

BASKETBALL TEAM PLAYS TWICE ON N. Y. TRIP

LEATHERPUSHERS EXPECTING BATTLE ROYAL WITH NAVY

Meet With Midshipmen Will Not Include Any Bout in Unlimited Class

GENSELL TO FIGHT IN LIGHTWEIGHT DIVISION

The varsity boxing team will run off one of their two remaining meets this season when they box the Navy team at Annapolis tomorrow. Contrary to the conditions of the Colgate meet last Saturday, there will be no bout in the unlimited class so that he Institute squad will not have to solve the problem of finding a man to box in this class. Like many of the Institute sports, boxing needs heavy men, so far the team has been up against it in this respect. In the Colgate meet, Eddie Moll was forced to box both the light-heavy and unlimited bouts, winning one but losing the second as the strain was too much. Moll will box in the 175 pound division at Annapolis, although his rib still bothers him. The injury it received in the Colgate meet is almost cured but leaves Moll somewhat ticklish in that spot.

Six Bouts to be Run Off
The meet will include six bouts, the lineup of the Institute team being the same as last Saturday against Colgate with the exception that Gensell will box in the 135 pound division, thus taking that bout off the shoulders of Captain Bob Smith, a regular feather-weight man who battled in the 135 pound class against Colgate. Institute Team Will Journey to Hanover to Play Dartmouth

GREEN TEAM STRONG—EXPECT HARD FIGHT

The varsity hockey team will journey to Hanover Saturday where they have a meet with the Dartmouth sextet. The Beavers have been working under serious difficulties this season and have lost all three games that were played. In their meet with West Point last Saturday they showed an improvement in form over the Crimson game of a month ago, but the soft condition of the ice prevented any exhibition of more than ordinary hockey. The Green have developed a strong, fast team and have the advantage of much wider experience than the Technology sextet.

Lost Twice to Yale
The same combination that opposed the Cadets a week ago will start off against Dartmouth tomorrow. McPherson will play at right wing with Randall or Weissner in the opposite position. Dalton will be in his usual position at center with Captain Denton Massey at goal, while Sawyer and Niles will hold the defense positions. The former on the defense has had considerable experience in that position and is expected to offer strong opposition to the Green team.

The Dartmouth team has had a busy season compared to what the Beavers have had. They began by defeating Amherst and Williams but losing two contests to Yale. In a trip to Canada the Green played a 1-1 tie game with the Nichols Club of Buffalo, and in closing their Christmas trip, lost to Princeton, 2-1, at the Boston Arena.

About the middle of last month they tied the Berlin Hockey Club team 3-3 in a contest at Hanover, and later defeated St. Nicks of New York in the Boston Arena by a 2-1 score. Last Monday night the Dartmouth team was defeated by Yale 2-0 making a total of four defeats, two ties, and three victories.

Saturday's contest will be played as one of the athletic events on the Carnival Program. Much opposition is expected from Captain Hall the outstanding player on the Green squad and from Manser who has been leading the team in scoring.

WRESTLING TEAM TO OPPOSE NAVY IN SEVEN BOUTS

Problem of Unlimited Class Still Faces Team—No Choice Made Yet

MEET WILL PROVE A HARD FIGHT FOR TEAM

The varsity wrestling team will face the Navy grapplers in a meet consisting of seven bouts tomorrow with the problem of the unlimited class facing them. No man has reported for this class so that the team must choose between forfeiting the bout together with five points or placing a lighter man in this class with the corresponding risk of his being injured by a heavier man. In this case the chances for a win in the unlimiteds are small but the man may at least be able to stick out the time and accord the Navy only a time advantage which would net them three points.

Hereford May Wrestle Unlimited
Rock Hereford has offered to wrestle in the unlimited section but no definite decision has been reached. Hereford is a regular 158 pound man but in the event of his wrestling in a higher class, Bowles will replace him in the 158 pound bout. In the meet with the Boston Young Men's Christian Union, the first one for the varsity this season, Hereford wrestled in the 175 pound class and obtained an easy decision. Bowles replacing him in the 158 pound class. In that meet, Captain Greer was ill and unable to wrestle his favorite class so that Hereford was forced to take it. However, Greer will travel along tomorrow so that Hereford may take on the unlimited man.

Grinnell and Norwood will take the 145 and 135 pound bouts while the matter of the 125 pound division is still open. Either Kurtin or Cummings will place. Kurtin has a weak arm due to an injury received in the first meet of the season, but hopes to be able to wrestle tomorrow. Coyle will be the choice in the 115 pound fray and is keeping in a wiry condition that bodes ill for his opponent.

In the meet against the midshipmen last year, the Institute team won but two bouts. Greer and Hereford securing the decisions in the 158 and 175 pound classes. The men expect a hard battle this year also as the Navy has virtually conserved its regular lineup. Walt Kennett hurt shoulder during practice this week and still feels the effects of the injury so that the team will probably not have his services tomorrow.

PRINCETON RUNNERS THANK MILE RELAY

team is said to have one of the best teams in their section, and as the varsity only lost to them by one point, they are expected to make a very good showing against B. P. I. and C. C. N. Y.

As there was no game between these teams and the Beavers last year no comparison can be made as to who will be the victors in the coming contests. If the varsity plays as good a game against B. P.
