

TRACK MEN ENTER INTERCOLLEGIATES

ENGINEERS HAVE MANY OPPONENTS IN ALL EVENTS

Team Is Crippled By Sickness And Injury for Meet In New York

DREW, GUBBY HOLT AND BATEMAN LOST TO TEAM

Technology Looks to Ambach And Blodgett to Score In the Hurdles

Captain Ambach leads his men tomorrow at New York against one of the hardest propositions which they have had to encounter for some time. The I. C. A. A. A. coming at the end of the season, as it does, always has been a tough meet and this year's meet is no exception because of the large number of men incapacitated by sickness and injury. The Beavers go to New York minus the services of Drew, the star weight man, Gubby Holt of the cross-country team, and Bateman, the Engineers' quarter-mile. In spite of this Doc Connors hopes to make a better showing than last year. Although there is to be no relay, the Engineers are to be represented in the 50 and 300 by Makepeace, who can be counted on to give a good account of himself. Because of the temporary disablement of Doug Jeppe, Technology's stock is rather low but if the other sprinters come through there is no reason why the Beaver team should not place at least one man in the dashes.

Ambach in Fine Form

No matter how the Engineers come out in the sprints, Technology ought to begin chalking up a sure place when Captain Ambach leaves his mark in the 45-yard low hurdles. Two weeks ago he ran a dead heat in this event which was clocked at a time equaling the world's record. His teammate Emons Blodgett can also be reckoned with as a formidable contestant, for this record holder has been performing in fine style during the last week and gives promise of breaking his own record before spring.

In the distances Doc Connors has entered Davidson and Simonds, two men who are almost certain to place if things break well. Davidson in particular has been showing up well and was invited to compete in the Gaston 600-yard at the Legion meet on Friday, while Giff Simonds has turned in some remarkably good times in his favorite event, the mile. Marvin Rick, another stellar distance man, is ineligible because of the one year rule.

Loss of Drew Felt

The Beaver trackmen feel the loss of Drew in the 35 lb. weight who, until his injury several days ago was looked upon as a sure point winner. In the other field events, however, Technology is strong especially in the pole-vault and the high jump. Sanford, the only man entered in the vault, has been performing quite consistently and Doc is counting on him to make a good showing on Saturday. In the high jump McArdle is the Engineers' best bet, but he is handicapped at present by a bad foot and it is somewhat doubtful whether he can compete.

R.O.T.C. GUNNERS ENGAGED IN MEET

The R. O. T. C. rifle team is now shooting off a match with Lawrenceville, Harvard, and Boston Commerce. They will use the same results for both Harvard and Lawrenceville. Dartmouth to Clash with Fencers Today

First Intercollegiate Meet Will be Held in Walker at Three O'clock—Result to Have Bearing on Finals

The fencing team will have its first intercollegiate meet against Dartmouth today in North Hall, Walker, at three o'clock. This is the first meet of any importance that the team has had so far and it depends a great deal upon this one whether Technology will qualify for the Intercollegiate or not.

Dartmouth has a very strong team but as the results of the Bowdoin meet proved, the Engineers also are not lacking in efficient swordsmen so the contest promises to be an exceedingly interesting one. Dartmouth took the Intercollegiate sabers last year but lost to Columbia which fact seems to offer some hope to our team as Serrano beat both of his opponents in sabers at our recent meet with the New Yorkers.

Bowdoin Beaten Easily

The Bowdoin meet proved conclusively that the one thing the Beavers needed was practical experience with other teams. In addition the fact that Technology won by so large a margin has given the team a lot of confidence

in itself and the men are eager to get into action.

Levis, Ferre and Hawthorne who did the bulk of the fencing against Bowdoin have been at it steadily ever since and are becoming faster every day. Also, they have apparently lost that nervousness which all men new at the game seem to feel when they go up against opponents whose style of swordwork they are not acquainted with. Lieutenant George Callahan, who directed last week's bouts, put them through some stiff workouts Saturday and Sunday, and by changing his style continually made them compete against difficult methods.

