ORGANIZATION OF CLUB COMPLETED

Calvin Coolidge Club Draws Up Plans for Activities at Meeting

With the expressed idea of training its members for work with their state committees during the summer in securing the nomination and election of Calvin Coolidge, a National Coolidge Club was formed here, at a meeting held Monday evening in Walker. Officers were elected, and plans made for next term and for the summer.

Officers Elected

The following men were elected officers of the Club. President, A. D. Carothers '24; Treasurer, J. D. Bates, Jr. '27, and Secretary, E. J. McGrew Jr. '26. Upon his election the president appointed C. F. Lyman of the Department of English as Chairman of Political Research, who, as in other college clubs that have been formed, undertakes to prepare arguments in support of the principles which the President advocates.

During the next term it is planned to hold several meetings and committees have been formed to further the aims of the club. The Speakers' Bureau is to recruit the speakers whom the club wishes to bring in from the outside. An Entertainment Committee has been formed to provide music to keep the rallies tuned to the proper pitch of excitement considered necessary for a political meeting.

It is planned to get as many men as possible to register in their respective states as there are always a large number of men who fail to do so. Debates are to be arranged with any group of men who oppose Mr. Coolidge as the next President.

warning the people of dangers threatening their institutions.

"The radio will shatter the silence that might otherwise hang over misdeeds," said Mr. Vanderlip. "The whole country becomes the audience of a constructive reformer if he has a real message to deliver. The newspapers have ceased in a large measure to be original investigators." Mr. Vanderlip declared that the radio would save

the nation and in this way become, "not merely a great scientific invention but the savior of democracy."

Other speakers at the dinner were Gerard Swope '95, who has spoken at the Aldred Lectures and is President of the General Electric Company; General J. G. Harbord, retired, president of the Radio Corporation of America, and Calvert Townley, assistant to the president of the Westinghouse Electric and Manufacturing Company.

This test carried on during the banquet is regarded by radio engineers as the greatest feat achieved in broadcasting. Three American concerns and one British contributed to its success. In addition to the Westinghouse Company and the Radio Corporation they are the General Electric Company and the British Broadcasting Company.

Dr. Stratton stated Saturday that a great deal of credit was due to the New York Alumni and to these radio companies which made the experiment possible.

Microphones in the ballroom of the hotel carried the voices and the music to station WJZ, which transmitted on its regular wave length of 455 meters. WGY at Schenectady was connected with WJZ's amplifying apparatus by land wire and transmitted synchronously on 385 meters. KDKA at East Pittsburgh, intercepted WGY on special receiving apparatus and transmitted through two stations, one broadcasting a strongly amplified repetition on a 94 meter relay wave and the other, on the customary wave of 326 meters.

P. R. MacBrayne '24 and R. L. Turner G. as the black "General Ollaghab" and "Pansy" gave short selections from Tech Show 1924, which were also broadcasted.

marine underwriters. While in London he was one of the American commissioners in the Alabama claims.

Returning to Boston in 1890, after being shipwrecked on the way, Captain Clark was soon afterward appointed by the directors of the World's Fair in Chicago, to take charge of the Marine Transportation department. Five years later he was made agent for Lloyd's for the Port and District of New York, one of the most influential positions in maritime affairs in the country. In this position he remained until 1920. He retired at the age of 80.

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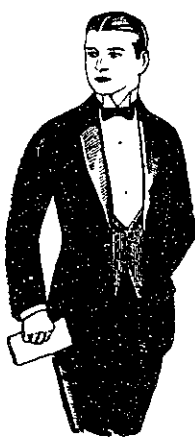
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
