SWIMMERS LOSE TO BROWN TEAM AT PROVIDENCE

Engineers Take First in Dive, Plunge, and 100 Yard Breast Stroke

WHEELER OF BROWN BREAKS 220 RECORD

Although the varsity swimmers secured three first places, and four thirds last night against the Brown team at Providence they were forced to accept a 45-21 defeat at the hands of the Bruin swimmers. The Engineers gave one of their best exhibitions so far this season, taking first in the dive, plunge, and 100 yard breast stroke.

One record was broken when Wheeler of Brown broke the 220 yard dash mark, cutting 2-5 of a second from the old record.

Keay Takes Dive

Keay won the dive by a good margin against the Bruin divers, with Richardson coming in third, and Hadley of Brown in second position. In the 50 yard dash Dunn and Taylor tied for third place.

Captain Evans of the Engineers took third in the fast 220 yard swim, which Wheeler won in 2:28 2-5. In the 100 yard backstroke Technology had to be content again with third, Robinson placing.

In the 100 yard dash Davy Jones had things his own way when he won in 55 3-5. Dunn of the Beavers pressed Staples closely at the finish. The plunge proved to be a close event as Cates won in the next to the last plunge. Brown took the other two positions.

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Fencers Work To Qualify For The Intercollegiates

Victory Over Dartmouth Raises The Engineers Hopes For Future

With the first Intercollegiate meet against Dartmouth won and out of the way, the chances for our team qualifying in the Intercollegiates have increased to a marked extent as under the new system of qualification the Green was perhaps our strongest opponent with the exception of Harvard and Army.

At the meeting of the Intercollegiate committee last year it was definitely decided that the old qualification system should be abandoned and a new one substituted in its place. Under the old one all the colleges were supposed to compete against one another and those winning a certain number of

points were eligible for competition. Now, however, the colleges have been divided up into several groups depending on their relative location and two colleges from each group will qualify for the final meet at the Hotel Astor sometime in May.

Technology Has Good Chance

In the old days the Institute had hardly a chance as they were bound to come up against all the best fencers in the country before they could even get a look at the Intercollegiates. This included the Navy and the Army who undoubtedly have two of the best teams in the country. Now, although the Engineers must go up against the Army, they will have no meet with the Navy, which puts us just one meet further along towards victory.

Harvard beat Dartmouth by a much larger margin than Technology so the Beavers will have their hands full when they meet the Crimson. Technology's chances for taking first place in the Intercollegiates themselves are in reality pretty small but we have an excellent chance to at least place and for individual honors there are unlimited possibilities on our side, especially in the sabers.

NEW RECORDS ARE MADE BY RUNNERS

Four Marks Are Unofficially Broken on the Track This Season

Although the track team has run into hard luck in the majority of the meets this season, Coach Connor has a number of individual performers who rank at the top of the list of eastern track athletes. Four Technology records have been unofficially broken this season, three varsity and one freshman mark being bettered, but the varsity team has not been strengthened by the services of all the men who made the new records as two of them are ineligible for competition.

Marvin Rick, former Princeton star, and Giff Symonds both broke the record for the mile run, and Leness lowered the 600 mark. Rick and Leness are the ineligible men this season. Rick coming under the one-year rule as he is in the freshman class and Leness is lost to the team because he attended Harvard for a week this fall and then transferred to Technology thereby becoming ineligible for competition this season. Blodgett, of the varsity and Glantzberg of the frosh are the other two men to break records. Blodgett lowering the mark in the high hurdles and Glantzberg changed the record in the shot-out.

Rick Breaks Mile Record

Several weeks ago a practice race was run between Rick, Symonds, and Keplinger in which Rick lowered the mile record from 4:39:4 to 4:37:4 nosing out Symonds by a hair. Shortly after this Symonds again broke the record, this time covering the boards in 4:36:3 making twice that the time of three years standing fell within a week. Leness, who had never run before last year, recently ran the 600-yard in the remarkably good time of 1:18:3, beating the old record by 1-5 of a second. Not satisfied with this he ran a time trial with Charley Boardman in an effort to lower the mark set by Garvin Bayden in the half.
