BOXERS JOURNEY TO NEW HAVEN TO MEET YALE TEAM

Institute Ringmen Handicapped By Loss of Gensell in 135 Pound Class

CAPT. BOB SMITH MAY HANDLE TWO CONTESTS

Tomorrow the varsity boxing team will go to New Haven where they will trade punches with the Yale squad in a meet which promises to be full of good fighting. The Yale meet has always been a big feature of the boxing season as the sons of Eli put out a speedy bunch of fighters. Two years ago, the meet was tied, 3 to 3, and last year Yale carried off the honors by socking the Institute team for a 5 to 1 victory. Lew Phillips, a lightweight, being the only point-getter for the Beavers. Although this year's team is without the services of either Phillips or Al Lindsay, Captain Bob Smith is again with the team while Eddie Moll and Konrisky are showing some fine boxing.

Gensell Probably Will Not Fight
Owing to an injury to his hand, suffered last Saturday in the meet against the Navy team, Gensell will probably not be able to make the trip to Yale. The ligaments in his right hand, which he uses effectively in the ring, have been strained to such an extent that it has become too painful for him to box. This leaves the 135 pound class wide open, although there is the possibility of Smith boxing in this class as well as in the featherweight division, as he did in the meet with Colgate University.

There will be no unlimited bout so that the team will not have to dig up a man to place in this class. As there is yet no regular light-heavyweight on the team, there is some question as to who will place in this bout. The two possibilities are Eddie Moll and Mike Konrisky, the latter a middleweight, while Moll is a regular 145 pound man. Moll did a good job in the 175 pound bout at the Colgate meet although this bout was entrusted to Konrisky in the meet with Navy.

Last Meet of Schedule
Chuck Kuhn will go along to fight the welterweight bout, and it is expected that he will put up a good battle, as he has been showing some

Yearling Sextet Plays Tomorrow

Cubs Opposed by Brookline High in Final Game of Season

The freshman hockey team will meet the Brookline High sextet tomorrow afternoon in their last game of the season. Although nothing definite is known as to the strength of the Brookline team, it is expected they will offer strong resistance to the frosh yearlings.

The Beaver cubs will be ready for them, as they are anxious to even up their record for the season. They have not been able to get in any practice this week, as the varsity season is over and the Arena is no longer available for frosh use. The team has not been idle but has had several short blackboard talks which proved so helpful to the men in their game with Andover last week.

The team has shown constant improvement, although they were considerably hampered at the beginning of the season by lack of ice. The same combination that opposed Andover last Saturday will start off against Brookline tomorrow. Woodbury and Duncan will occupy the wing positions, with Berkeley at center. The defense will be well taken care of by Captain Grandell and Priest, and Richards will tend goal as usual.

Yearling Rifles Oppose Columbia And Penn State

The freshman rifle team have a meet with Columbia and Penn State freshmen which will be concluded tomorrow afternoon. Although suffering from a rather poor start, the R. O. T. C. team has been showing marked improvement during the past two weeks, and with the new rifles which the Military Science Department has recently supplied they hope to do even better than they have been doing. It is to be a prone match, five men will represent the team, each being allowed to shoot ten shots. The prone position is the easiest to shoot from, so high scores are to be expected.

RIFLEMEN SHOOT AGAINST DREXEL

The varsity marksmen are having a meet with the Drexel Institute which will be concluded Saturday afternoon. It is to be a prone contest, ten men shooting ten shots each, those scoring the five best results being considered those representing the team.

Drexel Institute has beaten the Beaver rifles in contests for the past two years, but tomorrow the Engineer team hopes to turn the tables the other way as the team is especially strong in the prone position as was demonstrated in their meet last Saturday with McGill when seven perfect targets were turned in. The rifle team this season is leading all the New England colleges in scoring, their only defeat being in the Intercollegiate where they took third place.

BEAVERS OPPOSE BRUIN WRESTLERS TOMORROW NIGHT

Hangar Gym Will Be Scene of Contest—Brown Has Strong Team

ENGINEERS TO PRESENT LINE THAT MET NAVY

The varsity wrestling team meets Brown in the Hangar Gym Saturday night at 8 o'clock. Since Brown is our greatest rival in wrestling, a hard-fought meet seems certain. Last year Tech held the New England Intercollegiate championship and this year it is held by Brown, with Tech as runner-up. For several years, Brown has defeated Tech by small margins in dual meets, and this year the Tech team is determined to avenge these defeats.

