PROFESSOR TYLER GOES TO EUROPE

Leaving From New York With
Family Wednesday for
Extended Tour

Professor H. W. Tyler '84, head of the Mathematics Department and Chairman of the Faculty Club, is leaving for Europe next week for a protracted pleasure trip. He will be accompanied by his wife and two daughters.

Professor Tyler leaves from New York on the French Line Steamer Chicago on Wednesday, March 12. He goes straight to Le Havre, and thence to Paris, where he expects to spend some time. From Paris he leaves for a five week tour of Spain, returning through southern France to Italy. Here he expects to be a delegate at the celebration of the 700th anniversary of the founding of the University of Naples. He will spend July in Switzerland, and is planning to return to this country early in September.

During the absence of Professor Tyler, Professor F. S. Woods will be in charge of the Mathematics Department and Professor H. M. Goodwin of the Physics Department will act as Chairman of the Faculty Club.

BUT EIGHTY PROM SIGN-UPS REMAIN

Tickets Go To First Eighty
Applicants Forwarding
Full Payment

During the three days' sale of prom sign-ups 420 were purchased and the committee has arranged for the disposal of the remaining 80. Plans for the sale of stag tickets and chaperones tickets have also been made.

The first 80 men who write G. H. Stark '25, M. I. T. Dorms, applying for tickets for the affair and enclosing with their letters a check for \$11 each will be sent tickets. No redemption of signups will be necessary in these cases, of course, since the total price will have been remitted by mail.

Instead of selling the stag tickets on the day of redemption of the sign-ups for the regular tickets, as formerly proposed, the committee has decided that the 50 stag tickets be sold in the same manner as the remaining 80 regulars, that is, the first 50 applications with four dollar checks will receive consideration. Letters should be likewise addressed to G. H. Stark. Fraternities wishing to secure tickets for the chaperones of house parties may also secure them by applying in the same way instead of doing so at the time previously mentioned. Chaperones' tickets will be \$5.00 and no limit has been set as to the number sold.

YALE CONFERENCE FAVORS LABOR UNIONS FOR PROFS

Student control of the college and sympathy for the Labor Movement were two of the topics discussed at the Yale Conference on the American Student Forum, the Yale Liberal Club, and the Yale Indianapolis Convention group for the purpose of discussing the causes of the student's lack of interest in things worth while and his over emphasis of activities.

R. N. Baldwin of the American Civil Liberties Union said that few colleges dared to let the more radical speakers address the student body which desired to be relieved from having to accept the views that the Faculty and Trustees see fit to express to them. He also thought that the professors should join the American Federation of College Professors, a branch of the A. F. of L. Some delegates went even further and proposed that the students have complete academic freedom, hire the instructing staff, and choose their course of study.

Professor French of Yale believed that the delegates should not dwell on the faults of colleges but should accept

Signups To Be Void After March
31—Year Book Goes to
Press the 31st

At a recent meeting of the Technique Managing Board, it was decided to change the name from Technique 1925 to Technique, Volume 39. The signups will continue to be redeemed until Saturday every day from 11 until 2. After March 31, all signups will be void.

Hereafter it has been decided to name the year book by its volume number. This is a decidedly new idea in the way of naming year books and the popularity of this method is yet to be determined.

The Technique management wishes to emphasize that the signups will be void after the last day of this month, and also that no orders for gold lettering will be received after this week.

The book goes to press March 25 and after this week, the signups will be redeemed in the Technique office at Walker. The proof is now coming in rapidly and it is expected that all of it will be ready by the time Volume 39 is ready to go to press.

Only 223 of the signups have been redeemed as yet and the rate will have to increase considerably if all are to be redeemed before the end of the month.

INSTITUTE COMMITTEE ACCEPTS CONSTITUTION

All Architects Must Now Pay
Dues to Their Society

The ratification of the constitution of the Architectural Society was the only business that aroused any discussion at the meeting of the Institute Committee yesterday afternoon. According to the constitution, every student in the Architectural Course at the Institute becomes automatically a member of the society and that dues must be paid "to insure participation in the social activities of the club."

B. J. Fletcher '24, chairman of the Budget Committee of the Institute Committee, objected to the constitution on the grounds that these dues amounted to a tax on the student body and that the Institute Committee was not empowered to take action in such a matter. This argument was overruled however by C. M. Phelps '24 who said that the levying of dues was one of the prerogatives of the society. The constitution was ratified unanimously. Among the other business transacted at the meeting was the approval of a report of the Boat House Committee announcing the selling of three shells and four canoes in order to make room for additional equipment which will arrive soon. The petition of the Catholic Club for re-recognition as an official undergraduate activity was also accepted.

them and readjust them from within. During the ensuing discussion some of the men present seemed to think that we owe our presence in college to the laboring class although none of them would define the labor movement. The replacement of some activities by Liberal Clubs was also advocated.

The Technology delegates, G. L. Bateman '25 and C. L. Petze '25, believe that Mr. Baldwin's proposition of complete and unconditional control of the college is incompatible with viewpoints of students in technical institutions. They believe it is impossible to dictate to a Faculty whose experience can only operate to the student's benefit. They also feel that activities should be encouraged equally with Liberal Clubs.

