

STUDENT ESSAYS AWARDED PRIZES LAST SATURDAY

Whitney Ashbridge, Mary Soroka and Natale Goda Receive \$25 Awards

THEMES FORM PART OF REGULAR TERM'S WORK

The Boit Prizes of \$25 each for excellency in composition in the first term of Sophomore English work were awarded by Professor H. G. Pearson at a lecture in EH22 last Saturday. The winners are Whitney Ashbridge who wrote "A Criticism of Anatole France's 'The Isle of Penguins,'" Natale Goda with an essay on "The Decline of Socialism in Europe," and Miss M. Q. Soroka who wrote on "Students and the Traditional Student."

Miss Soroka's essay was an account of the habits and characteristics of a male student from the point of view of a co-ed. This is the first time that a woman student has won a Boit prize. The themes which received honorable mention are "A Rather Garbled Comment on the Essay," written by A. C. Hammatt and "The Strong and the Weak Points of American Democracy" by J. K. Summer.

Use Interest on \$5000 Fund

These prizes are awarded to members of the Sophomore Class in English and History on the basis of the required written work done by them during the term, three prizes of \$25 dollars each being awarded each term of the school year. The money represents the interest on a fund of \$5,000 which was left to the Institute by the will of the late R. A. Boit in order "to stimulate interest in the best use of the English language."

The committee of judges who awarded the prizes consisted of Professor H. G. Pearson, J. S. Newberry and Penfield Roberts, all of whom are members of the Department of English and History at the Institute. Contrary to the usual custom, no outsider was a member of the committee.

NAVY OVERWHELMS TECH GRAPPLERS

Rock Hereford Sole Winner In
Hard Fought Battle
At Annapolis

The varsity wrestlers were defeated at Annapolis Saturday by the score of 22-3. Rock Hereford was the only Engineer wrestler to get a decision, he defeated Smith of the Navy in 3 minutes 17 seconds. The match was hard fought throughout and the sailors had no easy time of it in securing their decisions.

In the initial match Davidson of the Navy won a quick decision over Coyle, but Cummings of Technology gave Timberlake a stiff battle before he was downed with a body lock, the time of this match being 5 minutes and 20 seconds. The 135-lb. scrap was between Simmons and Norwood of the Engineers, Simmons getting the decision in 7 minutes 55 seconds.

In the 175-lb. division Greer and Wieweg of the Navy put up a good fast scrap. Wieweg securing the decision after 7 minutes and 25 seconds. In the unlimited class Tyron lost to Edwards.

This win makes the third successive victory for the Navy team. They defeated Lehigh in the first match by the score of 16-11. Only one of the veterans of last year was in the sailors line-up, but there was an abundance of good material to form a new team.

The second match for the Navy was against Brooklyn Polytechnical, which they took by the score of 28-0 in five falls and one decision.

WESLEYAN TIES THEIR TANK RECORD IN RELAY

Last Friday afternoon the Technology tankmen were beaten decisively by the Wesleyan team. The score which was 59-12 does not indicate the fast competition that was offered in every event. The inability of Nip Marsh to make the trip with the team to Middleton had a very disastrous effect on the outcome of the meet. Marsh was entered in three events, and there was no one to successfully fill his place. Robinson, who is an excellent man in the back stroke, missed the train, and so was unable to participate in the meet.

Relay Is Fast

The relay was almost a dead heat, the Wesleyan swimmers winning by the very slightest of margins. The time for this event was 1 minute 22.5 seconds, which equals the records for the Wesleyan pool. If Marsh had been swimming it is likely that the record would have been broken. In the 40 yard dash Dunn took second, and Taylor came in third. This event was most hotly contested, the first three men all coming in within two feet of each other. The time for the 40 was 20.1-5 seconds. Captain Dave Evans captured second place in the 220 yard sprint, the time being 1 minute 48 seconds. Dunn won third place in the 100 yard dash. The time for this event was fast, the distance being covered in 59.1-5 seconds.

Due to the absence of Robinson, Keay was Technology's only entrant in the back stroke. Keay placed third, time 1 minute 18.2-5 seconds.

In the plunge Cates placed third. Kerns took third place in the breast stroke. The time for this event was rather fast, being 1 minute 25 seconds. Keay won third place in the dive. The swimming team like most of the other Institute teams has suffered heavily from lack of material, and the loss of good men who have been forced to leave the team because of their scholastic status.