The usual men will take on the swords and sabers, Serrano and Blake fencing epee with Serrano and Hawthorne sabers. Blake has been doing some fine epee work lately and his stop thrust to the hand and arm has become a thing which he seldom misses. It was with this same move that he caught Clow of Bowdoin on the hand some four seconds after the bout started.

BROWN CUBS WIN BY HAIR MARGIN IN NARROW POOL

Frosh Lose Heartbreaking Swim With Score of 35-33 At Providence

Wednesday evening the freshman swimming team was just nosed out of a victory by the Brown yearlings. The Brown tank is extremely narrow, and only two men are able to swim at a time. For this reason each event was run off in two heats, one man from each team swimming in a heat—the results being judged on a time basis.

In most meets the relay counts eight points, but according to the New England Intercollegiate rules the relay counts but five. The Beaver swimmers had anticipated the relay as being worth eight points, and had made their calculations accordingly. If the relay had counted eight points the yearlings would have won the meet by one point, as they won the relay with ease. The Brown team was more than a lap behind when Johnson, the Technology anchor man, finished his distance. The relay team which is composed of Johnson, Campbell, Armstrong, and Himrod is extremely fast, and has been defeated but once this year.

Friedman Disqualified

Even though the relay counted but five points, the frosh would have won the contest had not an unfortunate accident occurred. In the back stroke Friedman came in first and Johnson took second, but Friedman was disqualified for interfering with a Brown swimmer, and as a result Johnson was awarded first place, and Brown took second and third. This made a difference of six points in the final score, as Brown would have had three points less, and Technology would have had three points more. In the 50 yard dash the Beavers walked away with first and second places, Armstrong winning first, and Campbell capturing second honors.

Johnson and Wies romped away with the 220 yard sprint in easy fashion. Johnson finished first by a wide margin, and Wies followed in second place. In the 100 yard dash Campbell came in a close second. In the 100 yard dash Campbell came in a close second, and Himrod took third place.

Dive, Plunge and Breast Stroke

The dive and plunge have been the weak points of the yearling team since the beginning of the season, and the Brown meet proved no exception to the rule. Brown had a man on her team who is the junior diving champion, and he won first honors with ease. Higgins missed taking second place by a narrow margin, and was forced to be content with third honors. In the plunge Brown again had things their own way, Puffer taking third place for Technology. In the breast stroke Brown made a clean sweep, Purcell taking third for the Beavers.

Will Meet Worcester

Davy Jones, the renowned Brown swimmer, gave an exhibition for the benefit of the freshmen tankers. In swimming the 220 yard sprint he swam the first 100 yards in 1 minute 33 seconds, and the total distance in 2 minutes 33 seconds. The Technology team found Brown very hospitable, and the entire

team enjoyed the trip extremely even though the Bears did get the honey.

Tomorrow afternoon the frosh tankmen will journey to Worcester where they will meet the Worcester Academy team. This will be the last meet of the season for the yearlings, and will be a deciding factor in the success of their season, as they have won and lost four games to date.

Worcester has a strong team this year, and thus far has had a fairly successful season. In one of their recent meets they defeated the Huntington School by the wide margin of 42-11. As was shown in their meet with Brown, the Technology yearlings tankers are in prime condition, and although the Worcester team is by no means an easy mark, the Technology cubs are favored to emerge victorious from the encounter. The entries will be the same as in the Brown meet.

WORCESTER MEETS FROSH ON BOARDS

Yearling Hurdlers and Weight Men Ought to Place in Indoor Final

The freshmen track team meets Worcester Academy tomorrow in the final test of the indoor season. The Engineer yearlings expect to make a good showing because, although Worcester is very strong in the dashes, they are equally weak in the field events and this is where the cubs are particularly good. The Beavers have been somewhat handicapped by sickness but on Saturday Doc Johnson promises to have every man in good shape.

