child Company of Boston, under the direction of Mr. H. A. MacDonald. The new form of construction employed was worked out by H. W. Brown '15, and has proved very economical and substantial, but has made necessary extraordinary nicety in design and workmanship. Many of the wooden forms into which the concrete frame of the structure were poured were left permanently in place, speeding up the work and providing something to which nail the trim and lath. The window frames were then set in place and a layer of gunnite blown on over the entire wall surface with a cement gun, thus tying in the frames so that it is now impossible to alter their position.

It was necessary to lay the brick and limestone veneer with extreme care so that each course occupied exactly the position planned, and no interference with window openings resulted.

Musical Clubs Entertained at Dinner in Claffin Hall

The Combined Musical Clubs were entertained at dinner last Saturday evening by the Wellesley College Glee Club in Claffin Hall prior to the joint concert by the two organizations. The concert itself was held in the new Alumni Hall, which proved amply large for the assemblage. There were about 500 at the dance following the performance.

The girls' glee club gave two offerings, of two selections each, among which was "When I Get To Heaven," a negro spiritual. There was also a duet by a pair of the Wellesley girls. The program by the Technology clubs was as usual except that the "Dippy Davy Duo" was not included. The club's dance orchestra furnished the music for the dance.

T. C. A. SENDS CLOTHING AND BOOKS TO EUROPE

About 300 books and a large amount of clothing will be sent to the students in the Universities of Central Europe by the T. C. A. today. This is the second shipment made this school year, since 50 books and 253 articles of clothing were sent in December.

The books in today's shipment consist of some given by the T. C. A. and some which remained unsold in the book exchange at the end of last term. On December 31 a letter was sent to men owning unsold books asking them to call for them. Nearly 200 of these books were not claimed and are in this shipment. The goods are being sent through the Student Friendship Fund.

BULK OF LOST ARTICLES CLAIMED BY STUDENTS

Major Smith declares that, with the exception of some old clothing, most of the slide rules, fountain pens, and other necessities have been claimed. The old clothes left will be turned over to the T. PENN WINS TITLE FOR SECOND TIME IN TRACK

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In the high jump won by Flahive of Boston College with a leap of 6 feet 1-8 inch, nine athletes were deadlocked at second place at 5 feet 10 1-8 inches. Macardle of Technology just fell short of making the tie when he failed to clear the bar in his three attempts. In the pole vault Sanford went out at 11 feet 6 inches.

The thrill of the meet came in the mile relay race when Harvard and Yale ran nip and tuck the whole distance. The final lap found Yale in the lead with Chapman running. The Harvard man succeeded in cutting down the lead until at the finish when the Eli spurred to win by a hair.

COLLEGE WOMEN DO NOT READ ENOUGH SAYS DEAN

Dean Colvin of the University of Maine recently stated that women college students all over the country do not read enough and are, consequently, not so familiar as they should be with current events. This condition, she claims does not only exist at the University of Maine, but at institutions throughout the United States. Dean Colvin has had a wide acquaintance with students of many colleges, and her statement is founded upon an intimate personal knowledge of the existing conditions.

WELLESLEY GUESSERS STAGE NOVEL CONTEST

Of all the enterprises launched lately at Wellesley to raise money for the benefit of the Semi-Centennial Fund, one of the cleverest and most successful was the exhibition of baby pictures of many members of the faculty in the Art Museum. Students and faculty were permitted to observe these and then try to guess who the pictures represented. The winners of the contest, of which there were two with 15 correct identifications each, received prizes. Some of the errors made by the people who guessed were very amusing.

FIERY CROSS FLARES ON TORONTO'S CAMPUS

A few days ago innocent students walking home at about 2 A.M. across the U. of Toronto campus, were startled by seeing a wooden cross about five feet in height burning brightly. An automobile standing nearby had its headlights focused on the blaze. The students, being rather timid, avoided the cross and continued to their rooms. In the morning, the charred remains of the symbol were found still upright where the thing had been seen the night before. Speculation ran rife. Many believed that the Klu Klux Klan had held one of its secret meetings and that the students had passed just after the group had dispersed. Klan meetings have been held in southern universities, and Klan literature has been circulating about the Toronto campus so that it is not impossible that the white-hooded trouble makers actually held forth at the University.

STUDENT TUTORING TO CUT FROSH FATALITIES

At Trinity College, a most unusual plan has been adopted in accordance with a suggestion by the editor of the college paper to reduce the large number of men who flunk out at mid-years. Members of the faculty have picked a number of upper-classmen of high scholastic standing to tutor those freshmen whose days seem numbered because of the inferiority of their work. It is hoped that under the new plan, many of the men who would otherwise have been forced to leave college after the examinations, will be enabled to continue.

GEORGIA TECH TO HAVE COURSES IN CERAMICS

Work has been started on a new Ceramics building for the use of the students of Georgia Tech. The construction is in charge of members of the faculty and was designed by them. The work is progressing very rapidly and it is hoped that the building will soon be complete and ready for use. The work in the new building will deal with the manufacture of brick, glass, glass products, pottery, terra cotta and like substances made from non-metallic minerals. This is a new course for the Institute.

In honor of the recent completion of the new gymnasium at Ohio State University, a basketball game followed by a free dance held in the new building. A large crowd, including many prominent college coaches and sports writers from other universities attended the festivities which took place last week. The work has taken two years and now that it is complete, the Ohio State Gymnasium is one of the largest and best equipped in the state.

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
