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Varsity Tankmen Meet Dartmouth in Home Contest

Green Has Strong Team Having Won Four and Lost Two Encounters

SWIM WILL TAKE PLACE IN BOSTON Y.M.C.A. TANK

The varsity swimming team will meet the Dartmouth tankmen tomorrow night in the Boston Y. M. C. A. pool on Huntington Avenue. Dartmouth has had six meets thus far, and has emerged victorious from all but two of the encounters. The Green swimmers have triumphed over Boston University, Army, Wesleyan, and Columbia. Yale and Brown were the two teams that proved too strong for the Hanover swimmers. The Brown meet was extremely close, the Bears winning by the slight margin of two points.

The engineers made a good showing in their last meet with Brown, taking first honors in three events, the dive, plunge and 100 yard breast stroke. The Beavers will have the advantage of swimming in their home tank, and although the Dartmouth tankers are a formidable aggregation, every event should be closely contested. The meet will be governed by the N.E.I.S.A. rules.

Tickets for the meet will be on sale in the main lobby today and tomorrow from 12 to 2 o'clock, and may also be purchased at the fraternity houses. The swim will begin at 8:15 sharp. The Technology-Dartmouth Club will be well represented at the meet, and although examinations are close at hand a large gathering is hoped for. Due to the fact that most of the Engineers' meets have taken place away from Boston, very few Technology men have seen the team in action. This will probably be the last meet for the Beavers which will take place in Boston.

Wrestlers Meet Lehigh in Hangar Tomorrow Night

Tuttle, Former New England 125 Pound Champion Returns To Engineers

LEHIGH HAS STRONG MAT TEAM THIS YEAR

With the return of Tuttle, New England champion two years ago in the 125 pound class, the wrestling team has been reinforced considerably for its meet with Lehigh tomorrow night in the Hangar. Tuttle won the right to represent Technology when he defeated Kurtin in an elimination bout Tuesday. The Brown and White come here with a record of wins over Yale and Princeton, the latter a shut out victory when they held the tiger matmen scoreless, winning 29 to 0.

Last Saturday night the Lehigh matmen lost to Penn State's strong team in a meet held at Bethlehem. A feature of this meet was the fact that there were no falls. Four of the first five decisions went to Penn State, Lehigh won in the next weight, and the heavy weight contest was called a draw after the men failed to get on the mat. Inasmuch as Penn State has been in a winning streak, defeating the best teams of the east, the Lehigh men are undoubtedly an aggressive aggregation to hold the Nittany wrestlers fall-less.

Norwood Wins Elimination
Coyle will represent Technology in the 115 pound class as usual. In the last few practices he has been showing up well and should put up a good scrap against Campbell of Lehigh. Campbell is an aggressive wrestler and is expected to force the fighting all the way. Tuttle, if his strength is right, should defeat Mathews in the 125 pound class. Due to his recent illness his strength may not be what it should be. In his elimination bout with Kurtin, he displayed his clever brand of grappling and he appeared to be in tip-top form. Dag Norwood succeeded in eliminating Lockwood in their trial bout in practice and will wrestle in the 135 pound class. He will be up against some stiff competition in the Brown and White captain. In the match with Penn State, Warren opposed the Nittany captain in the most interesting bout of the meet. The Penn man is one of the cleverest wrestlers in the East, but Warren showed his mettle and skill when he carried him to a very close decision. Both men showed a great deal of skill and there was the possibility of the match ending in a draw, but when time was called, it was found that the Penn captain had won by a 36 second time advantage.

Hereford Yet To Lose
Grinnel, wrestling in the 145 pound match, will be up against another strong man in Rogers. The Brown and White grappler won over Black of Penn State last week and will put up a merry battle. Rock Hereford will wrestle in his own class, the 158 pound, as usual. Rock is considered the best bet of the evening for Technology. He has not lost a match this year, winning most of them by falls. Beech, who will oppose him, lost his bout last Saturday, he should not make much trouble for Rock with his clever brand of wrestling that he has displayed so far this year. In his class Rock is about the best in the East and is pointed well for the Inter-

Norwich Defeats Varsity Rifles

Fielding Shoots Three Possibles—Beavers Standing Fourth In the N.I.R.L.

The varsity rifle team lost the fifth match of the N. I. R. L. to Norwich in a four position meet which ended last Wednesday afternoon. Technology shot 1895 which is better than they did in any of the other matches, but the Norwich marksmen piled up the high score of 1917, which places them at the head of the league.

The Beaver rifles did exceptionally well, in spite of the fact that they lost. Fielding was the highest individual scorer, shooting three possibles, and a 91 in the standing position. The other men on the team also turned in high scores: Holmes shooting a possible in the prone, and Peterson one in the sitting position, and Peterson one in the sitting position.

Technology in Fourth Place
Technology now stands fourth in the league with Norwich, University of Pennsylvania, and Columbia leading. They are now shooting Yale, and the chances of a victory are pretty certain as the Yale team has not been showing up very well during the last five matches of the league. Norwich and the University of Pennsylvania are now opposing each other. They present the two strongest teams in the East, and the results are looked forward to with considerable interest.

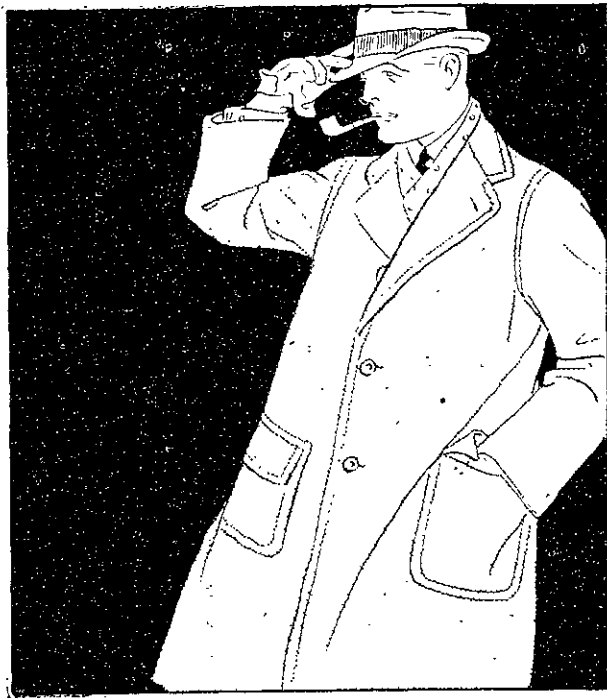
