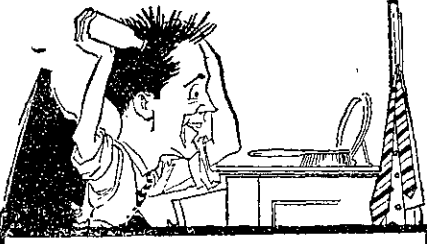


FROSH SWIMMERS

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HOCKEY TEAM FORCED TO
PLAY UNDER HANDICAPS

All But Two of the Varsity en were Lost to
Team by the End of the Season—New
Combination Was Formed

The varsity hockey season has been brought to an abrupt and rather unsuccessful close, as far as victories go, but was characterized throughout by a remarkable display of energy and spirit even in the face of serious difficulties encountered through the many depletions in the team as the season progressed.

At the beginning of the season the prospects for a strong team were extremely bright, as a large number of varsity men had turned out, among whom were six of last year's first line and several others who were ineligible the year before. Games had been arranged with the leading college teams and a Canadian trip had been planned for the latter part of the Christmas vacation. Coach Blacklock had been engaged again, and practice was begun with a great deal of enthusiasm.

Meet B. U. First

After three ice practices at the Arena, the team met the likewise inexperienced sextet, Boston University, on December 7. The game was characterized by little team work and mostly individual playing; nevertheless it proved a surprise and disappointment to Technology. The men showed plainly their excellent physical condition throughout the game, but were unable to penetrate or withstand their opponents' line, being defeated by a score of 7-1. After this game, practice was continued up to the week of final examinations. Later it was deemed advisable to give up the Canadian trip, partly because the team was not in a unified condition, and partly because of the difficulty of obtaining natural ice during the unseasonably warm weather in the Provinces. The men were naturally disappointed, but took it in a sportsmanlike manner and continued their practices with as much spirit as ever. Just before the opening of the second term, Rainnie, a former member of the Championship team of the provinces, was engaged to coach the team.

ENGINEERS PLAY BOSTON COLLEGE IN GYM TONIGHT

Hill-toppers Have Long String
of Victories and Only
One Defeat

Tonight in the Hangar the Beaver basketball team come up against a worthy foe in the Boston College quintet. The boys from the hilltop come here with the enviable record of having only lost one game, and that to the strong University of Vermont five, which also defeated Technology. However, Coach Warren's team has been on their toes for the last few games, and barring breaks such as a host of personal fouls which the referee called on the Engineers at Clark Saturday night, the team should come through victorious.

In that game, a rough affair from the standpoint of basketball, Technology received 27 personal fouls which was enough penalties to down the best college team in the country. Clark was held to two lonely goals from the floor by the strong defense of the Beavers. It was largely the referee's interpretation of the rules that put the team out of the running.

Davidson Injured

In the game with Clark, Davidson, playing right forward, received an unfortunate injury when in the first half a Clark man accidentally stuck his thumb in the Tech man's eye. His eyeball was irritated rather badly with the result that his shooting has been affected considerably. In the practice last night he seemed to be hitting the hoop fairly accurately. It is expected that Davidson, Caine and Johnson with perhaps Lankton and Hasting will start for Technology.

Boston College has registered victories over nearly all the smaller colleges of the East. They have been consistent winners and play a steady offensive and defensive game. Their victims include Holy Cross whom they defeated by two points and the strong University of Maine five whom they won over by one point after a fast and furious game.

Eager, who promised to be an aggressive guard, was injured again in the Vermont tussle after he had just recovered from the previous injury to his ankle. Out of justice to Eager, his unwanted hard luck kept him from making any kind of showing this season.

Just previous to the meeting with Harvard University on January 9, the first casualties of the season occurred in the ineligibility due to scholarships of two of the first string men. An attempt was made to postpone the game until a later date, and thus give the team time to reorganize, but it proved unsuccessful. The men played remarkably well, considering the depletions, but were shut out by Harvard 7-0. Captain Massey did especially brilliant work at his goal, making a large number of stops during the game.

Yale Game Cancelled

On the 16th of January, just as the team was preparing to depart for New Haven, it was announced that one of the remaining varsity men was removed from the Institute by vote of the faculty. Although the team was now in a doubly depleted condition they were still willing to go and put up the best possible fight; but when the situation was explained over the telephone to Dr. Mendel, of the Yale Advisory Council, it was decided it would be best to cancel the game. The canceling of the Yale game occasioned a great deal of unjust criticism of the Technology team, chiefly because the facts were not more fully known to others outside of those actively interested in the welfare of the team.

Dartmouth Last Game

Just previous to the Dartmouth game of February 9, the team lost another man, one of the three remaining varsity men, so that the game was played with a varsity man at goal and center, with the rest of the team composed of first and second string substitutes. Regardless of all this, very commendable fight and spirit were shown throughout the game, but they were no match for their superior opponents, being defeated by a score of 11-1. Captain Massey again showed his skill at goal, and MacPherson made the only score for Technology.

FROSH PLAY PRELIM

Tonight as a preliminary to the Varsity game, the Technology freshman basketball team will meet the Harvard cubs. Their first meeting in the early part of the season resulted in a 32 to 18 win for the Crimson, and consequently the Engineers are out for revenge tonight.

If they can strike the pace they set in the game with the Northeastern Business School, they should make the game decidedly interesting for the Harvard lads. The game with Andover last week did not show the freshmen at their best, and they have been working hard to stage a comeback.

M.I.T. OARSMEN TO
EAT AT TRAINING
TABLE THIS YEAR

Two Varsity Boats, 150-Pound
Eight and Frosh Crew To
Eat at Walker

As a part of the recent drive to turn out winning Technology crews this coming season, a training table for the oarsmen has been instituted in the Walker Memorial. While such a table was held last fall, attendance was voluntary on the part of the men. This spring, however, attendance is compulsory for the members of the first and second Varsity boats, the 150-pound Varsity boat, and the first freshman eight. 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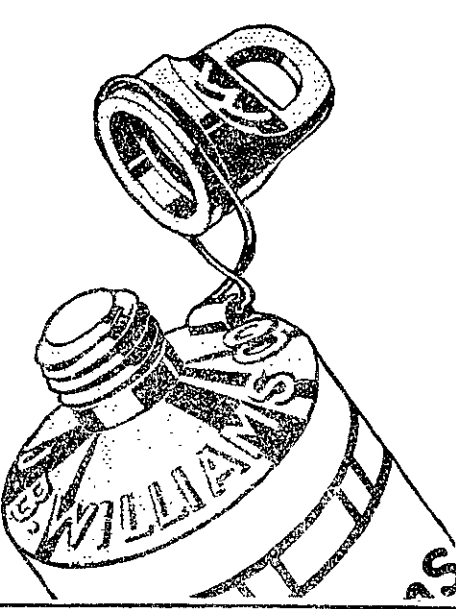


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
