battery of the famous 75's firing. Scenes such as the above, the officers of the Military Science department expect, will make the film interesting and worth while seeing.

CHOOSE LEADERS FOR SENIOR WEEK

Nomination Blanks Due Friday
And Saturday—Election
Next Wednesday

Nominations for the Senior Week Committee and Senior Marshals are due in the Information Office between 9 o'clock Friday and 12 Saturday, while the election itself will be held a week from today. The signatures of five sponsors are necessary to make the nomination valid, while no one is eligible for nomination who was not a member of the Junior Class last year.

Voting for members of the Senior Week Committee is by the Hare-Spence system, while the Marshals are elected by Australian ballot. In the former system, the voter selects the 25 men he desires to have elected, and then puts a number after the names of the men in the order of his preference. That is he puts 1 after A's name, 2 after B's and so forth on down through 25.

In selecting the 25 winners, the numbers of first, second, third, etc., are considered. The three Class Day Marshals, however, are determined by the three men having the highest number of first choices.

According to the Undergraduate Constitution nomination blanks must be in the following form: "We, the undersigned members of the Class of 1924, do hereby nominate _____ for the Senior Week Committee of our Class." The sponsors signatures follow and at the bottom of the paper must be the words "I hereby accept the nomination" followed by the signature of the nominee.

His book, as one critic has said, does for the campus what "Main Street" did for the small town. Mr. Prescott gave a criticism of the book and suggested some of its applications to life at Technology.

FRATERNITIES TO LEAVE THE DORMITORIES

Expiring of Leases Will Cause
Houses to Move Sooner
Than Intended

LIVING ROOM CHANGED INTO MEETING PLACE

Are Planning to Build or Buy
Either in Brookline
or Boston

Expiring of leases, and the wish of the Institute officials to use the space occupied by the two fraternities in the Dormitories, has caused the Delta Kappa Epsilon and Delta Tau Delta fraternities to look for other quarters earlier than they had expected to.

Boston being so inaccessible according to the fraternity men especially at night, makes their quarters in Cambridge less desirable than was thought when they first moved into the Dormitories, and the two houses have been contemplating a move into Boston or Brookline for some time. The leases expiring has made both parties to the agreements reluctant to sign for another term of years, and the result is that the houses will move into new quarters sometime this summer.

The plans of both of the fraternities are indefinite as yet, but the Delta's are planning either for a building or buying program and the D. K. E.'s will rent a house next year and will probably build the year after.

Lounge and Meeting Room Planned

The living room in the front wing facing Charles River Road is to be turned into a lounge and meeting room for the dormitory men and the living room on Ames Street will be used in all probability as a double or triple suite. The rest of the rooms on the first floor of both wings will be converted into single and double suites. This conversion will also take in the service rooms, by taking out the cooking apparatus and partitioning off the large rooms into smaller ones.

The rooms above the first floor will be left much the same as they are now with but a few exceptions where it is absolutely necessary for change on account of private occupancy.

Fraternities to Be Excluded Hereafter
Because of increased numbers to occupy the quarters now held by the two houses, more showers and wash-rooms will be put in during the summer at which time it is planned to ren-

Dorm Inventor, Refusing to Rise in Cold, Perfects Window Closer

Closely following the agitation for "Busy Signals" in the Dormitories, comes announcement of a new invention by a dorm man. If this is acted on, and made a feature of future dormitory construction, the comfort and utility of dorm rooms will be greatly increased.

A. H. Brown, Jr. '26, of Course II, has recently perfected a device for automatically closing his window in the morning, early enough so that his room will be warm by the time he arises.

The mechanism of this device includes an electric motor, a set of gears, an old alarm clock and sundry switches. The clock, with the alarm

removed, is set for any desired hour. When this hour is reached, the clock closes the motor circuit, which sets the motor in motion. This closes the window by means of the gears. When the windows come to the closed position, they operate a switch, which shuts off the motor. Thus, the occupant is enabled to awake some time later and find his window already closed, and the room warm enough to enable him to dress in comfort.

When interviewed on the subject, Brown gave a demonstration of the operation of the device, and the witnesses agreed that its operation was very satisfactory. He declined to state whether or not the device is to be put on the market.
