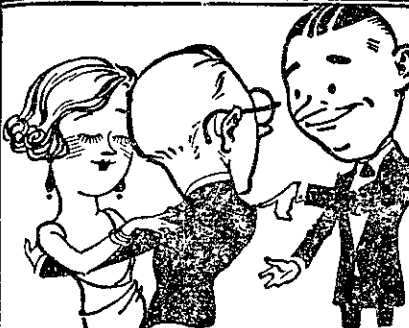




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FROSH TANKERS

Freshmen Outclass Opponents
In Most Events But
Lose Plunge

CAMPBELL AND JOHNSON

SECURE FIRST PLACES

Yesterday afternoon in the Cambridge Y. M. C. A. pool the cub swimmers won an easy victory from the Cambridge Latin School. The Cambridge tankmen were outclassed in every event but the plunge in which they took first and second places. Puffer of Technology coming in third.

Campbell distinguished himself by capturing two first places and swimming a good race in the relay. Technology won the relay by a very wide margin, the anchor man for Technology having completed his distance before the last man for Cambridge was able to start. In the 40 yard dash Campbell took first and Armstrong came in third. Armstrong really came in second, but due to the fact that Campbell swam out of his course, interfering with one of the Cambridge swimmers, second place was awarded to Cambridge. In the 100 yard dash Campbell took first and Himrod finished in second place.

Johnson Wins Sprint

Johnson of Technology won first place easily in the 200 yard sprint. Wies came in third for the cubs, failing to take second place by the slightest of margins.

In the dive Higgins was awarded second place, though it was very hard to make a decision between Higgins and Greer of Cambridge for first. Wies won third place in the dive for the yearling swimmers. The cub tankmen now have an average of 500, having won three meets and lost three to date. The team has been improving constantly and should do well in their remaining meets. "MARY" RESURRECTED

BOW TO YEARLING

Umbenhauer and Engel Star in
Rough Game Which Shows
Many Errors

ALL HARVARD POINTS

NETTED BY SAME MAN

The freshman basketball team defeated the Harvard Medical School basketeers in the Walker Gym last night in a fast and furious game, the final score being 14 to 10. Durno secured all the points for the visiting team, netting four goals and two fouls. Umbenhauer and Engel starred for the frosh, each sinking two baskets apiece, while a general improvement was noted in team work and especially on the defensive side of the game.

Game Not Unlike Football

The game was marked by frequent rough stuff and much pushing and mauling among the players so that the action greatly resembled football at times. Both teams seemed over-anxious and attempted almost impossible shots while the Harvard team missed several easy shots.

Durno, who starred for the Medics, was an all-coast forward for Oregon for three years and showed some occasional flashes of playing and in general was far ahead of the rest of his team as far as speed and general knowledge of the game went. The Harvard center, Larkey, played an exceptionally good game working closely with Durno. Larkey has also played in the West, coming from the University of California where he was at center.

Many Fouls Called

Because of the ungente style that was used during the game, several fouls were called, the frosh scoring on four of these. Umbenhauer sunk three himself and played an all-around good game working in some fast attacks with Jenkins and Steinbrenner. The summary:

VARSITY RIFLES

WIN OVER IOWA

Fielding Breaks Own Record
of Intercollegiates in
Fifth Victory

The varsity rifle team beat Iowa State by 23 points in a prone and standing match which ended last Saturday. Fielding took individual honors with a 100 in the prone and 95 in the standing positions. His score in the standing position being three points higher than he made in the Intercollegiates in which he took individual honors for that position. Ed Murphy, ex-captain of the Institute team, came in second with a 90 standing and a 100 prone.

By defeating Iowa State, one of the strongest teams of the west, makes the fifth victory of the Beaver rifles this season, their only defeat being in the Intercollegiates in which they took third place.

Beavers Good at Prone

Six perfect scores were turned in for the prone position, but only four could be used as their other scores were low. The manager, C. E. Peterson, was forced to shoot at the last minute in the place of one of the men who failed to show up, but even so the team's average was maintained at a high level.

Individual scores were as follows: J. H. Fielding '25, 195; E. D. Murphy '25, 190; Captain D. M. Creveling '24, 188; J. E. Jackson '24, 187; Manager C. E. Peterson '25, 183. M. I. T., 943; Iowa State, 920. A perfect score being 100 in each position, or 1000 for the team.

The resignation of Stan Cook as captain of the varsity basketball team was announced at the meeting of the Advisory Council on Athletics last night. The resignation is to go into effect immediately, and a new man will be elected to the captaincy soon.

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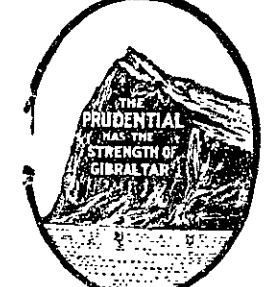
