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WRESTLERS LOSE TO LEHIGH TEAM

Ted Coyle and Rock Hereford Are the Technology Winners

In a hard fought meet with Lehigh in which the first outcome was uncertain up to the last match, the Beaver wrestlers were defeated by the close score of 12 to 8 Saturday night in the Hangar. Ted Coyle and Rock Hereford were the only winners for Technology, the former gaining the only fall of the meet over Campbell of Lehigh after a little over a minute of the second overtime period. Dick Tryon kept up his good work by holding Levitz of Lehigh in the unlimited class to a draw.

The 115 pound class bout started out very slowly, neither Ted Coyle or Campbell succeeding in gaining an advantage during the specified time. With Coyle given the advantage in the first overtime period the action started, from then on the match was fast. Failing to pin his man after repeated attempts, Coyle went to the mat in the second period. He quickly gained the advantage again by slipping out of his opponent's grasp by a clever twist. The fall came soon after; the Lehigh man being so exhausted that he had to be carried from the mat.

Three Bouts to Lehigh

The next three bouts went to Lehigh by decisions. Tom Tuttle in the 125 pound class was up against a tough customer in Mathews who towered several inches over him. He was unable to cope with the rangy Lehigh man and lost the bout after a clever exhibition of wrestling by both men. Dag Norwood met the Brown and White captain in the 135 pound match but failed to gain any advantage. He put up a fine defensive battle against his more versatile opponent and lost the decision. Rogers of Lehigh proved to be too fast for Grinnel in the 145 pound division and defeated him by a large time advantage.

Rock Hereford failed to get anything but a decision over Williamson of Lehigh. The Brown and White man played a defensive game that bordered on the ludicrous at times. The Lehigh man kept as far away as possible from Rockland. At the end of the match all the coaxing in the world would not make the Lehigh man come to grips. Captain Greer lost his bout to Burke of Lehigh after a short time advantage. Dick Tryon put up a wonderful fight against Levitz of Lehigh, who overweighed him 20 pounds. The scrap went into two overtime periods after which it was found that neither man had gained a sufficient time advantage.

Tuttle in 125 lb. Class

In the 125 pound class Tech has an abundance of material. Tom Tuttle has nearly recovered the form he had several years ago and will be in fine shape for the championships. It is probable that Morris Kurtin will be the second team representative as he won over Cummings in an elimination bout last week.

Dag Norwood will wrestle varsity in the 135 pound class. Although he is unable to work with the team in practice as he in Course VI-A, he has won three falls this season. Hoshel will be the second team candidate for honors. In Don Grinnel and Joe Lockwood the 145 pound class is represented by the most evenly matched men on the squad. It has been only by the narrowest of margins that Don has kept his place on the first team.

Little need be said of Rock Hereford's wrestling ability. Undeclared this year he sustained his clear record of the season before. At Providence Rock will be Technology's best bet. Charlie Bowles, Rock's understudy, is unfortunate to have an almost unbeatable man to try to eliminate. In the Intercollegiate he will get a chance to prove his worth on men of other colleges.

Captain Fred Greer in the 175 pound class, with a consistent season's record, has been a fine captain for the team this year, often going in above his weight in the unlimited class to represent Technology. Tryon, who has come to have a reputation as a giant-killer, will wrestle for the varsity in the unlimited class. At Princeton he wrestled a man weighing 40 pounds more than he did and gained the decision. Saturday he put up another good scrap against Levitz of Lehigh when he carried him to a draw, although he was outweighted 20 pounds. Bill Coleman will wrestle unlimited for the second team. He has not practiced very much with the team this year, but is in good condition from crew work.

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BEAVER SWIMMERS ARE DEFEATED BY DARTMOUTH TEAM

Technology Relay Wins Fast Race From the Green Quartet

Although the Technology swimmers won the relay from the Dartmouth quartet in a fast and exciting race, they lost the majority of the events last Saturday, being defeated 46-22 by the Green team. The relay was the choice race of the evening; Nip Marsh, swimming anchor man, was pushed to the utmost and did some mighty fast swimming to come in half a yard ahead of Algar of Dartmouth. Dunn paved the way for a win when he gained a slight lead over his opponent at the start, but the Dartmouth swimmers closed up the distance in the next laps.

Nip Marsh was the Beaver's chief point getter and performer, as he was the only Engineer to secure a first place in an event. Nip won the 50-yard dash in 27 seconds, Dunn taking second place.

Thirds in Other Events

Technology had to be content with thirds in all but one of the other events as Dartmouth made a clean sweep of the first and second positions. Richardson took third in the 220 yard swim, Keay in the dive, Robinson in the 100 yard back stroke, Dunn in the 100 yard swim, Cates in the plunge and Kearns in the 100 yard breaststroke.

Smith of Dartmouth gave a good exhibition of plunging, going the length of the 75 ft. pool in 50 seconds.

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Swordwielders Will Meet West Point Saturday

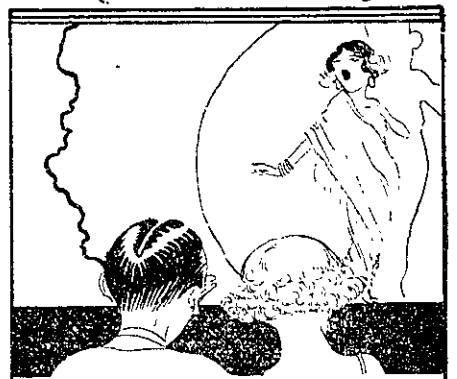
Fighting Chance to Win Even Though Army Team One Of Strongest

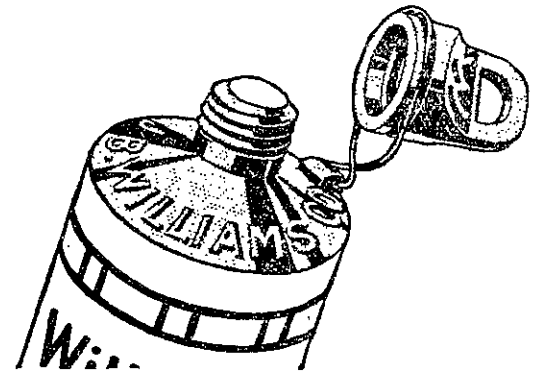
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
