Davy Jones Best on Strong Bruin Team—13 Men Make Trip

BEAVERS WILL MEET STIFF COMPETITION

Tomorrow evening the varsity swimming team will meet the Brown tankmen at Providence. The Brown swimmers present a formidable combination this year. Davy Jones is easily Brown's best man. In their meet last Saturday the Brown tankers went down to defeat at the hands of the exceptionally strong Navy team.

Both Rule and Kakanani of the Navy beat Jones in the 50 yard dash. In taking first place in this event Rule clipped a second from the Intercollegiate record for this distance. This makes the second Intercollegiate record that Rule has broken this year. Jones, however, came through for the Bears in the 100 yard dash, and clipped 1-10 second from the local record for this event.

The Technology team, though they have not had a very successful season thus far, has been developing rapidly considering the difficulties which have confronted them. The Brown encounter should be fairly close, and the relay will probably be the decisive factor. The engineers' entries will be as follows:

CRIMSON BEATEN BY RIFLE TEAM

Engineers Roll Up Score of 1887 Against 1840 for Harvard

The Technology rifle team won the fourth match of the N. I. R. L. from Harvard with a score of 1887 against the 1840 of the Crimson team. The winning of this match places the team well to the head of the league, and makes twice they have met and defeated Harvard during the season.

Although the Beavers did not shoot as well as in the match with Columbia, they proved again that when it comes to skill and accuracy Harvard boys must look up to Tech men. Norwich and the University of Pennsylvania are leading the league, having won all four of their matches; Technology and Penn State are close behind each having three matches to their credit. Harvard and Yale are together near the foot of the league, while Dartmouth and Princeton bring up the rear, having lost all four matches.

Today the Beaver rifles begin shooting the fifth match of the league against the strong Norwich team. The match will be concluded by Wednesday, and if the Engineers win they may rest assured of a high place in the league when the final match is ended.

AIRPLANE MOTOR WILL AID HARVARD OARSMEN

The old-time back-breaking crew workouts in the tank have been banished forever at Harvard with the installation of a 90 horse-power airplane motor, which drives two propellers at such a rate that the water in the tank is kept moving at about the same speed as the shell moves through the water in actual practice. This closely approximates the conditions in the tank to those on the river.

Professor Warren of Technology has charge of the planning of the innovation. Mirrors have been placed along the sides of the tank to permit the rowers to see and correct their own form. Perforated oars are used. The tank accommodates four crews.

FENCERS WIN AGAINST DARTMOUTH SQUAD-8-6

Hawthorne Makes It Three in a Row with the Foils — Dartmouth Fences German Style

In the first intercollegiate qualification meet of the season last Friday, the Institute fencing team subdued the Dartmouth swordsmen to the tune of 8-6. Generally speaking the fencing was neither as clean nor as fast as in the Bowdoin meet and there was a good deal of indecisiveness among the judges but taken as a whole, it was a contest that kept the audience up on its feet.

The sensation of the afternoon was when Hawthorne turned out to be the star of the foils by being the only one to take all three of his bouts. He virtually with his three wins saved the day for the Beavers as Levis and Ferre succeeded in getting only a single bout apiece.

Green Fences German Style

Dartmouth has an Austrian coach and consequently fences German style while we fence French. This of course was quite as much of a handicap to the Dartmouth team as it was to us but they seemed not to mind it in the least, while our men with the exception of Hawthorne were nervous and in doubt as to exactly what to do. If they had given their attention to making as many touches as possible and not worrying about how to parry an attack that they did not understand they could easily have duplicated Hawthorne's fine showing and made the win even more decisively.

The Green fencers in contrast to Bowdoin were not given to making showy and spectacular attacks. In the main they relied more or less on two or three simple yet effective ones which seemed to invariably get past our men's guard. Hawthorne sensed this after his opponent had three touches against him and accordingly gave up the idea of doing so much parrying and settled down to a deadly, quiet type of fencing. Whenever his opponent attacked he made either a stop thrust for a simple parry and repeat and three times out of four he got his man.

Levis and Ferre Slow Starting

Towards the end of the meet the other two got on to this style and as the score shows used it very effectively. The whole trouble with them at the beginning was that they were inclined

to be too complicated and to waste a lot of unnecessary energy.

In the sabers Serrano came through with goods in fine form and literally swamped both of his opponents. This speaks very well for his chances as Intercollegiate sabers' champion as it was Dartmouth who took them last year. Hawthorne did not do so well in these as in the foils but there was a very good reason. Both of the Green saber men have had a lot of experience while this is the first meet that Hawthorne has ever fenced sabers and he only began with them this year. Consequently he made a good showing.

Blake, as usual, stopped his man with his favorite blow, a stop thrust to the arm. There were two double touches before the scoring one in which he also used the stop thrust but finally Hawley took a lunge for his knee and long before the Dartmouth man had reached his objective Blake speared him just above the elbow.

Judges Uncertain

The judges which were composed of two men from each team were often quite undecided as to exactly what had happened until at the end they evidently thought that they had been unfair and began to give each other touches right and left. Burke Boyce, who directed the meet, was sometimes hard put to convince the judges that no touch had really been made and that they were giving the opposite side an extra point.

Altogether, however, it was a jolly good meet and some fine fencing was shown in just about every bout, although it was not spectacular and not apparent to the average onlooker. It was in fact fencing with most of the trimmings taken off.