The Labor movement seemed to be over emphasized on the side of the laborer. The Technology delegates felt that only one side of the question was discussed and that most of the delegates exhibited ignorance of the labor movement and of the principles of economics.

Option May Use Books

As previously announced, the Dartmouth and Technology clubs will render a program composed of the five best selections from the repertoire of each of the organizations, making a balanced performers of ten numbers. The dance orchestras of both the clubs will furnish the music for the after-concert hop, which will be a continuous program of dance numbers. The scheme of having fraternity men and others meet under their fraternity and class banners respectively, which was inaugurated and practised at the Winter Concert this year, will probably be adopted by those in charge of the arrangements for the concert.

COMBINED SOCIETIES HEAR TALK AT SMOKER

"Individualism in Industry" Is
Keynote of Speech

"Individualism in industry" was the keynote of Mr. R. B. Wolfe's talk at the Combined Professional Societies smoker held in main hall, Walker, Wednesday night. He described the different methods used in a factory to get the workers working at the best rate for maximum efficiency.

"Throughout his talk he drew analogies to the minerals, plants, and animals as compared to man. 'To attain the highest form of a mineral a successive progression must be made from the lower forms to the higher forms, from the electron to the mineral itself there must be a firm growth.' So it is with the development of man, there must be a steady up building—a well-satisfied working class is essential to a strong industrial development of mankind."

With Emergency Fleet
He cited several cases where the efficiency of factory workers had been raised above the average by appealing to the pride of individual accomplishment rather than pecuniary desires. The bonus or any other remunerative system falls down when it comes to putting out good work, was the gist of Mr. Wolfe's talk. In the case of a paper pulp plant each man machine had to put out just 20 tons of pulp a day—no more no less—with this appeal to the instinctive pride of a man rather than offering a bonus and thus calling on only the base money grabbing side of the individual, the efficiency of the plant was increased tremendously.

Mr. Wolfe was connected with the Emergency Fleet Corporation during the war and while with that concern solved many difficult and distressing labor problems. He is at present a consulting engineer in New York City, the bulk of his work being in the capacity of an efficiency engineer. Mr. Wolfe is also vice president of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers.

ALUMNI BANQUET IN NEW YORK TO BE BROADCASTED

F. A. Vanderlip to Give Principal
Speech at Dinner of
1500 Guests

TECH SHOW CAST WILL ENTERTAIN WITH SONGS

With speeches being broadcasted to all parts of the country from the Waldorf Astoria tomorrow night, the Technology Club of New York will hold its annual banquet at 7 o'clock.

Various Technology Alumni organizations will hold dinners, in some cases annual banquets, and listen to the speeches of President Stratton, Mr. F. A. Vanderlip and others who will give talks which will be broadcasted by means of radio relay from London to Honolulu from the Waldorf in New York. Arrangements for 1500 people have been made and it is fully expected that more will apply than can be accommodated.

Mr. Frank A. Vanderlip is to make the principal speech of the evening and Pres. Gilmore '90 and O. B. Dennison, '11, Secretary, will also give short talks on the work that the Alumni are accomplishing. Gerard Swope '95, who has given an Aldred Lecture and is President of the General Electric Company will also speak at the dinner.

Tech Show Cast to Entertain
President Harbord of the Radio Corporation of America, and President Herr of the Westinghouse Company will be present and it is expected that they will also speak. Reinald Werrenrath and others of the Metropolitan Opera Company will entertain with selections of music, both vocal and instrumental.

Several members of the 1924 Tech Show cast will give a little entertainment selected from various of the most interesting moments in the play.

This is the first time that any Technology Alumni banquet has been broadcasted to any extent, and this event promises to be almost international in character as practically any Alumnus, provided that he is equipped with sensitive enough receiving apparatus will be able to attend the dinner in spirit if not in person.

WEBSTER ADVOCATES LEAGUE OF NATIONS

Corporation Member Speaks at
Faculty Club Luncheon

E. S. Webster '88 gave a 40 minute talk on the League of Nations at the Faculty Club luncheon yesterday. The meeting was so well attended that not all those who wished to be admitted could be accommodated in the Faculty dining room, where the luncheon was held.

Mr. Webster is a life member and a member of the executive committee of the Corporation. He was in Geneva during the session of the Fourth Assembly of the League, and became so interested in its work that he stayed several weeks longer than he had intended. Since his return, he has been bending all his efforts to forwarding the work of the Non-Partisan Association for the League of Nations.

Strongly advocating American participation, Mr. Webster emphasized the practical working of the League rather than the theory, and attempted to show the benefits to be gained from American membership. Following his talk, he answered questions put to him by members of the faculty.

At the meeting, it was announced that Professor H. M. Goodwin '90 of the Department of Physics is to be acting president of the faculty club for the rest of the year, owing to the absence of Professor Tyler, who leaves for Europe next Wednesday.