The Brown team is believed to be somewhat less strong than last year as it has lost Bob Spellman, for two years champion, first in the 158 pound class and last year in the 175 pound class, and Staples, last year's 145 pound champion. However they have regained the services of John Spellman, for two years New England amateur champion and captain of the Brown football team last season, who wrestles in the unlimited class, and Eckstein, Intercollegiate champion two years ago, also a football star who will meet Captain Greer in the 175 pound class. The other men on the Brown team are mostly experienced wrestlers who are certain to put up a strong competition.

Tech Matmen in Fine Condition
The Tech lineup will probably not be changed from that which went to Annapolis last week. Ted Coyle, who lost a hair-line decision at the Navy,

Gymnasts Meet Dartmouth For First Struggle

Lost Last Year but Practically Certain of Gaining a Decisive Win

MEN NOW HAVE SERIES GOING IN FINE FORM

Tomorrow the gym team will meet Dartmouth in the latter's gymnasium in the first meet of the season. Although last year we were beaten by a small margin, and Dartmouth again has a strong team, all the dope points toward a victory for the Beaver contestants. Practically the same men are on the team this year as were last but during the year they have gained a lot of experience and form, and all together they form one of the strongest and most seasoned teams in the east.

The men to be taken are as follows: on the high bar, Liehty and King; on the parallels, Ruiz and McCoy; on the rings, McCoy and Shea; on the mats, Anderson and Wayne; on the horse, Rol Turner. With the exception of Ed Wayne, the whole group is composed of old men who have been through at least one season before this, and accordingly, good results are expected.

No Rope Climbing
McCoy has taken the rope for this year, but due to the lack of proper equipment in the Dartmouth gym, the Dartmouth manager asked to have the climb suspended for this year in spite of the fact that it has been officially recognized. Unless some mighty tough luck comes around, McCoy's way, or an extremely dark horse makes its appearance at the meet, he should have

Navy Made Fast Times in Last Meet With University Of Pittsburgh

NIP MARSH IS ABLE TO SWIM AGAINST MIDDIES

Tonight at six o'clock the swimming team leaves for New York via the Fall River Line. Saturday morning the team leaves New York for Annapolis, where they will swim against the Navy tankmen in the evening. The Navy is fortunate in having an exceptionally fast team this year. In their meet last Saturday with the University of Pittsburgh the midshipmen made some very fast times. Rule of the Navy Academy clipped a second off the local record for the 50 yard dash. The Naval Academy also has a very fast relay team, as was shown by its easy win in the meet last Saturday. The Navy has a reputation for putting out excellent swimming teams, and as this year is no exception to the rule, the Varsity will undoubtedly have a hard task before them.

Nip Marsh To Swim
Nip Marsh is able to go to Annapolis with the team, and should make his presence felt as a scoring factor. Marsh swims in three events, the 50, the back stroke, and in the relay. It is not known as yet if Parsons will be able to go with the team as he is being bothered by ear trouble. The 40 yard dash has a host of Technology entries, and it will be a hotly contested event. Jeppe, Weibel of the frosh and Brown of the Sophomore relay are entered.

The Engineer entries in the 300 yard run ought to have a merry struggle among themselves with the quality of the material entered. Davidson, Joyce, and Kauffman lead the list, and in addition Manion and Tonry will run.

The meet tomorrow night will be a combination of the A.A.U. Championships and a triangular meet among Harvard, Dartmouth, and Cornell.

VARSITY TO MEET U. OF N. H. TONIGHT

Basketball Game With Granite State University To Be Played in Hangar

The Varsity Basketball game with the University of New Hampshire team will be played tonight in the Hangar. A preliminary game between the freshmen five and the Northeastern freshmen will be played first, the Varsity game starting promptly at eight. Coach Warren has been putting the squad through some pretty stiff practice sessions since their return from the New York trip, and under the leadership of Captain E. S. Johnston '25, will certainly keep the Granite State five busy.

New Hampshire Line-up Uncertain
As in previous games, Davidson and Lankton will start in the forward line, and with Captain Johnston playing his usual strong game at center, the Engineers should come in for some frequent scoring. In the back court, Levi and Caine have been working well together in breaking up opponent's advances, and have also been getting down the floor for frequent shots at the basket themselves. These five will, in all probability, start the game, but Symonds, Lauria, and Forrester, have all been doing good work in preliminary games and are likely to get into action before the game is over.

The exact New Hampshire line-up for tonight's game was not obtainable, but in Fer-nald and Atkinson, they have a pair of veteran forwards, while Wentworth and Metcalf, who have been prominent Varsity players during the past two seasons, are also likely to start the game.