Yale Freshmen Win Last Game of Basketball Season at New Haven

Playing their last game of basketball as freshmen the frosh basketball team put up one of the best scraps of the season against the Yale yearlings at New Haven, Friday night only to be given the small end of a 28 to 16 score. The game was much closer than the game suggests, both teams showing spurts of form which swelled the score column.

Yale took the lead at the start of the first quarter and from that time on was never headed although the frosh came close to tying the score on several occasions. Throughout the game the Yale yearling defence stood off the attacks on the frosh, Engel being the only man on the team that had the drive to go through and start a scoring rally. On these occasions the E! team displayed a fine brand of team work. Steison, the Yale captain, playing guard, played the best game for his team. His guarding kept the Tech frosh from becoming too dangerous. Jones, the Yale forward, was the leading scorer for his team.

This last game leaves the freshmen with a record of 4 games won to five games lost. One of the games is claimed to have been won by default from the Harvard frosh when they failed to show up at the scheduled date last Wednesday night. Due to some mix-up in dates the Crimson yearlings arrived at the Hangar Gym on the night after and after waiting around for an hour or two they went home. Just to whom the game will be awarded is not known as both teams are at present claiming the victory by default.

Delta Tau Delta allowed Delta Upsilon one basket and one free throw when they took their game by 22-3 count. Sigma Nu did almost as well when they won their contest with Phi Beta Epsilon, 18 to 4.

Theta Chi Win Close Game

In perhaps the most hotly contested game in the league so far, Sigma Alpha Epsilon went down to Theta Chi. The score, 7 to 6, gives indication of a game that was full of thrills and with some roughness.

Phi Kappa Sigma won their game with Kappa Sigma, 12 to 7. Lambda Chi Alpha did not have to play at all to get into the second round. Due to an odd number of teams entered they were allowed to go through the first round without a scheduled game.

Two Records Go By Boards in Third Indoor Meet—One Established

TECHNOLOGY FAILS TO DENT SCORING COLUMN

In the third annual indoor meet of the I. C. A. A. A. in the 22d Regiment Armory in New York, Pennsylvania with a well-balanced aggregation took the team honors with a total of 23 1-3 points. Yale and Princeton crowded the winner closely with 20 points apiece. Technology with six men entered fell short of breaking into the score column when Joyce was eliminated in the semi-finals in the 300 yard dash, and Ambach and Blodgett failed to survive the semi-finals of the hurdles. Simonds running the mile came the closest to scoring for the Beavers when he was nosed out of fifth place by Sayman Kerr of Pennsylvania.

New Records Made

Two new records were set in the meet and one established. Verne Booth of Johns Hopkins, the favorite of the two mile run, came up to expectations when he ran away from McLane of Penn to break the old record of 9 minutes 39 3-10 seconds by 3 3-10 seconds. In the 16 pound shot put Ralph Hills bested the mark hung up by himself when he heaved the shot 46 feet 1-4 inch.

Moore of Penn State set up the mark for the 70 yard hurdles when he stepped over the barriers in 9 1-10 seconds. Russ Ambach and Blodgett, who are accustomed to the 45 yard sticks, were eliminated in the semi-finals. Ambach failed to show his speed which he displayed so well in the K. of C. games last month, in which he finished in what appeared as a blanket finish for a new world's record. The longer distance seemed to slow down his speed.

CUB TRACKSTERS TRAIL WORCESTER

Frosh Feel Loss of Dexter as Schoolboys Get Three in High Jump

Taking first places in every event but the 40-yard dash, winning the relay, and making a clean sweep in the high jump, Worcester made a showing Saturday that has only been equalled by the veteran Andover team. Worcester was not only able to show a large number of first place winners but their second and third place men were also very good.

The cubs were somewhat handicapped by the fact that Worcester's track was so narrow as to only allow three men to enter in each event. This hindrance was felt especially in the 300-yard dash in which only one Tech man could place. The absence of Bob Dexter in the high jump made this event go hard against Technology.

Wiebe Wins Dash

The first event, the hurdles, was won by Martino of Worcester in what looked like a dead heat with Van Mater of Tech. Wiebe had it easy in the 40-yard and turned in one of the fastest times of the afternoon. First in the shot went at the very good distance of 41 ft. 5 in. to Trippie of Worcester with Glantzberg a scant four inches behind. The relay team which has not had much practice, gave a very good account of itself and was beaten only by several feet in a heartbreaking finish. The final score of 48-20 does not do justice to the number of close races that were held.

WORCESTER TEAM DEFEATS BEAVERS

Relay Is Deciding Factor When Academy Breaks Record To Win 29-15

Saturday afternoon the freshman swimming team lost their last meet of the season to Worcester Academy. The meet was very closely contested, and the Worcester tankmen were forced to break their school record in the relay in order to win the meet.

The relay was a most exciting race, the Technology swimmers being nosed out of a victory by a very small margin. The Worcester relay team swam the distance in 45 3-5 seconds, which breaks the Academy record for this event. The 100 yard dash was another thrilling race, Campbell just nosing out Shaw of Worcester for Technology's only first place. Hinrod took third in this event for the Beavers.

Dive All Worcester's

In the dive Worcester had things pretty much her own way. Matheson and Campion of Worcester captured first and second honors with 95 and 83 points respectively. Gentry of Technology took third place with 76 points.

Captain Harnden of the Academy won first place in the 50 yard dash in the fast time of 26 seconds. Armstrong and Campbell took second and third respectively for the freshmen. The 200 yard sprint was won by Gregory of Worcester in 1 minute 36 2-5 seconds. Johnson took second in this event and Wies carried off third honors for the Beavers. The summary:
