GALSWORTHY PLEASES AT COPLEY THEATRE

"Justice," at the Copley, is a play in four acts, by John Galsworthy. The performance given Monday evening was perhaps one of the finest achievements of the company. Galsworthy's tragedy demands sincerity of artistic purpose, taste, and no small amount of superior acting which was evidently not lacking throughout the entire cast. Galsworthy assumes that the English prison and divorce laws work hardships on the individual. Falder raises one of his employer's checks and is arrested. Act II, the trial, is the most dramatic in the piece. The subsequent horrors of solitary confinement are emphasized.

Mr. Clive's Falder was a pathetically moving figure, with no undue outbursts of melodramatic passion. He is a true artist, with versatility and power. Mr. Buckler, as Cokeson, in a part which is unique for character acting opportunities, was the mild, amiable old man, not without pride and shrewdness.

Houston Richards, as "Lord Dicky," amusingly mixes things up because of his absent mindedness. Peggy, the charming wife, is acted by Ann Mason, who at her best moments is quite captivating. Paul Gordon, who plays the part of the lover, does his best in the last act; his attempts at love making are somewhat stiff. The play is entertaining as well as interesting; it leaves a good impression.

PROFESSOR HUTCHINSON ADDRESSES GEOLOGISTS

Professor W. S. Hutchinson of the Mining Department, gave an illustrated talk on the Vanadium deposits at Mina Ragra, Peru, before the Geological Conference, yesterday afternoon. The talk lasted over two hours, and included a thorough discussion of the geological occurrence of the deposits, and of the commercial importance of vanadium.

Over 50 colored lantern slides of the occurrence of the ore and the work of mining it were exhibited.

The efforts of the Sigma Delta Chi Fraternity at Toronto to secure a course of lectures in journalism to be given by prominent newspaper men have been approved by the faculty. Robert B. Wolf, Consulting Engineer, to Address Meeting

At the semi-annual smoker of the Combined Professional Societies to be held next Wednesday evening, all students will have an opportunity to hear Robert B. Wolf, one of the foremost consulting engineers of New York, speak. He has been secured to speak after much difficulty, due to his many business affairs which will take him over the entire country. Because the nature of the subject is one of interest to Technology men particularly, the meeting is open to all members of the student body. The smoker will take place in the main hall of Walker Memorial starting at 8 o'clock.

Mr. Wolf has done much work both during the war and at the present time in bringing about greater harmony between the employer and the employee. During the war he has connected with the Emergency Fleet Corporation. He has studied human engineering as well as material engineering and should be well qualified to be of interest to Technology men.

LARGE TANK TO ARRIVE HERE WHEN REPAIRED

The big Mark VIII tank which is to be added to the equipment of the Military Science Department of the Institute will be brought up as soon as a special part for its clutch, which was recently injured, is replaced, announces Major C. H. Bandholtz, in charge of the Ordnance Unit here. It is to be used in the instruction of the R. O. T. C. Ordnance Unit.

The tank is a gigantic affair, 34 feet long, 13 feet wide and over 10 feet high. It weighs over 40 tons when fully equipped and manned. It has a fighting tank with a crew of eight men, including the officer in charge, the driver, one man in the engine room, two men at the six-pounder guns, and three men at the machine guns. It has an equipment of two Hotchkiss six-pounder guns and five Browning machine guns, and storage for 200 rounds of six-pounder ammunition and 20,000 rounds of machine gun ammunition. In addition, it carries a 150 gallon supply of gasoline.

The power plant of the tank is a 400 horse-power 12-cylinder Liberty motor, which is connected to give two speeds forward and one reverse. It reaches a maximum speed of 5.4 miles per hour; its regular speed is about three miles per hour.

One unusual feature of the tank is that its caterpillar treads extend out beyond any other point both front and back, making it practically non-stallable.

which is the largest airplane in the world at the present time, were shown and its operation explained by the General, who has had personal experience with this plane as well as all the other types, belonging both to our own and the Allied governments.

Emphasized Need of Air Force

The Air Service has been instrumental in making tests, collaborating with the Department of Agriculture, in spraying disinfectant over forests, and combating the boll weevil by spraying powder from airplanes. As a result of these tests, of which movies were shown, the Department of Agriculture is having special planes built for the continuance of this work which has proved very successful.

The absolute necessity of a good air force in time of war and for coast protection was brought out most emphatically by the General who is an ardent supporter of preparedness. He predicted the practicability of transporting whole armies by air in the near future. He is very anxious that the efficiency of our air fleet be increased and predicted a speed of 300 miles an hour in the near future.

The recently perfected reversible propeller was described. This propeller has greatly helped in slowing up the landing distance of planes. Pictures showing the war maneuvers of our planes, the recent Pulitzer Air Race at St. Louis, and planes which had made the record non-stop flights, were shown.

The General is the owner of several record breaking medals himself, and finished up his talk by showing movies of these flights along with the present record for the world's endurance test of one day and a half.

The lava had hardened into such a rough surface that to carry drilling material out onto it required a special Ford rigged up with six wheels and six gears.

When the party reached the center, they found that the lava was too hard for ordinary drills. After a hole had been sunk about two feet the drills could go no farther. Several were lost because they swelled under the heat and lodged in the hole. At two feet the temperature of the lava was estimated at 204 degrees F. The party did not dare use a diamond drill as they cost about \$2,000 and several were sure to be lost before the desired results could be obtained.

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