As is the case with the varsity, the frosh are very confident of their hurdlers to score heavily for Van Mater, Fitzpatrick, and Wiebe are all topping the timbers in fast time. In the 600 and the 300-yard dashes K. A. Smith and Wiebe are entered, both of whom have been turning in fast times. The yearling distance men will have to compete with Tom Clausen, Worcester's veteran captain, but from the showing they made against Andover last Saturday it would seem as if Coach Connor's men were sure of at least two places in the mile if Gaylord can run.

Dexter will be unable to jump for the frosh, and as there is no one to take his place, Worcester is conceded three places in this event unless K. A. Smith decides to enter. In the shotput, the cubs have a decided edge, three of their men being able to heave around the 40-foot mark. As a concession to Worcester to make up for the omission of the pole-vault, there will be a relay race, in which the frosh have more than an even chance due to the fact that Wiebel and Becker are both on the active list again and can be counted on to make a strong bid for a win.

The basketball team was handicapped from the time that Stan Cook received the injury to his knee that kept him out for the rest of the season. He was troubled with the knee somewhat last year and a hard knock he got in one of the practices put it out of commission this season. Eager was out quite a time with a sprained ankle.

VARSITY LOSES LAST HOME GAME IN BASKETBALL

Boston College Offense Overcomes Engineer's Close Guarding

DAVIDSON AND SIMONDS LEAD HOME SCORER

The varsity basketball team was defeated 29-17 by the Boston College quintet, last Wednesday in the hangar. It was the Engineers' last game of the season on the home floor, and, although defeated, their playing and fight was by far the best they have shown for some time. Coach Warren changed the line-up considerably since the last game, and the new combination worked extremely well.

Technology started the opening period with a rush, and for a few minutes it appeared as though they were going to pile up a lead. Captain Johnston led a fast and aggressive attack, and by rapid and hard passing the Engineers kept possession of the ball the greater part of the time.

B. C. Defense Strong

The Boston College defence held fast, and kept the Beavers from scoring. Carroll of B. C. caged the first basket, starting the scoring for his team. After they had once struck their stride, the visiting five could not be stopped, but the Engineers put up a game fight all through the game, and constantly threatened the visitors.

In the second period, the Technology team showed some good defensive work. Caine, who held the team together after Captain Johnston was out, was a tower of strength for the Engineers, and the mainstay of their defence. He was easily the outstanding player for Technology, although Captain Johnston, while he was in, did some excellent work. Carroll the Boston College left forward, was high scorer of the game, with 13 points to his credit; while Davidson and Simonds, with three goals apiece, led the Technology scoring.

BEAVER RIFLEMEN DEFEAT PRINCETON

Fielding and Holmes Shoot Perfect Scores From Prone

The varsity rifle team defeated Princeton University by a wide margin in the third match of the Northeastern Intercollegiate Rifle League which ended last Wednesday. The Beaver rifles scored 1878 points against 1629 for Princeton, making two matches of the league they have won, being defeated only by Columbia in the first match.

Fielding and Holmes shot perfectly for the prone position, and Fielding also turned in a perfect score for the sitting position. The results of the third match showed an improvement of 12 points over the second match but are still 13 points behind the first.

Norwich is now standing highest in the league having won all three of their matches, among them the one with Columbia; Technology ranks fourth, with Columbia and Pennsylvania standing second and third. The Engineers' next match is with Harvard and will be completed this afternoon; Harvard has been shooting poorly during the first three matches so an easy victory is expected.

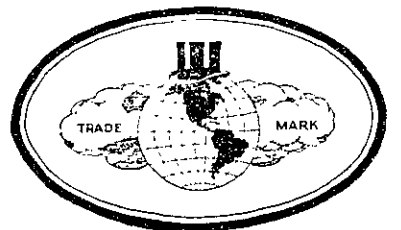
