

1927 WRESTLERS BOW TO ANDOVER IN HARD BATTLE

Superior Ability of Visitors
Too Much for Yearlings
Who Lose 18-7

CAPT. FRANKS STARS FOR INSTITUTE TEAM

The freshman wrestling team was forced to bow to the Andover yearlings in a hard fought meet Saturday afternoon to a score of 18 to 7. Although outclassed in almost every bout, the cubs stuck gamely and showed some fine work, the 158 pound bout being declared a draw after two overtime periods had been called. The wrestling of Captain Franks in the 145 pound class was the feature of the meet, Franks securing a fall in a little over three minutes.

The first bout on the card was between Powell and Yanaguchi (Andover), in the 115-pound division. The Andover man is a clever little Jap who showed great speed and strength and was way ahead of his man from the start. Powell showed good stuff in refusing to be thrown, but stuck out the bout, the decision going to Andover with a time advantage of 8m. 33s.

Visitors Assume Lead

The next two bouts were given to the Andover team, one by a fall and the other by time advantage. James was thrown by Heilman, of the visitors who used a half-nelson and body hold effectively, the bout lasting 3 minutes. Captain Capra of Andover was unable to throw Harris, although he maintained the advantage of the bout for 8m. 5s. Harris could not shake his man off but succeeded in keeping his shoulders from the mat.

Captain Franks came through with his usual high grade work in the 145 pound bout, throwing Flynn in 3m. 26s., using a half-nelson and an arm lock. Franks has starred in previous meets and promises to develop into an excellent matman. The bout between the heavyweights, Burke and W. Blunt (Andover) was hectic while it lasted and provided plenty of excitement for the crowd. Burke forced the match from the start, but in the tussle, he fell on his shoulders and Blunt managed to hold him there. The bout lasted 5 minutes and 15 seconds.

158-Pound Bout a Draw

C. Blunt of Andover and Giles wrestled the last bout of the meet in the 158 pound class, putting up a whale of a fight. Blunt was by far the better wrestler but Giles is exceptionally strong and broke every hold the other man tried. Giles himself attempted very few holds, seeming to rely wholly on his strength. At the end of the regular period, it was decided to call an overtime period and then another one but, as at the end, there was only four seconds difference between the men, the bout was called a draw, netting each side two points. Giles has strength and agility and with a little more knowledge of the different holds would have easily thrown his man. The summary:—

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ills of employee relations. Perhaps the one absolute essential is that the official directly in charge of employees shall have faith in them; be loyal to them, and fair and impartial in all his dealings with them as he is with this company.

Government Regulation Justified

"A feeling of reciprocal friendship and cooperation is worth more than the strongest wage contract ever made. Men do not give their best efforts for mere pay in money, but for the love of accomplishment. First of all the elements that go to make a success in the railroad business, as in any other, is to be passionately fond of the work."

A brief history of railroad construction in this country and a more detailed account of the regulations imposed were given in the talk. Mr. Budd declared, "The public character of railroad transportation and its intimate relation to the life of all industry, as well as all individuals, justify, if they do not necessitate, its regulation by state and federal authorities."

Affords Great Field

In closing the lecturer stated, "There will always be need of additions and improvements to the railroad system of this country; some new road should be built and refinements and economies in operation be sought and applied. The standards of living in this country demand the best railroad service in the world; the remoteness of its centers of population from each other and from its areas of production demand the cheapest. What greater field of endeavor should a young man seek?"

EXETER TANKER BREAKS SCHOOL RECORD IN 200

The freshmen swimming team was decisively beaten at Exeter last Saturday afternoon. The meet, however, was of a much closer nature than the score might lead one to suspect. Every event was hotly contested, and it was only by an extraordinary brand of swimming on the part of Exeter that the yearlings were beaten by such a wide margin.

Record Broken in 200

In the 200 yard dash Newick of Exeter broke the school record for this event in the fast time of 2 min. 24 sec. Johnson of Tech took third. In the relay Tech's chances were lost when one of the swimmers missed touching the end of the pool at the turn, and was forced to go back in order not to have had the team disqualified. Higgins, a new man, took third place in the dive. He failed to win second place by the slightest of margins. Purcell took third in the breast stroke, and Friedman won third place in the back stroke.

Tech Wins Two Seconds

In the 50 yard dash Armstrong came in a close second to Grover of Exeter. Campbell captured second place in the 100 yard swim. Both men swam excellent races, and should make good material for next year's varsity. Considering the keen competition the frosh were up against they did not make a bad showing, and the team as a whole looks capable of developing into some very worth while material.

Next Meet With Cambridge Latin

Tomorrow afternoon at 5 o'clock the freshmen swimmers will meet the Cambridge Latin tankers in the Cambridge Y. M. C. A. pool.
